LETTER FROM CHAS. BRADLAUGH, M.P. FOR BRISTOL.

Editorial - The World Complimented for its interest in the subject of the Trades Parliament. At the usual meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night, President Parr in the chair, Mr. Bradlaugh admitted the report of the Legislative Committee, which had been a reference to the correspondence with Mr. Chas. Bradlaugh, M.P. for Bristol.

Mr. O'Donnell: Dear Sir, I am in receipt of your letter of the 4th inst. which enclosed the report of the House of Commons member of the select committee on the Immigration into England, Scotland and Ireland. I shall be very pleased to be the medium of laying before the committee any statement of the Trades and Labor Council with reference to the Immigration into Canada. Such a statement would be printed as an appendix to the report and would be a valuable contribution to the press. I will put a question in the House of Commons on the subject of the Immigration into Canada with reference to the statement of the Trades and Labor Council.

The report was adopted, and the World's article on Immigration was read by request. The Municipal Committee's report was submitted by Delegate Geo. Watson. It regretted the result of the inquiry into the question of special commissioners being appointed to try juvenile offenders, supported the same, and asked for a further inquiry into the matter of the Municipal Committee's report on the examination of the Waterside Commission's accounts.

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CANADIAN TO AMERICAN TOBACCO.

What the Toronto Dealers Told The World Yesterday.

In Toronto's World was printed a paragraph in which it was stated that the Canadian smoker, whenever he crossed the border, invariably bought a large stock of tobacco for his use, as he considered it cheaper than at home. In other words that he could buy as much tobacco and as many cigarettes in the United States for 25 cents as he could buy in Canada for 30 cents. The World interviewed several of the city tobacconists with reference to this statement and their several opinions are as follows:

L. Stewart, 72 Yonge-street, said that generally any Canadian who visits the States could buy American-made tobacco cheaper than he could obtain the same in any Canadian city. If the Canadian, during his visit to the States, preferred to smoke Canadian-made tobacco he would probably find it more than at home. The same rule applied to American visiting Canada. The imported leaf was allowed into Canada duty free, but the United States imposed a duty of 30 cents and 10 cents, the latter rate being demanded on Sumatra and other tobacco that required over 100 lbs. to the pound. As far as the duty on cigars is concerned, the rate was the same in Canada as in the United States. The American rate paid into the revenues \$2.00 per lb. and 20 cents ad valorem on cigars, while in Canada the charges were \$3.00 per lb. and 20 cents ad valorem.

Mr. John Wilson, 124 York-street, was positive that the smoker could get a better cigar in the States than in Canada. He said that the United States was only an imported market for the American tobacco, but that the United States, in order to encourage and protect the tobacco grower, had imposed a very high duty on the Cuban leaf and the American cigar, and consequently an imported cigar was dearer across the line than in Canada. A higher class of smoking tobacco could be obtained in the States than in the United States, and it was only in chewing tobacco that the Americans made the better showing.

Mr. Goldstein's tobacco and cigar store, 33 King-street, was also positive that the smoker could get a better cigar in the States than in Canada. He said that the United States was only an imported market for the American tobacco, but that the United States, in order to encourage and protect the tobacco grower, had imposed a very high duty on the Cuban leaf and the American cigar, and consequently an imported cigar was dearer across the line than in Canada.

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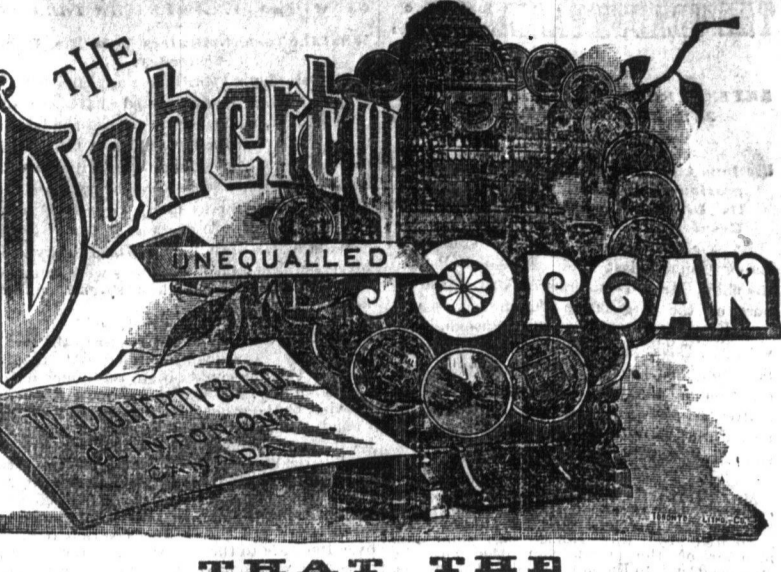
