

The doctor had attempted to ascertain of her injuries, but the weakness which had overtaken Madge the moment she knew Irene was safe had rendered a prolonged examination impossible. ### Visited by Hungry Lions

A former member of the East Africa Survey, now in London, writes:

My East African mail a few days ago brought details of a night visit paid by two hungry lions to the plot behind the house which I recently occupied at Nairobi, the capital of Kenya Colony. These enterprising marauders slaughtered and partly devoured a couple of draught oxen between a double line of bungalows and alongside a tennis court and well-frequented road. This is certainly the most daring raid carried out by lions in Nairobi within the last few years.

Lions are great butchers, but even in Africa there must be a few instances of the brute having followed the custom of up-to-date tradesmen by delivering a supply of fresh meat to one's door! Yet there was an occasion when I shared that experience—and my own excellent venison—with my neighbors.

At night we heard the "woofing" of lions unusually close in, and towards the early hours of the morning the noise of the great brutes was unmistakably closer. Then, just before dawn, there came the sound of a wild stampede around the bungalows, and the twanging of wire fences. Turning out in pajamas we found a large buck lying with broken neck in the centre of the lawn, and two more tangled up with twisted limbs in the fencing wire. And residents a little further out discovered the spoor of a pursuing lion right across the flower beds!

**Successful Town Raiders.**  
Leopards are usually the most troublesome and successful of town raiders, and woe to the dog or man who interferes with these savage night prowlers. It was at this same spot that a favorite setter of mine was fatally maulled in a neighbor's rose garden. His side had been torn open with one powerful slash of the leopard's claw, and I shall never forget the last look of the faithful brown eyes and the pathetic wag of the tail with which the dying animal greeted me.

All my efforts to avenge the poor brute failed, for, however tempting the bait, the leopard refused to be lured within gunshot on moonlight nights.

Some years ago a woman living near the centre of the town had an extraordinary experience. On entering her bedroom early one afternoon she noticed something resembling a length of rope lying in shadow beyond the bed. Her first thought was of snakes.

Then a movement revealed a leopard crouched, saw-toothed and maniacally below her bed. The brute's gony swaying tail protruding beyond the covering, was the warning which saved her. Horrified, she rushed from the room, but had the presence of mind to slam the door. No risks were taken in dealing with that leopard. It was stretched dead on the bedroom floor by a well-aimed shot fired through the closed window.

### Women Campaign to Save Fur Producing Animals

New York, May 27 (A.P.).—A campaign to restrict the power of Dame Fashion, who for "mere decoration compels the extermination of whole species of fur-bearing animals," was launched to-night by the American Blue Cross Society with headquarters at Springfield, Mass., and the New York Women's League for Animals.

Underskirts of monkey fur, fans of ermine tails and lace, the parasol which when closed appears to be a bunch of folded ermine with an ornament of tortoise shell that represents the kitten's nose, are listed by the societies as bizarre fads which are causing needless destruction and cruelty.

The Blue Cross campaign against the summer fur craze a year ago was effective, Miss Mand Phillips of Springfield, president of the society, said, but the fashion of wearing furs for mere decoration has so increased "that fur is being cut and handled as if it were fabric and not the God-given skin of an animal."

Novelties like the ermine cape, described as having a "wide rippling circular flounce that begins at the neckline and runs all the way around a train-like back," or white fox fur collars to set off organdy are denounced as wholly unnecessary fads.

The societies urge nation-wide participation in the campaign by clubs and associations and legislation prohibiting the setting of traps except during a short season when fur is at its best.



### "The Mayfly is Up"

MESSAGE THAT FISHERMEN LONG FOR.

It was a hot day in May, and over the clear stream a number of winged insects were dancing. The mayfly was up.

They had made their annual appearance—which lasts but a day or two—the previous evening just before the sunset, the keepers of the preserved waters had sent the news by telegram all over the country.

These telegrams had been received by the various anglers, who, in most cases, had been waiting impatiently for the news, and at once they made for the trout streams, for at no other time of the year would trout bite more readily as during those few hours when the mayfly flashes over the water.

Almost at every second a silvery form would flash in the air, to fall back into the water with a loud plop as a fat trout leapt for a tempting bite, and another mayfly's short life was cut off by the fish jaws.

**Mayfly Madness.**  
Flop! Flop! Flop! It went on the whole time. The trout were suffering from mayfly madness, and throwing discretion to the winds. Anglers were already on the scene, tempting the trout with their various devices, and the hauls were rapid. When the mayfly is up, trout will bite at anything.

