Success in such a suit is at best doubtful as the English law these not remit of the registration of tradedoes not permit of the registration of trade-marks consisting either wholly or in part of words which have reference to royalty. Thus no person can secure any legal protection in the use of such a tallemark, and its use is, consequently free to all.

The statistical position of Sicily oranges is much better than that of lemons. > This is a clear, sharp cut statement of a policy upon which the electorate are invited to give a decision equally definite and decided. Sir Charles declares that his opponents have pronounced for "free trade as it is in England," and the removal of every vestige of protection. These are, doubtless, quotations from the speeches of his distinguished opponent. They voice unquestionably the more prononneed views of Sir Richard Cartwright, who makes no attempt to conceal his decided free trade convictions. But, it is clear from other authoritative utterances, that the electors will not be asked to endorse free trade for Canada, save as an abstract question. The letter sent by Sir Oliver Mowat to the Opposition leader makes this plain, for he remudiates any desire for revolutionary changes in the tariff, and advocates such a moderate advance on reformed tariff lines as would take a generation to bring us within even sight of free trade. But the strong man in the Opposition, the man who will have all to say on the tariff, is Sir Richard Cartwright, and it is as certain as anything in the future can be that he will introduce a very modified tariff.

Perhaps this is not altogether the fault of the young men; because it often looks as if merchants thought that any one was capable of becoming an efficient traveller. More especially do many houses appear to consider that a man may prove a valuable servant to them simply because he has proved an utter failure on his own account. A retailer who has made an assignment—even if it be a particularly bad one—usually considers himself perfectly competent to represent the largest house on the road, and often it looks as if the houses thought so too, because when occasionally one of thes experiments

this kind encourages 100 similar applicants, all of whom believe that they, too, are destined to become a success, and all claim to be equally gifted, equally intelligent, and consequently as sure to succeed as the one out of 100 who has done well. In the majority of cases they do not, and the result is a comparative dearth of really good salesmen, while the houses have their staffs filled up with men who are salesmen only in name.

In its remarks upon this subject, the Bulletin says :-

"If parents who intend their sons for commercial pursuits would first In an article upon this subject, the give them a fair common school education, and it possible something higher, then take them to some reliable and progressive concern and place them under the charge of those who would instill into their minds principles of probity, industry, care and watchfulness; if these young men were taught the details of office work, then placed in the stock and sales room, where they could learn the art and science of selling goods; if they would learn the intrinsic value of the goods that they handle, would post themselves on the mode and manner of their production; if they would look into the question of freight rates and have the opportunity to listen to well-informed business men on matters pertaining to the calling of the mer hant in general, they would soon become fit to go out on the road and properly, worthly and profitably rep. resent their employers. The great trouble is that young men expect to learn all this in a very short time and without giving anything in return to those who teach them. They expect to earn large solaries from the very moment they enter a business house. They forget that in older countries parents pay hundreds of dollars and sign papers binding their children as apprentices for three or four years, with little, if any, pay for learning a lusiness. While in our own country we may laugh at many of the customs that prevail elsewhere, the fact nevertheless remains that one by one we are adopting them, if not in the original form in vogue there, in an adapted manner, suited to the conditions under which we live and do business."

These remarks are equally applicable to Canada. Afready our larger merchants pre er to train their own employes from the moment they leave school to battle with the world. Men intended for commercial vocations require just as careful training as those decuned for professional pursuits, and with a class of men who are a detri- so thoroughly is this fact becoming akin to the English system of apprenhouses.





THE SPRING CROP BULLETIN.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture has issued a condensation of the spring crop bulletin, under date of May 1st. Regarding fall wheat the report says:

"There has not been for many years so unfavorable a report as we have just received. The large majority of our correspondents report extensive destruction by freezing from ice forming on the bare fields. The loss is much heavier on clay than on light sils. A large amount will be plowed up or re-sown to spring grain. The reports from lakes Erie and Ontario, from Windsor to Kingston, are, with very few exceptions, of a most unfavorable nature. In Huron, Grey and part of Simcoe the general report is "thin and patchy." The most favorable reports come from a range of townships beginning in Lambton and running east through parts of Middlesex, Perth, Oxford, Wellington, Dufferin and Simcoe. Putting the very best construction upon the reports the general condition at present can be summed up as poor condition, with reduced screage.

Regarding live stock the report says: "Considering the prospects when correspondents wrote in November, the cendition of live stock in the spring is a cause for congratulation. The animals were put into winter quarters with very limited stores, as the hay crop had been a comparative failure; yet with wise and careful feeding,

the bulk of live stock have got on the early grass in fair condition of health, although, as a rule, thinner than usual. In some localities hay was imported from Quebec and from the more favored portions of Outario, but the remarks of correspondents lead to the conclusion that the larger use of straw, corn, grain and roots as a supplement to, and in some matances as a substitute for hay, has taught farmers a valuable lesson in the economy of the manger. Horses have come through the winter perhaps better than any other case of live stock, although in certain localities some suffered from starvation, or sa some correspondents term it, " fodder hunger." In many sections straw and oats were their general fare, hay being at a premium and bidding very scarce. Horned cattle are in as poor condition as might be expected, and, with the exception of a few minor cases of sickness, and some cases of "lumpy jaw," in the township of Keppel, Sullivan, Sydenham and Amaranth, they are remarkably free from disease. In some quarters, but more esdecially in the Counties of Bruce and Grey, many cattle had barely enough to support life, and there was hardly enough bedding to keep them comfortable and clean, but taking the province as a whole the general condition of both dairy and beefing stock is most encouraging. Sheep are in good state of health generally, only a few cases of liver disease and grub in the head being reported, and the ewes are said to be dropping fine lambs. Swine are treer from disease than usual although a few cases of paralysis were stoken of. The low price of perk, however, is most discouraging to hog raisers. Regarding the supply of hay for live stock during the winter, and the tendency of farmers to hold for a rise in prices, some correspondents state that a few of their neighbors who refused to sell hay at \$12 and \$14 a ton in the winter are now willing to dispose of it at \$8 or \$9 a ton.
