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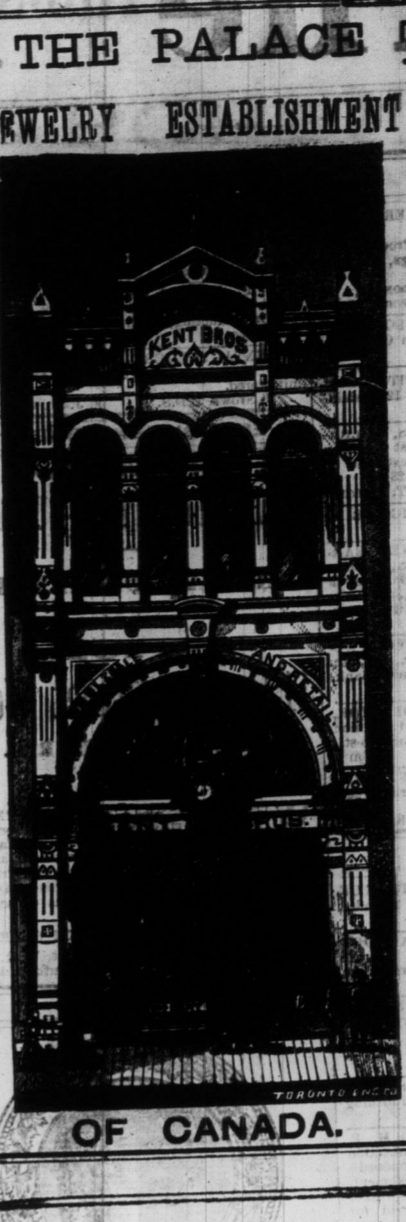

Monument to the Prince Imperial. The erection of the monument to the memory of the late Prince Imperial is rapidly approaching completion on the green in front of the Royal military academy at Woolwich-common. The larger of the two blocks of polished granite which will form the pedestal and on which the statue of the unfortunate prince will stand, will bear the following inscription: "Napoleon, Prince Imperial. Born in Paris March 16, 1856. Killed fighting in South Africa June 1, 1879. Gentleman cadet Royal military academy from Nov. 18, 1875, to Feb. 16, 1876. Erected by upwards of 25,000 officers and men from all branches of her majesty's forces. The statue will be of bronze, and rather larger than life-size. The granite blocks will also bear four bronze eagles, four wreaths encircling the letter "N," and surmounted by a crown and the motto of the Royal artillery.