The mayfly, at the most, only lives for three days. It is a frail looking insect with wings like thin wire gauze and three long hairs like kite tails at the end of the long slender body. For every day the mayfly lives as a darting insect, it has lived a year under water as a crawling insect called a larva.

**How The Larvae Live.**  
Hatched from small, oval eggs in the water, the flat larvae live unprotected, save for their strong jaws and three feathery appendages on their abdomens.

To save their soft bodies from being swallowed by passing fish, they burrow into the bank at the bottom of the stream and live in little U-shaped burrows, so shaped that the larvae may go in at one end and out at the other without having to bend themselves double.

During their long watery lives the larvae change their skins a number of times, and in changing gradually cease to be larvae and turn into what are called pupae. Pupae is the stage just before becoming a mayfly.

**A Wonderful Transformation.**  
When the pupa is ready—and the queer thing is that all the other pupae in the stream are ready at the same moment—it drags itself clear of the water up a convenient stem and sits in the sun. After a little while the skin splits and out crawls the delicate mayfly, complete with wings. After a few moments, during which the warmth of the sun hardens the wings, the fly sets off for its few hours of anxiety after its three years on the bed of the stream. Sometimes a mayfly lives and dies between the hours of sunrise and sundown. For this reason mayflies are sometimes called day-fly.

But though they only live for so short a time, the female mayfly manages to lay a great many eggs, some to be devoured by the trout, and many to develop new larvae.

The perfect mayflies usually come out all at once at the hour before sunset, and it is then that the keepers, watching the streams for their advent, hurry off to send the message: "The mayfly is up!"

### Hints for Your Home

Dirty marks on linen blinds should be rubbed with a nail-brush dipped in Bat's Brick.  
A good knitting-silk holder is made by wedging two clothes-pegs into each other, and winding the silk crosswise over them.  
To remove dust from the crevices of carved furniture use a bicycle pump.

A new potato is a good remedy for a slight burn. Scrape or grate the potato and apply it like a poultice to the injured part.

Methylated spirit and blacklead mixed into a paste and rubbed on with flannel is excellent for cleaning greasy stoves and grates.

Open canned fruit an hour or two before serving and pour the contents of the tin into a dish. The contact of the air with the fruit will greatly improve the taste.

Bottles of milk should be buried in sawdust during warm weather. The milk will then remain at a much lower temperature than if placed in ordinary tap water.

To remove fur from a kettle, fill it nearly full with water and two teaspoonfuls of borax, and boil for half an hour. Empty, and rinse thoroughly. Before using, boil fresh water in it and rinse again.

To cure a cold in its earliest stages mix half a teaspoonful of salt with the same quantity of glycerine in a teaspoonful of warm water. Sniff this up the nose, letting it come out at the mouth. The process washes away all microbes.

To safeguard yourself against blood-poisoning, which may result even from the scratch of a pin in the laundry tub, keep a very weak mixture of carbolic and water handy. Pour this on a cloth, and wrap round the wound after careful washing.

Damp sawdust sprinkled on a dusty floor before sweeping will prevent the dust from rising. It may also be used as a protection when a room is being painted and it is not convenient to take up the linoleum. A thick layer of sawdust will absorb any paint that may be spilled.

### Singing Cave

Most people have heard of the Whispering Gallery which surrounds the dome of St. Paul's Cathedral. But few living beyond the borders of the Black Country know that there is a Singing Cave in the grounds of Dudley Castle. The cave does not sing, any more than the famous gallery whispers; but by some accident in its construction, the sounds of voices ring round its cavernous walls and become possessed of such sweetness and power as to make the cave a place of enchantment.

The tomb of the wife of Sulla, in the Roman Campagna, will repeat a line of poetry which takes two and a half seconds to utter.

In a cave in the Pantheon at Rome the visitor, by only flapping his coat, can create an echo like the report of a big gun; while in the famous Leaning Tower of Pisa the sound of musical notes, either sung or played on an instrument, are so repeated and amplified that it almost seems as though an organ were playing.

Tennyson wrote his famous lyric, "The Splendour Falls," after hearing the famous bugle-echo at Killarney. A bugle blast is echoed and re-echoed from the hills till it sounds as though a hundred bugles were blowing.

If the famous Manai Suspension Bridge is taken down, as is possible, to be replaced by something more substantial, not only will a bridge be destroyed, but also a famous echo. The sound of a hammer is repeated from each supporting crossbeam in the bridge, and finally from the opposite pier 576 feet away.

