wood to see a young lady that was there. He asked her to go to Peterboro' with him and she refused, saying you had bet-ter go and take care of your poor wife and children. With this he drew a revolver and shot her in the breast. She screamed and ran towards the door, when Nesbit shot again and the ball went through the heart, she fell across the doorstep. The servant hearing the shots came in to see what was the matter and found him with his arms around her crying. She ran out to give the alarm and brought three or four men into the house. Nesbit had field. The chief constable was apprised of the matter and was soon on the alert. At about nine o'clock he entered the Lindsay Hotel and found that the pris-oner was in bed up in the third story. He quickly ascended and opened the door of the room and the prisoner made no de-fence. The handouffs were clasped and the prisoner marched to a place of secur-ity. The greatest excitement prevails.
