WAZER AS AN ANESTHETIC.

Carbuncles Removed Without Pain by an Injection of the Liquid.
Burlington, Sept. 3.—A rather remarkable discovery has just been made by Dr. C. L. Blech of this city. He was conducting experiments with a view to determining how weak a solution of cocaine would prove efficacious as a local anesthetic in minor surgical operations, when he stumbled upon the fact that simple water injected under the skin with a syringe renders the flesh at that point insensible to pain. The effect of the water is to create a slight swelling, resembling that caused by a sting. The space marked by the swelling remains insensible to pain for some minutes, so that incisions can be made without causing the slightest pain. What is the use of this discovery will prove of practical worth in surgery cannot yet be determined. Dr. Blech made use of it in the case of a huge carbuncle on the upper thigh. The insertion of the syringe was rendered painless by spraying with ether, and after the injection of water the doctor laid the carbuncle open by cross incision with cocaine and scooped out the dead tissue, the patient feeling no pain. The treatment has no ill effect on the healing of the wound. In this case the cuts recurred and healed perfectly.
