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North Ontario Ballots Re-counted at Ottawa.

AND THE END IS NOT YET.

It Took the Lawyers 8 Hours to Count Less Than 5000 Votes.

The Apparent Result is That Mr. Graham Holds the Seat Unless Pending Proceedings Throw Him Out—Everson Took a Big Jump Last Month—An Estimate of Two Millions in the Ten Months of the Present Fiscal Year—Excise Not Out Customs—Regulations as to Space for Cattle on Board Ships—Other Ottawa News.

Ottawa, May 9.—(Special)—Under an order of the Ontario Court of Appeal an inspection of ballots cast in the North Ontario-by-election took place in the office of the Clerk of the Crown and Chancery yesterday.

The defeated Conservative candidate, Mr. Macleod, while R. A. Grant of Kerr, Macdonald & Co., Toronto, represented the Patron-Liberal member, Mr. Graham. It took over eight hours to examine the 4822 ballots in Major Chapeau's custody, whereas before the election, Mr. Macleod being the victor, the result of yesterday's count, according to the figures supplied to the press, was as follows: 4811 ballots were found good, 13 rejected and 23 were marked for Graham and 2207 for Macleod, giving the Liberal-Everon a nominal majority of 17.

Mr. Aylesworth considers there is a strong possibility of Mr. Macleod being adjudged the seat on a further scrutiny of the votes cast, without even touching the question of a new count on election day, which is at issue in the courts. Twelve ballots for Mr. Macleod, rejected by the judge for Graham—these, it is, they were not marked in the count, but were found in the ballot box, and it is incomprehensible why they were not counted. The intervention of the Liberal-Everon in this matter, as well as in other affairs of this province, is not so much to be wondered at, as it is in the case of the Ontario Government in terminating the Drummond County Railway project.

IN MEMORY OF COMRADES.

Decoration of the Monument in Queen's Park
