w the Jury is Reported to Stand-Eleven Consider Him Sane and Responsible—Trying to Borrow \$500 from Don Cameron. Washington, Dec. 29. — Yesterday Judge Cox, at the request of Corkhill, di-

rectly reversed his ruling of Tuesday in regard to what was collateral evidence and ontradiction of one expert by another. Yesterday as the assassin was marched out of court to the van there was hooting and jeering for the first time for weeks. This coming right upon Corkhill's demand

He had never seen a case where insane men, after committing a crime, paraded his insanity and gave it as an excuse for his order.

MAN AND WIFE KILLED HOW A G. T. R. LOCOMOTIVE RUN DOWN TO DEATH THE COUPLE.

The Terrible End of a Pickering Farmer and

Another has been added to the long list of accidents which have occurred at the junction of King street and the Grand Trunk railway. George Valentine, a Pickthen ering farmer, and his wife were coming into town last night with a horse and eight reached the Grand Trunk crossing. The horse had crossed clear of the track when an engine, backing southward, struck the buggy with tremendous force, knocking the body of it into a ditch twenty-five feet from the track on the south side of the Kingston road while other portions were scattered down the track. Valentine was thrown into the ditch under the body of the buggy while the woman was flung head first through a fence on the south side of the road, breaking one of the boards. When picked up she was quite dead, her head being fearfully bruised by the terrible blow it had received. A boy named Harrison was the first to arrive on the scene and stop the horse, which escaped uninjured. P. C. Willis came up soon afterwards. It requires no argument to demonstate that there is much room for reform in many directions. Our street system is perfectly disgraceful and is rendered infinitely worse by the impunity with which the street railway company is allowed to trample on the rights of the citizens. The work which the board of health is supposed to do is also shamefully neglected, and all this while the taxation is kept at a rate which, if there were no improper leakages, would secure the efficient mance of the needed work. The neglect of duty in these respects and in sev. eral other directions, notably in the burnt contract business, constitute good reasons, if not for preferring new candidates to the members of the present council in every case, at least for demanding from every member of the present board who may be seeking election that he shall demonstrate that he is free from blame in the matter.

But the electors should not merely look to the past to guide them in the choice of servants. There is much which requires reform and the electors should carefully ascertain which of the rival candidates has the best plans for the future; which of them best understands how the future policy of the city should be shaped. Let the electors question the candidates as to how they each propose to amend our street and waterworks systems, ask them whether they intend to continue the present outrageously expensive system of. maintaining an army of scavengers it. driving corporation horses. In a word make sure that the candidate knows what he city requires and is prepared to act on that knowledge honestly.


