500.000, less miscellaneous profits of approximately £24,500,000 - arising out of the commission's trading operations. Purchases made by the Royal Com-

mission on British account solely, and on British account through the Wheat Executive, on which the commission and the French and Italian Governments were represented, totalled £587,000,000. Trading operations were not confined to wheat and flour. but included maize, oats, barley, rye, rice and other cereals.

Purchases Cost £ 512,670,000. The purchases of cereals made on behalf of the Wheat Executive amounted to £512,670,000 excluding freight and insurance. The Wheat Executive also purchased some 8,000 .-000 tons of wheat, rice, oats, and other cereals on behalf of neutrals and the smaller Allies.

The report stated that the only outstanding accounts included sundry creditors £718,911, and sundry debtors estimated to realise £40,000. The purchases of cereals made on behalf of the Wheat Executive amounted to £512,670,000, excluding freight and insurance. The Wheat Executive also purchased some 8 .other cereals on behalf of neutrals and 000 000 tons of wheat, rice, oats, and the smaller Allies.

The report states that the only outstanding accounts include sundry reditors £718,911, and sundry debtors estimated to realise £40.000. The final estimated cost of the salaries and expenses of the commission and of its landed grain committees since its inception in 1916, including services rendered by other departments, is £1,718,000.





Her crew of six is changed monthly, but they get their letters daily from the Trinity House boat.






