CHURCH ATTENDANCE

The attendance of our people at weekday
 services during Lent can scarcely be considered
 satisfactory. Whatever may be said about
 the difficulty of coming to Church for morning
 and afternoon services cannot apply to those
 held in the evening, and yet the most that can
 be claimed for St. George's Parish is that it
 furnishes a congregation of from twenty-five
 to thirty on Wednesdays at 8 p.m. Surely
 there can be no more profitable form of self-denial
 during Lent than that which gives up an hour
 a week to the worship of God and receiving
 instruction in sacred things. We hope that
 with the solemn call of Holy Week—the
 call to be with our Saviour in His last hours—
 there may be a better response.

THE EASTER COMMUNION

We remind the congregation of the rule—
 "And note, that every parishioner shall com-
 municate *at the least* (the irreducible mini-
 mum) three times in the year, *of which Easter*
to be one." And the reason for this rule is not
 far to seek. The Supper of the Lord is the
 Christian Passover. It is the joyful commem-
 oration of our deliverance from the bondage
 of the spiritual Egypt through the Blood of
 the Paschal Lamb of God, Who died and rose
 again. "It is very meet, right, and our bound-
 en duty, that we should at all times and in all
 places, give thanks unto Thee, O Lord . . .
But chiefly are we bound to praise Thee for the
glorious resurrection of Thy Son Jesus Christ
 our Lord." Let us therefore unite in offering
 our Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving on
 Easter Day.

NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

At least it is practically new, so far as the
 interior is concerned; the old has vanished.
 Every spot of old plaster has been painted
 afresh, and every portion of ancient wood-
 work has been varnished or colored anew.
 The shades have been so well selected that

the whole room is full of light. The ceiling was much disfigured with stains, and it was a troublesome job to get rid of them. But the contractor was not content till every suggestion of blemish had been removed. No one could have done better work, and the ladies are to be congratulated on having found in Mr. J. W. Knott, of 41 Czar St., a man who not only did a good job, but gave them good measure and running over—without running over the contract price of \$100. The Parish Guild will find in the freshly painted building a vastly pleasanter place for future meetings. By the way, we hear a suggestion that as the School House is used for every variety of Parish purposes, and for only one hour in the week is occupied as a school, a much more appropriate name for it would be the Parish House. We quite agree.

GUILD OF ST. AGATHA

The annual meeting of this excellent organization was held on March 4th, and in spite of the loss of many members through removal from the city or neighborhood, the officers were able to report another successful year. The number on the membership roll is at present thirty-two, with an average attendance at the weekly meetings of fifteen. The total receipts of the year amounted to \$94.96, and the expenditures to \$77.09, leaving a balance in hand of \$16.87. The greater portion of the expenditure has been devoted to various missionary objects. But the Guild has not been unmindful of home claims, and it assisted materially in the work of the Gift Fête held at the beginning of the winter. Nor has it been neglectful of social duties, its members having acted as hostesses at a pleasant evening not long ago, when the young men of the Church were entertained by them. But the energies of the Guild have been mostly devoted to the making of a "bale" for All Hallows School.

The following are the officers for the year: President, Miss Cayley; Vice-Presidents, Misses Cowan and Winsor; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Hughes; Recording Secretary, Miss Alice Hodgson; Treasurer, Mrs. Bissell. The Work Managers are Misses S. Cowan and A. Waller.

YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION

This society also has just held its annual meeting, but it is far from being the flourishing organization it was during the first year

of its existence. Its decline has been due to the departure from either the city or the neighborhood of many who made it at its inception such a success. They were a musical lot, and the Association was never at a loss for piano playing, or songs, or recitations, while they were with us. The officers just elected are: President, J. E. Cameron; Vice-President, Godfrey Horlock; Secretary, E. M. Huffman; Treasurer, George Baldock; Executive Committee, Percy Wyer, Joseph Allsopp, George Waller. The Young Men's Bible Class, however, continues to flourish, and has fifty members on its roll.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION

This Society held a Valentine Box Social on February 12th. There were about sixty young people present. The School Room was elaborately decorated for the occasion. Progressive Crokinole was played till 9.30, when the boxes were auctioned off by Mr. Bissell. Refreshments and presentation of prizes followed. The society has also provided for lectures by Mr. Kenrick and Prof. Young, of Trinity College.