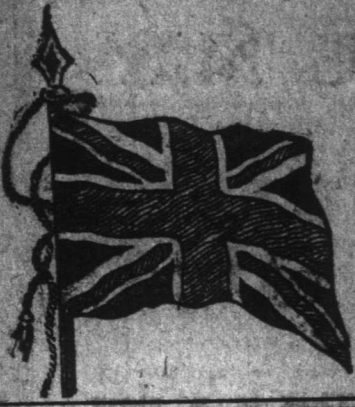

### Victory.

Less than four weeks ago, the Liberal-Conservative Party did not exist. To-day it has won a hard-fought contest at the polls, and the Leader of that Party, Mr. Walter S. Monroe, will be Prime Minister of Newfoundland in the course of a few days. What Mr. Monroe's majority will be cannot be made known before the end of the week, but that it will be substantial is apparent from the state of the poll as we go to press.

That the Liberal-Conservative Party should have won is little short of miraculous, when it is realized that a few short weeks ago the party had not been born. It was organized in three days, and within one week of its inception had thirty-six men in the field to combat the well-organized forces of Coaker and Hickman.

The victory of the Monroe Party is positive proof of the truth of the slogan: "The Country needs a Change," which was consistently used by the Telegram during the brief campaign. The country has shown that it appreciated the need of a change and has voted accordingly.

In Mr. Monroe the country will have a Prime Minister in whom the utmost reliance may be placed; a man whose reputation is such as to merit the respect and confidence of the entire public; one who will always labor in the best interest of his country; and finally, a man who may be fully trusted to carry out his promise of "Clean-up, Keep Clean and a Square Deal to all!"

### Clean Politics.

The recent election has been significant of many things, and not the least of these, is the fact that a party waging a clean fight, and supported by a clean press, can completely defeat abusive opponents who make use of filthy and vile campaign literature.

The Monroe Party may well feel proud of their victory, which is now assured. Particularly should they be pleased because, throughout the campaign they have lived up to their profession of clean politics.

The Government Party were not content with the amount of space which one newspaper provided for the abuse of their opponents. They published also, a morning sheet, one of these mushroom rags which have on other occasions been produced solely for election purposes, to die suddenly at the close of the campaign.

In spite of these two papers, despite too, of the filthy campaign literature which was so freely distributed, the Government Party has met defeat.

This, then, is proof of the fact that the people of Newfoundland do not want newspapers in their homes which are unfit for their families to read, and which, if all published in them were believed, act as a deterrent to the moral and economic education of the people instead of advancing it. Let us hope that the 1924 election has ousted unclean journalism from the public life of Newfoundland.

The count for Harbor Grace, which began in the forenoon, concluded at 5 o'clock, resulting in the return of two Monroe candidates, Messrs. Russell and Bennett, and Mr. A. E. Hickman, leader of the Government. The total vote polled was 375 less than last year.

### BURIN.

At ten o'clock last night the first bulletin from Burin was received, showing the two Hickman candidates leading. This was soon reversed, however, and to the end the Monroe candidates led with a small margin. Harris, who headed the poll last year, lost his seat to Long by 11 votes.

The count in St. John's East and West began yesterday afternoon. From the start the Monroe candidates had a big lead, leaving no doubt whatever as to the result.

