Where the Flies Go.

AND HOW MANY MILES A DAY THEY TRAVEL.

Scientists are still working out the problem of where flies go in the winter-if they go anywhere. A series of experiments, reports "The Journal of. ilture" have been made with with 234,000 speciments of flies. The flies used were marked by putting them into bags containing red chalf or pigments very finely powdered and thus camouflaged they were allowed to escape.

The scientists then baited traps for the Hes at measured distances from their place of liberation. They were thus able to find when and where the flies voyaged. They found that many flies migrated considerable distances the common house fly migrating about six miles in a day. One trap recaptured a pink house fly thirteen miles away from its starting place.

Food and Temper.

Bad temper is largely a matter of the modern physician. Hungry and ill-nourished individuals are always apt to be peevish. There is much sound sense in the maxim "feed the brute," and a well-fed husband is us-usly easy to live with. But women, in concentrating on feeding the brute, are apt to overlook the necessity of feeding themselves and their nervet

and temper suffer in consequence.

A prominent physician has drawn attention to the fact that many women do not eat enough food. In some cases this is due to vanity, in others it is due to lack of means. But there are many women who are ill-nourished because they are ignorant of food values, and their families suffer as a result of this ignorance. Tea and buns play a prominent part in their dietary. Nerves and temper suffer, and they nag all with whom they come in contact. The close relation-ship between food and nutrition is too often overlooked. The young woman of to-day suffers more from nerves. and is not so good-tempered as her mother, according to medical observers, and they attribute this degeneracy to improper feeding. Every girl who is about to marry ought to receive proper instruction in food values. If this were done there would be fewer unhappy marriages, and more good tempered men and women. The amount of money that is wasted on food as a result of ignorance is appalling, and there would be little call for doctors or patent medicines but for such ignorance

It must be admitted, however, that many women deny themselves food in order that there may be a greater share for others in the house. Especially is this the case at a time like the present, when thousands of households are on half rations. Then again there are husbands who take to much of the family income for personal inperform miracles with the remainder. A wife who complained to a London magistrate that she did not receive enough from her husband to keep them both and the baby, received some sound advice. She was told that the baby came first, and then herself, and finally her husband. Instead of being at the head of the food queue he was rightly placed at the tail. This is as it should be, and most men recognise the justice of such an arrangement, though there are others who do not care what happens to the family so long as they are well filled.-Liver-. pool Weekly Post.



It is part of a British warship's duty to teach merchant vessels of her own nationality to "speak" correctly in the many-tongued language of the

She does this by rehearsing them in lifferent methods of intership "talking," much after the fashion in which a teacher of foreign languages gives oral instructions to a pupil. "I wish to exercise you in signals," says the warship to the mercantile

The latter intimates that she is ready, and the lesson begins forth-

As to the subject matter of it there is no fixed rule. It may be merely a "dull mechanic exercise," or the phrases repeated may be as seemingly nane as the "Have you seen the pen of my aunt?" of the French primer. What a ship talks about during her school hours" matters little. The esa sound knowledge of the language she is being coached in and be able to "speak" it fluently and correctly. Upon her ability to do this important issues may at times depend. Dur-ing war periods fighting ships look to trading ships for useful informa-tion, while trading ships have to "take in" warnings, directions and the like from fighting ships and from shore

In times of peace merchant craft use "signals"—the common tongue of the ocean highways—to call for help when they are in trouble or to tell each other news as they pass.

For their own benefit, therefore, i is necessary that they should be as well up in "signals" as possible, and this explains why the warship takes every opportunity of coaching them in a form of "speech" of which she has an erudite and professorial know-

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
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
