NNISFAIL, April 14-"That statement is absolutely untrue and Mr. Michener knows it. I denied it before and I repeat the denial now. Mr. Michener has documents in his possession proving what I say." Plainly and emphatically Premier Sifton last night again denied the statement being made by Mr. Michener, leader of the Conservative party, that the Edmonton, Dunvegan and B. C. railroad tapped timber limits owned by Theodore Bur-rows, a brother-in-law of Clifford Sifton, brother of the premier. Mr. Sifton had more than his mere words for his reply to the opposition leader. He exhibited a telegram received from Mr. Burrows a few days ago when

the statement first becau to be made in public. The exact wording of this telegram, sent from Winnipeg is as follows: "I never was interested, directly or indirectly, in any timber north or west of the Athabasca river or in any timber tributary to McArthur's Peace River road or the Great Waterways railroad. I am a shareholder in the Phoenix Lumber company which owns some limits in township 57 and 58, ranges 3 and 4, west of the 5th; also in townships 59 and 60, ranges 7, 8 and 9, west of 5th. All the timber owned by this company is on the North Saskat-chewan, on the Brazeau and Pembina and a small area on the Grand Trunk between Edson and Brule lake. I own no real estate in Alberta except three quarter sections near Wainwright. I own some shares in an operating mine in Lethbridge. Aside from these I have no interests of any kind in Alberta. (Signed) THEODORE A. BURROWS."

"That should answer the statement," continued the premier. "It is absolutely untrue that this road taps on those limits. As a matter of fact the nearest the Edmonton, Dunvegan and B. C. road, which is the McArthur road mentioned in the telegram, comes to those limits is 18 miles from the first one and 40 miles from the other one. The Canadian Northern comes closer to the limits than any other road. If Mr. Michener really wanted to know where the Edmonton, Dunvegan and B. C. road goes and what limits it taps he could easily get it by going to the land office where his friends are, but apparently he does not want correct information, preferring rather to give false statements.

The present policy of the opposition, since R. B. Bennett got the retainer fee from the Royal Bank, was for the province to come through with a quarter of a million dollars to some person to settle the whole affair.

THE remarkable progress which has been made by the technical classes comprising Calgary's night schools for industrial education was undoubtedly a revelation to the large audience which attended the closing exercises of this branch of education at Central school last evening.

The numerous exhibits on display were conclusive proof of the efficiency of the instructors and the diligent work of the pupils. The principal address of the evening was delivered by Dr. Mac-

The points particularly brought out in his address were that Rae boys and girls are permitted to discontinue their education at too early a period in life, and that our present system of education did not afford the coming generation a sufficient training with which to cope with foreign countries such as Germany for commercial and industrial suppremacy.

Dr. MacRae cited the fact that in Germany the education of the students dove-tailed as it were with the industrial vocations to follow, so that the highest standards of efficiency were thereby attained. In the United States and Canada the loss in national wealth hy reason of children leaving school at too early an age was appalling, and if something were not done to remedy this evil we would eventually be outclassed by our foreign competitors in every branch of modern civilization.

Dr. MacRae summed the whole gist of his speech up in the short sentence that: "The efficiency of the nation depends upon the efficiency of the individual."



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

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
THE NEW YORK MARKET Demand for Stocks Sufficient to Absorb Offering and Pre-vent General Break