### Circular Explained

#### MOSDELL ACCUSED OF ALTERING COPY.

MESSERS. KEEGAN AND BARTLETT PLEAD IGNORANCE OF DOCUMENTS.  
Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir—As rumours are current that we knowingly took to Conception Bay the leaflets that have been the subject of so much discussion the past two or three days, we would like in justification of ourselves and others to state the exact facts regarding the matter.  
On Friday night after the meeting of the Government candidate in the West End, had closed, Messrs. Cloutier and Joy of the Advocate Office prepared a leaflet dealing with the disturbances that took place, this leaflet to be for distribution in Conception Bay, and Saturday morning a press copy of it was shown to Mr. Bartlett, who read it in approval of it. Mr. Keegan was present. We have this copy which is unobjectionable from a party view point, contains no offensive reference to any class or creed, and was similar to the headlines in the Campaign papers and to other campaign literature in this and previous elections. It was almost word for word a report of the meeting as given in Saturday's Advocate and we saw no objection to its use for circulation in Conception Bay.  
On Saturday afternoon, as we were going to Conception Bay we called at the Advocate office to take a stock of political material, newspapers, manifestos, etc. and were given a package which we understood contained the approved leaflet of the morning. We delivered some of these in Brigas and Bay Roberts, not reading them, as we thought they were the same as the approved copy and brought the balance to Harbour Grace where we arrived Saturday night. On arrival at Harbour Grace, we took all the political material into our room in the Hotel and locked it up, and went at once to Mr. Hickman's meeting. This was not over until nearly midnight and it was too late then to distribute the material and we intended to do it next day. At nine o'clock Sunday morning Mr. Cloutier called us up from St. John's and asked us if we had delivered the leaflets and we said we had done so. He asked us if we had read it and we replied we had not, and asked him what was the matter. He then told us that after the leaflet had been given to the printer in the Advocate's Office, Dr. Mosdell had read the original, proof and he remarked it was not half stiff enough, and then made various alterations in it, amongst these changes were the following:  
Where the words, "Some drunken men caused interruption," Dr. Mosdell introduced the phrase "A gang of drunken Sinn Feiners." Further on the words "Sinn Fein gangsters" were used, still further on the words "Church of England" were introduced to identify Mr. Dowden, and still further on the phrase "The drunken Sinn Fein gangsters" was again introduced.  
Mr. Cloutier told us also that after Dr. Mosdell had made these alterations the printer made these changes in the type and the leaflet was printed as Dr. Mosdell had amended it. It was in this form and unknown to either of us that the leaflets were made up in the package given to us. Mr. Cloutier advised us that the amended leaflet ought not to be circulated and to try and gather in any that may have been delivered and burn the whole lot.  
In the meantime we had shown the leaflet to Mr. Hickman who ordered it destroyed immediately and having informed him where we had left the leaflet on our way through the district he immediately telephoned to have them destroyed, and started in his car through the district to see it was carried out.  
This statement represents the exact truth, so far as we are concerned and shall make affidavits to that effect.

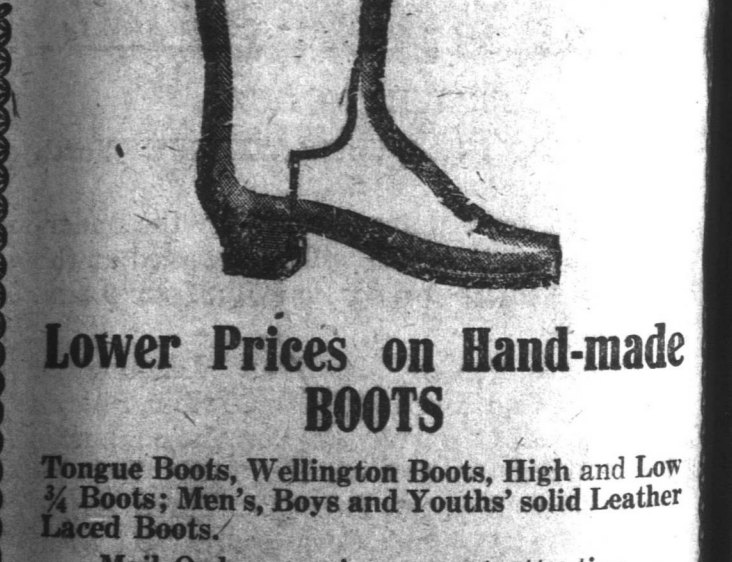

## Premier Herriot of France Assured of a Working Majority

### No Progress Made at Anglo-Russian Conference--Rains in England Cause Heavy Floods--Much Live Stock Lost and Big Property Damage.

#### HERIOT WILL HAVE WORKING MAJORITY.

PARIS, June 3. While the Governmental crisis continues to be acute, prospective Premier Herriot is at least assured of a working majority in the Chamber of Deputies, through the decision of the Socialist Party Congress which in the early hours of the morning unanimously adopted a resolution pledging him Socialist support. The question of President Millerand's tenure of office, however, remains confused as before. The only thing which appears certain being that he will resist to the end all efforts to force him out. Doubt is expressed in some quarters whether the radicals are willing to go far as to create a precedent whereby the President would have to resign whenever the party he favoured was beaten in the elections.

#### ANGLO-RUSSIAN CONFERENCE MAKES NO PROGRESS.

LONDON, June 3. The plenary session of the Anglo-Russian Conference which had been set for to-morrow has been cancelled, at the request of Christian Rakovsky. No date has been set for another meeting of the two delegations, but it is believed the Russians are awaiting the arrival of Maxim Litvinoff, head of the Soviet Trade Missions abroad, who, they hope, will save the conference from the sleeping sickness which it seems threatens it as a result of the six weeks' negotiations which as yet have produced no tangible results.

