

As the Special Commission for the Trial of persons suspected of Treason and Treasonable Practices has closed in this, it becomes necessary to indulge in some general remarks on the result of its investigations. All the principal traitors petitioned to the act must be granted inasmuch as the life of the prisoner is concerned; but those who had any hopes of getting clear threw themselves upon the country for trial, six of whom have consequently been convicted and three condemned. The question now discussed is whether or not the sentence will be executed. As the trials took place merely for ascertaining their guilt or innocence--not f.om any desire to single them out as the most prominently guilty—it seems unreasonable to suppose that they will be denied those benefits which are secured to their equally guilty confederates. Their standing trial was of their own choice—thinking they might possible get clear should they refuse to acknowledge their guilt. Ordered by the Board that from and after the first day o July next, in order to introduce a uniform system of Education in this District, Teachers will be required to introduce into their respective Schools, Lennie's Child's A. B. C., Lennie's Child's Ladder, Chamber's Township of Southwold, one hundred tor. Moral Class Book, Stewart's Geography, & Lennie's English Grammar. And in order that these Books may he furnished as cheaply as possible, the Board have ordered from Edinburgh, a supply of them which will be sold at cost to Teachers and Parents of Children. The use however of the Moral Class Book will not be insisted upon, although it is hoped that it will be voluntarily introduced.



CHEAP COLORING FOR WALLS. It may not be generally known, that blue vitrol, mixed with lime, forms a very beautiful as well as exceedingly cheap coloring matter for walls. Take good lime and slack it as is usual, one and a half pounds of blue vitrol, dissolve the chrystals with boiling water, when dissolved mix it with the whitewash. and add one pound of glue well dissol-This should be prepared in a burned or scorched. When well mixed, the first coat must be put on horizontally, or from side to side, and the second coat vertically, or up and down. The wall will be of a bright blue color. resembling the blue bottles sometimes seen in apothecary shops. By fellowing these directions, women can put on the coloring as smoothly and as well, generally, as men.


