The following extract is taken from a letter written by a gentleman who has spent thirteen years on the boundary between Rupert's Land and Labrador, in the employ of the Hudson Bay Company, and is dated New Brunswick Post, Rupert's Land, Jan. 10, 1872. Coming from a country about which very little is known, either of the inhabitants or its general appearance, we doubt not it will prove interesting to our readers.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Emigrants at New York.
The Geneva Conference.
Pittsburg, April 2.—Gov. Geary to-day signed the bill consolidating the south side boroughs with the City of Pittsburg, thereby adding 30,000 to its population.
London, April 2.—The number of emigrants which left the British Isles during the month of March exceeds that of February by seven thousand.
New York, April 3.—The Tribune's Washington special says that Earl Granville's despatch contains no threat on the part of Great Britain to withdraw her share from the Geneva Conference if the American case is not modified. On the other hand it seems that should no further correspondence take place the British Government will file its answer to our case on a day set a part, and allow Britain to go on holding, at the moment, a formal protest that the Geneva Conference has no jurisdiction over consequential damages.

Temperance Lectures

Rev. A. Sutherland, President of the Ontario Temperance and Prohibitionary League, delivered a lecture in the Town Hall, on Tuesday evening, on the subject of the prohibition of the liquor traffic. The attendance was the largest we have ever seen at any previous lecture, the hall being crowded to the roof. Rev. Mr. Lewis occupied the chair, and after devotional exercises, introduced the speaker of the evening.
Mr. Sutherland began by remarking that the subject was exceedingly well worn, and it required much alacrity to interest an audience in this particular. He said that he was glad to see the subject so well worn, because it showed that there was a place for everything and everything should be in its proper place. This saying was sadly mis-constructed in the liquor traffic. The proper place for all intoxicating liquors was among the drugs, and amongst the most poisonous.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Maple Leaf Base Ball Club was held in the Queen's Hotel, on Tuesday evening, and was very largely attended. Mr. T. H. Taylor, Vice-President, occupied the chair.
Mr. Wm. Sunley presented the Treasurer's report as follows:—
I have much pleasure in presenting the annual report of the Guelph Maple Leaf Club. This season, as will be seen, the finances are in a prosperous condition, to which the Club has good cause for congratulation, there being few, if any, clubs in the Dominion commencing this season with as good a balance in their favour. The balance shown is \$322 65, but there are some small claims yet to be discharged which will make the surplus say in round numbers \$300. I sincerely hope whoever may have charge of the affairs of this club the coming season will be able at the next annual meeting to report as good a balance, if not better, in our favour. Also, that we may have the champion silver ball as our own undoubted property, which no doubt will be a source of gratification to every well wisher of this club.

A meeting of those interested in the promotion of the scheme for building a railway from Guelph to Orangeville and Collingwood was held in the Queen's Hotel on Tuesday night. The Mayor in the chair, Mr Guthrie acting as Secretary.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

A despatch from London on Tuesday says: It is announced that the Right Hon. Lord Lisgar, Governor of Canada, will shortly be called home, and will be succeeded by the Right Hon. Earl of Dufferin, now Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

The Railway Grants.

A few days ago we gave the Order in Council, promising, with the assent of the Legislature, a grant of \$2,250,000 to the W. G. & B. Railway Company on that portion of the Southern Extension line from Wingham to Kincardine, on condition that they give the London, Huron and Bruce Company, and the Toronto Grey, & Bruce Company running powers over that portion of the line.

The omission to grant all to that portion of the Southern Extension line between the two points above designated, is very much regretted by the people of Hamilton, and the people of the Toronto and Grey, and Bruce Railway Company, and to the people of the townships of Wallace, Elgin, Grey and Morris, who have already voted four thousand dollars per mile to aid in building the Southern Extension line from Palmerston to Wingham.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

The Easter Monday review took place at Brighton, about 20,000 volunteers were on the ground. In a military sense it was considered a failure.

The 300th Anniversary of the Revolt of the Netherlands was celebrated throughout Holland on Monday. There was a grand review and procession. Mr Motley was present.

We have received a cable despatch announcing the death in London yesterday, of the Rev. Professor Maurice, the leader of the "Broad" section of the Church of England and an author of high reputation.

BRADLAUGH lectured at Glasgow, on Monday night and advocated Republicanism. A riot ensued, and an attack was made on the building he occupied. One policeman was seriously injured.

The men in Copp, Clark & Co. and McLeish & Co.'s printing offices, Toronto, have returned to work under the rule adopted at the meeting of the Master Printers' Association, which allows men in job offices and in composing rooms to fix their own

hours—they getting paid accordingly.

SOUTH PERTH REFORM CONVENTION.—An adjourned convention of the Reformers of South Perth met on Tuesday. There were several nominations but all were withdrawn except those of Mr James Corcoran of Stratford, and Mr James Boyd of Prescott.