#### FLOODS IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, June 3. Floods described as the worst in forty years have followed heavy rains in England, the Midlands and North of England are suffering most. Several persons are reported drowned. Much livestock has been destroyed and the property damage is heavy. Many farms having been inundated. Forecasters hold out little hope of immediate relief, indicating that more rain may be expected.

#### WEALTHY DEGENERATES.

CHICAGO, June 3. Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, confessed slayers of Robert Franks, spent the night in jail while prosecutors and detectives sought to connect them with at least one other murder. Another elaboration of their Jekyll and Hyde existence is that they were honour graduate students at the University of Chicago by day and seekers after the Theophrastus Laboratory of life by night, satiating their jaded appetites of 19 years only, with death. The youthful kidnapers, and slayers, both prospective heirs to millions, still maintain their only motives in killing the 13 year old Franks boy was experimental adventure and the hope of obtaining \$10,000 ransom demanded from Jacob Franks, the retired multi-millionaire pawn broker and manufacturer.

#### REDUCING THE AGE LIMIT FOR WOMEN.

The standing committee of the House of Commons to-day approved the fixing of 21 years as the age at which women may vote and thereby brought a step closer to the passage of the Admonition Bill, whereby four and a half million British women will be able to exercise the vote at the polls. At present only women of 30 and older are able to vote.

#### THE MAURETANIA'S RECORD.

SOUTHAMPTON, June 3. When the Mauretania left New York on May 31st, she began her 30th crossing of the Atlantic, and on docking will have completed one million miles of steaming. It is claimed that the Mauretania has already steamed a greater distance, and carried more passengers, than any other transatlantic liner in commission.

#### BORDEN WILL NOT BE BOUNDARY COMMISSIONER.

LONDON, June 3. Sir Robert Borden, former Canadian Prime Minister, will not be chairman of the Commission to fix the boundaries between Northern and Southern Ireland, according to the London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian. Correspondence with Sir Robert on the matter is closed, and though, strictly speaking, he may not have refused the appointment he at any rate is not available therefor.

#### BANDITS ASK BIG RANSOM MONEY.

LONDON, June 3. The Evening News to-day printed a despatch from Hong Kong, China, declaring that the bandits who recently seized a motor boat owned by the American Southern Baptist Mission at Wuchow, and captured A. A. Jeffrey, and three of his fellow missionaries, have offered to release Rex Ray, of the Southern Baptist Mission, and H. F. Card, of Australia on condition that

there be delivered within a fortnight a large sum of money, a hundred Mauser pistols, a thousand rifles and a large quantity of ammunition, as a ransom. Rev. R. A. Jeffrey, Canadian head of the Christian Missionary Alliance at Wuchow, and Dr. H. G. Miller, a United States citizen, attached to the same organization, who were also captured by the bandits, were reported to have been released, in a message from Shanghai, Sunday. Rev. Mr. Jeffrey is a native of Toronto.

#### KING'S HORSE WITHDRAWN.

LONDON, June 3. Something of a sensation in racing circles and much disappointment to the general public has been caused by the decision, announced to-day, not to run King George's horse, Knight of the Garter in the Derby to-morrow, owing to slight lameness.

#### CANADIAN FISHERY RETURNS.

OTTAWA, June 3. The total catch of sea fish on both coasts of the Dominion during April was 24,000,890 pounds, valued at \$1,185,453, compared with 16,704,609 lbs. valued at \$922,210, during the month of April 1923, says the Department of Marine and Fisheries. On the Atlantic Coast there were 12,771,700 pounds of cod haddock, hake and pollock taken, compared with 8,274,500 pounds, in April 1923. The catch of cod shows an increase of 4,796,200 pounds. The Lunenburg fleet returned during the month from their spring trips and reported good catches.

#### An Episcopal Visit to Bell Island

On Saturday afternoon the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland left the city on an episcopal visit to Bell Island. The S.S. Pawnee made a special trip with the rector of Bell Island and some of the leading members of his congregation to meet the Bishop. On the arrival of the boat at the island, the Bishop inspected the "T. Co. of the Church Ladies' Brigade (the Bell Island Co.), which was drawn up at the station under Major Lindsay and Lieut. Gove. The Company and the people assembled cheering as the Bishop drove off in a motor to the rectory. In the evening the Bishop and his Chaplain, the rector of St. Michael and All Angels, St. John's, were taken for a drive around the mining area, a break being made in order that the Bishop might inspect the prospective site for the building of a new Church, which is being contemplated, and to visit the Mission Chapel at the Mines.

