London, Nov. 3.—The blue book of the Colonial conference does not add much to what is already known. The resolu-tion on the subject of preferential trade the report. In that resolution the con-ference recognizes that preferential trade between the United Kingdom and the colonies would stimulate and facilitate commerce, and strengthen the Empire, commerce, and strengthen the Empire, but it presents that owing to circumstances in the colonies it would not be practicable to adopt a general systems of free trade; that with a view, however, to promoting an increase of trade within the Empire, it is desirable that colonies which have not already adopted such a policy should as far as their circumstances permit give substantial preferential treatment to the products and manufactures of the United Kingdom, Four premiers urge an Imperial grant to colonial products and manufactured. to colonial products and manufactures, giving preferential treatment to the United Kingdom by exemption from or reduction of duties.

Five premiers present at the conference undertake to submit to their respective governments at the earliest opportunity a request that such measures portunity a request that such measures be taken as may be necessary to give effect to the principle or this resolution.

A memorandum from the president of the Board of Trade shows that the premiers were prepared to recommend preferential treatment on British goods as follows: Qanada, the existing preference of 33 1-3 per cent., and an additional preference on selected articles by reducing duties in favor of the United Kingdom, raising duties on foreign imports and placing duties on certain foreign imports now free. New Zealand 10 per cent. all round, a reduction on the present duties on British goods. Cape Colony and Natal, 25 per cent. preference on British goods; Australia was not in a position to define the extent of the preference to be given.



Mr. Sorby discussed the sewerage question in all its technical phases—a report of which would be quite unintelligible to Colonist readers. He thought, in respect to the flushing system that two pumping stations ought to be established so that the water could be pumped to the higher levels and flow to the sea by gravitation.

Mr. Sorby mentioned a fault in the present system, notably on Government street. In this instance the sewer was laid on the Western side of the thoroughfare, and the consequence was that when people on the "near" side of the street wished to connect with the sewer they were at a much less expense than those who had to make connections from the 'far' side.
