The resignation of Lord Robert Cecil as under-secretary of state for foreign affairs is said by the cables to be due to a difference of opinion over the disestablishment of the Welsh Church The church was disestablished by act of parliament, but the operation of the act, like the Home Rule for Ireland Act, was suspended when war broke out until peace returned. If the Cecils feel as badly as this over Welsh disestablishment we may prepare for reactionary gales. It is much more likely that Lord Robert is concerned about the approaching tariff situation.

Mr. J. R. Clynes has relinquished the post of food controller, but the armistice has almost made this post a sinecure. At any rate, Mr. Clynes is a labor man, and the labor men are looking for independent action by their party in the election. Mr. Barnes is not-apparently breaking with the government, but it is natural. that Mr. Clynes should.

The enthusiasm for Mr. Lloyd George continues to grow. The surrender of the German fleet, typical as it is of the surrender of the German nation with all its claims of eminence, all its glories, all its boastings, must cut the German People to the quick. But it is unnecessary to accuse them of poor spirit and cowardice in making no effort to use their .fleet. It would have been certain death to have done so. They showed good common sense and discretion in declining to attempt a valueless manoeuvre. Nor is it quite the thing to upbraid the Germans for carrying out faithfully the terms of a treaty which we have imposed upon them. Would we have respected them more had they broken their treaty and started a sea fight? Their strict observance of the armistice terms is their first step in well-· doing and should be commended rather than sneered at. Their submission, moreover, is the greatest tribute In history which one power has paid to the puissance of another.



extent. This province will not receive a sufficient quantity of anthracite to permit consumption as in past years, and a saving must be made. The fuel administration is taking a

survey of the large users of coal in Ontario, and forms have been sent to local fuel commissioners instructing them to secure data covering con-sumption in all buildings (other than tesidences), using 20 tons of coal or over per annum.

Some time ago regulations were issued from Ottawa making all anthracite in public buildings equipped to burn bituminous available for the fuel commiss oners who have power to di-vert such coal to domestic purposes. The information now being gathered really be a census of the boilers and furnaces and their 'ypes and styles in the province and with such information available the fuel administration will be able to judge whether a consumer can burn soft coal in his heat-

ng apparatus. In a circular to the fuel commission-ers, he fuel administration says in part: "When the forms are filled out and returned, the proper regulations will be issued, but you should urge the owners of residences having more than 40 tons of coal in stock, and the proprietors of governing bodies of all institutions which have anthracite coal

n stock, and who are able to burn bitumfnous, to take immediate means to dispose of their anthracite supply to their friends and neighbors so that they may at an early date, while there is a surplus of bituminous coal, secure their new stock of soft coal and place themselves in such a position that the new regulations will not apply to them.'