On Sunday the Bishop was present at Holy Communion at 8 a.m. and at 11 the Holy Eucharist was sung, the sermon being preached by the Rector of St. Michael's, St. John's, the Bishop giving the Blessing. In the afternoon the Bishop administered the Sacrament of Confirmation at St. Mary's Church, Lance Cove, to the 87 candidates presented.

The Church at Lance Cove stands amidst very attractive surroundings and is very well kept, giving the impression of care and regard for holy things—an impression that was strengthened by the reverend behaviour of the congregation towards their Bishop and in Church.

In the evening the Bishop administered the Sacrament of Confirmation at the Church of St. Boniface, where a large number of candidates from the Mines and from Bell Island were presented. Before the service the candidates were assembled in the school house, and went in procession to the Church, the one hundred and twenty-seven candidates making a very imposing procession. Owing to the large number of candidates, only a representative congregation could attend, many standing during the entire service and many more, unfortunately, were not able to gain admittance. For this service the Rector of Portugal Cove and Rev. E. Bischoff arrived in the afternoon. The Bishop, as his custom is, spoke to the candidates before and after Confirmation, including some remarks addressed to the congregation in general, the key-

words of his Lordship's remarks being the purpose and meaning of the Holy Rite of Confirmation which he had come to administer, what it meant to the candidates personally and what it ought to mean to the Church at Bell Island. He felt that the Rector and Church people on the island had done a fine thing in teaching their children to respect the Church, and this he had felt in the general manner and behaviour shown towards his office as Bishop, and in the preparations they had made for his episcopal visit. On Monday evening the Bishop left for St. John's, having expressed to the Rector of Bell Island his pleasure in the episcopal visit had afforded him.

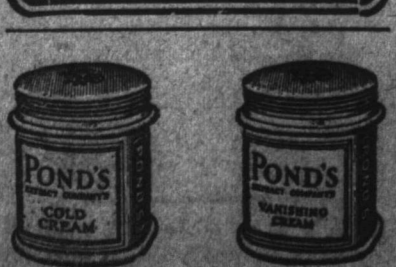

#### FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS

TRAINING FOR FOOTBALL "Heading." This is a comparatively new phase of football, commencing from the time

when skill took the place of force in the game. It is a great saving of time to head the ball, rather than wait until it has reached the ground to be kicked away. Meeting the ball with the top of the head or forehead, the player passes it in the desired direction by a movement of the neck or a slight jump forward. As in all other phases of the game, practice is essential. An expert headed can receive the ball on any part of the head, and pass it accurately in any direction he may choose. Skill in this is decidedly useful to any player on the field, but especially half-backs and backs. High dropping kicks may be returned up the field by a skillful header so quickly as to arrest any forward movement of the opponents' attacking line. Care must be taken when heading a ball from behind an opposing player that you do not charge him in the back, as, for example, heading the ball back after the goalie has kicked, when both teams are facing the kicker. He must not be tackled even until actually in possession of the ball. There is a right and a wrong movement to head a ball, and experience only will teach the aspirant that movement. It is unwise to stoop at all to head a ball. Many times have I seen a player's boot just miss, by inches only, another player's head. It is a highly dangerous practice. Ability to jump in the air adds to success and is the proper demonstration of the art. A good jumper is one that reaches the ball first and obtains the advantage. Forwards can usually employ heading when passing the ball over to another, but the most important use, is that of scoring by means of the head. This is where a high jumper comes in. From the corner kick many excellent chances occur by netting the ball. A sharp turn of the head and the incident is over—a goal! Many first-class centre-forwards are adapts at this trick, most of the goals being the result of headers into the net from the corner kick.

#### LAWN TENNIS

##### "Volleying."

During a rally if you find that the ball is not going over the line marked on the wall, stop and begin again, and do so every time you fail, because that represents the net, and if the ball does not go over the net in a game you lose the point. What you have to obtain is accuracy combined with pace. At first you will find that the rallies are confined to two or three, but gradually you will increase the number to as many as twenty, which is a longer exchange of volleys than one ever sees in a match. Avoid making any practice tedious. Volleying is a most fitting exercise. The wrist is constantly brought into action, whilst your footwork has to be of the quickest. The drudgery in any game is at the beginning. Volleying is not the beginning but the middle degree of lawn tennis, therefore you have reached the stage when variation is necessary. My prescription is as follows: One-half hour in volleying only, divided into low and high, forward and backward, equal time at each. One-half hour of variation from low to high, on the move, so as to ensure feet working properly with your racket. One-half hour of ground shots and volleying mixed up together so as to bring all strokes into play.

