FROM THE WRONG FUND.

The public will readily accept Mr. W. K. McNaught's statement that every cent paid in bonuses to officials by the Exhibition Association was earned and deserved.

Toronto and the whole Dominion had reason to be proud of the success of the Exhibition. Some of that success was undoubtedly due to the energy and capability of the officials.

But a mistake was made in paying the bonuses out of the grant voted by the Dominion parliament. This money was voted for certain specific purposes, including salaries of officials.

The purposes to which a portion of the government grant has been applied will place a weapon in the hands of politicians who are all too anxious to raise and abet antagonism to Toronto.

OBJECTS TO BALFOUR'S TACTICS. The leader of the Liberal party in the House of Lords has been indulging in some exceptionally strong language regarding Mr. Balfour's attitude in the present crisis.

That Lord Spencer—the red Earl is his popular sobriquet—should on this occasion be so stirred out of his usual dignified decorum as to descend to the level of a schoolboy is an illustrative commentary on the tactical strength of the Premier's position.

Mr. Balfour hopes to hold his own till Joseph Chamberlain concentrates and effects a junction. Then he will sweep the shattered free trade legions from the field.

Lord Spencer feels this is not playing the war game fairly. He and his colleagues would have liked better had the issue been a more simple one.

Of course, in this they are acting rather a silly and undignified part. Party leaders no more than any commanders are in the habit of waging war on lines to suit their adversaries.

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TRADING OF CHICKEN BAG

BROTHER LINK IN CHAIN

It is Said to Have Been Used by Kennedy to Carry Chickens to The Willows.

Brantford, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Prof. Ellis, provincial analyst, has completed his report on the clothing of the prisoner, Joseph Kennedy, accused of the murder of Irene Cole, and it is now in the hands of Dr. A. J. G. Galt, of the Ontario Police, who will read at the preliminary hearing of Kennedy on Tuesday, Dr. Ellis refuses to say what the result of his analysis is.

The police have recovered the bag in which it is said Kennedy carried off the chicken he procured from Mrs. Howe of Darling-street. The bag was found by some person in the willows, not far from the spot where the body of Irene Cole was discovered. It was handed over to the police who identified it as the one Kennedy carried.

The preliminary hearing will be concluded on Tuesday. There are several more witnesses to be called.

Kennedy is apparently well and healthy at the jail and gives himself very little concern about what is happening in the outside world.

NAT TILL MIDNIGHT.

Saturday Sitting of the House of Commons Did Much Business.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Saturday sittings of the Commons were devoted to consideration of the composite bill to amend the Dominion Elections Act, and to the passing of further supplementary estimates in Committee of Supply. One of the principal provisions of the bill was that which makes compulsory for an elector to vote under penalty of being disfranchised for six years. There was strong opposition to this clause, and after a protracted debate it was deemed best not to have it enacted this session. Other sections of the bill will be looked into by the Minister of Justice and put in shape for enactment before prorogation.

In the course of the discussion in Committee of Supply upon the appropriation for telegraph lines and cables the Finance Minister announced that wireless stations would be established at Cape Race and Sable Island.

Mr. Prefontaine announced that he intended to establish an office of the Marine Department in Montreal, also that the new system of lighting the channel between Montreal and Sorel will be installed by Nov. 1. It is hoped by this measure that it can be navigated as safely by night as in day time. The sum of \$100,000 will be expended to start eight new fish hatcheries in the Maritime Provinces. Items for maintenance of the fishery to the amount of \$395,000 had been passed when the House rose at midnight.

FOUR TIMES A YEAR.

A Steamer calls at St. Kitts—Inhabitants May Get Out.

London, Oct. 11.—That lonely island, St. Kitts, one of the loneliest of the Hebrides, is likely to be left lonely still in the near future. Its inhabitants, it is reported, propose deserting the island and emigrating to South Africa. This is not much to be wondered at, for St. Kitts is one of the most inaccessible islands in the world. Only four times a year, once a month in June, July, August and September, does a steamer call from Glasgow. For the rest of the year the inhabitants are entirely cut off from the outer world. Their special mail is a tin box into which they put letters, toss it into the sea, and trust to Providence and favorable winds to carry it to the shores of the outer Hebrides. The population of the island has gradually dwindled to about 100. The last time there was a great exodus was when thirty-six islanders left in a search for gold in Australia.