## SIDE TALKS.

### THE POOR LOSER.

A poor loser is generally thought of as a man who squeals when he is licked, who claims the fight was wasn't fair, or something like that. I think there is another kind of poor loser, the kind who doesn't know when to lose, as well as how to lose.

I know a man who made a mistake and bought a piece of property in a part of the town which was deteriorating. When he tried to resell, he couldn't get the price he paid for it by several hundred. He wanted very much to sell but he wasn't going to lose all that money, not he. So he kept the property and the estate went on deteriorating. And when he tried to sell again, the price he could get was still less. That loss seemed still more penultimate to him so he hung on a year more. He has been finally forced to sell and the loss is three times what it would have been at first. Besides which, he has been going through a lot of mental turmoil over the matter.

It He Had Only Written It Off. If he could have made up his mind five years ago to take a loss, to write it off his books, to forget it as far as possible, he would be much better off to-day both financially and in the matter of mental wear and tear.

Again I know a man who has been involved in a wretched law suit with one of the members of the family. So far as ethics go, it certainly seems to all who know about it that he is get-

ting a rotten deal. But legally the right is on the other side and the courts have so decided. His own lawyers tell him there is nothing more that they can do for him, and yet he cannot bear to take that loss, and he keeps on fighting in a way that only makes the ultimate loss greater.

### He Punishes Himself.

One can sympathize with the passionate sense of injustice that makes him so bitter, but to keep on this way only means that he will punish himself.

In every fight there is a time to yield and a time to fight. There are circumstances under which to keep on working for a lost cause is stupid; and circumstances under which such action is just plain pigheaded.

There has been a good deal written and said in raise of the bull dog grip, but the bull dog grip is only admirable when it is in the right place.

### Don't Be Afraid To Take A Loss.

Don't be afraid to take a loss once in awhile. Everyone has to. And I don't mean merely losses in money. But in many other things. Arguments, for instance. If someone has the better of you, admit it. Don't try to bolster up one weak inaccurate statement by others. Your loss is greater in the end than if you took it in the first place.

It takes courage to be a good loser, courage and intelligence combined. Properly blended they make a wonderful combination, a combination that may take a loss now and then but in the long run is unbeatable.

### Cutting Scotland in Two

Promoters of the canal which it is proposed to cut across Scotland believe that it will be an incalculable boon to the whole of the United Kingdom.

The proposal for the construction of the canal was first advanced many years ago, but something has always prevented the final plans being put into execution. However, the fact that an enormous volume of trade is being lost to Great Britain, owing to the absence of the canal, is growing more and more apparent, and the Mid-Scotland Ship Canal National Association are doing their utmost for the success of the project.

How does the position stand at the present time? The fact is that Britain blocks the traffic route between a number of large Continental ports and America. Just as vessels which now go through the Panama Canal previously had to make a detour round Cape Horn, so have trade vessels on their way from the old world to the new, or the new world to the old, to go by either the English Channel or the North of Scotland.

By cutting Scotland in two—that is, by constructing a canal from the Firth of Clyde to the Firth of Forth, a distance of only twenty-nine miles!—this loss of time and fuel would be saved.

A ship going from New York to Hamburg, for instance, would save three hundred miles. But it would not be a boon only to the foreign trade. Vessels going from Glasgow to Hull would save over six hundred miles, and the length of most voyages from the east to the west coast, and vice versa, would be almost halved.

The alternative to a twenty-nine miles voyage from the Clyde to the Forth is a three days' steam round the North of Scotland, or through the English Channel.

There is already a Firth and Clyde canal, but it is fitted only for barges, and not ocean-going traffic, and is of comparatively little use.

There are many arguments for and against such a canal. In the first place, while it would involve the expenditure of many millions of pounds, this would, at the same time, help to relieve unemployment, as hundreds of thousands of men would be needed for the work.

Again, it is proposed by mining authorities that on the proposed canal route between Maryhill and Kilmorylie an undeveloped coal-field of 9,000 acres, which might yield 100,000,000 tons of coke and coal. In developing this fertile area still more unemployed could be absorbed.

Two alternative routes are suggested for the new canal, one being by way of Loch Lemond, and if the latter were agreed upon the canal would become an attraction for tourists.

Authorities declare that in comparison with the Panama Canal, the construction of this new Scottish waterway would be mere child's play, and there is a precedent in the Manchester Ship Canal, which carries comparatively heavy traffic and has resulted in turning into a port the inland city of Cottonopolis.

Confident that such a waterway would bring a wave of prosperity to the country, the Ship Canal Association have asked the Government to appoint engineers to examine the direct route, which extends from Yoker to Grangemouth, and the Prime Minister is being urged to have a report made on the advantages of such a canal and its cost.

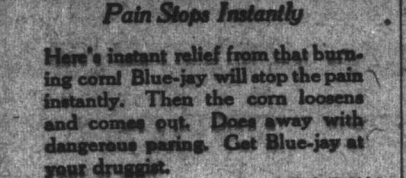

### Spies of the Post Office

**DETECTIVES WHO TRACE WRONG DOERS THROUGH THEIR LETTERS.**

In a recent case of cocaine importing it was stated that certain incriminating letters from Continental traffickers in the Post Office.

Such an admission is rarely made in a court of law, because the idea is fostered that all matter sent by royal mail is inviolate; but, as a matter of fact, no small part of the work done by the detective staff employed in the Post Office consists in examining suspected correspondence.

Some people who "know things" adopt special precautions in carrying on correspondence. The higher grade of professional criminals, for instance, often write in cipher, and in exceptional cases they correspond entirely by arbitrary signs, such as folding a blank sheet of paper in a particular way.

**Wrongly Convicted.** It is not uncommon, again, for people to secure an envelope by a seal of intricate design, though this device, in common with most of the others, is ineffective. If necessary, the most elaborate seal can easily be forged by taking a cast of the impression. But the usual practice in all post-offices, British and foreign, is to have a seal intact, slit open the end of the envelope with a sharp knife, and after the enclosure has been dealt with, reseal the end with a fine layer of some adhesive preparation.

If an envelope is found to contain anything useful to the police or other authorities, the whole letter is generally photographed, and then set out in the usual way. Occasionally, however, the original is retained, and a copy delivered to the addressee.

A remarkable instance of this procedure took place some years ago. During the "milking" of a suspected person's correspondence, there came to hand a letter written by a man who virtually confessed that he had committed a crime for which another man was serving a term of penal servitude. Subsequently a movement was set on foot with a view to securing the release of the unfortunate convict; but before a free pardon

could be obtained for him he died in prison. Professional criminals are not the only persons whose correspondence is likely to be "milked." If your mail suddenly became unusually large, it would be examined surreptitiously, and if it disclosed anything illegal it might be stopped.

It, again, you should be "wanted," all letters to and from your friends and relatives would become objects of postal espionage, and a single sentence—say, a word—in one of them might bring about your arrest. It was this, that Read, the Southern murderer, "fell."

So it is in connection with political crime, as the Invincible discovered "It is a question vital to us," he writes, "that sealed letters in an English post-office be, as we all fancied they were, respected as things sacred; that opening of men's letters, a practice nearly of him to pick men's pockets and in other still slier, and far slier forms of scoundrelism, be not resorted to in England."

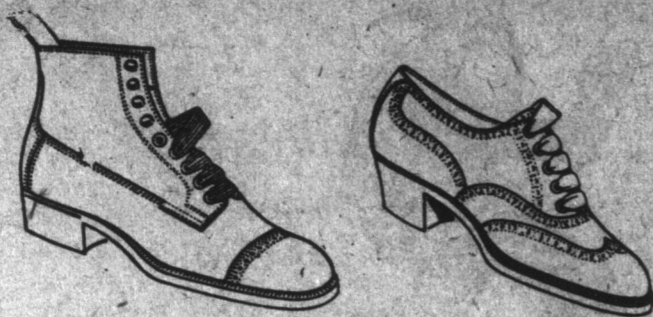

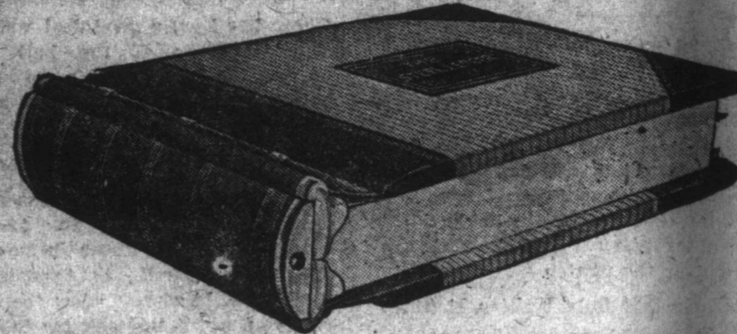
