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BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Secretary's Report for the Year ended September 30, 1898.

The Board of Management is pleased to report a steady improvement in the work being done in Grace Hospital. The total number of patients treated during the year was 836, which is an increase of 35 over last year and 413 over the first year in the present building.

The thanks of the Board are due to Mrs. Fred. G. Cox and Mrs, T. J. Clark, through whose efforts a very successful musicale was given at the residence of Mrs. Wm. Christie in November last; also to Mrs. Judge McDougall, who was the promoter of a musical entertainment in March; the substantial proceeds of both being turned over to the Trustees for the benefit of the Hospital.

On the afternoon of November 23rd Grace Hospital was honored by a visit from Her Excellency Lady Aberdeen, who visited all the wards and expressed her gratification at their cheerful appearance.

Numerous improvements have been made in the building during this year, the most notable being railings on the balconies, thus providing a safe out door retreat for convalescent patients; and new flooring on several rooms; also the furnishings of a Staff-room, the latter being a donation from the President of the Board of Management, Mrs. Robert Baldwin. The furniture in the former Staff-room, which was contributed by the Young Ladies' Auxiliary, is now utilized in a sitting-room for the House Surgeons.

The spiritual welfare of the inmates of the Hospital has been carefully attended to by the following gentlemen:—Canon Sweeny and Rev. Mr. Broughall of the Episcopal Church; Rev. Mr. McEwan of the Presbyterian Church; Rev. John Hunt of the Methodist Church; and the Rev. Father Minnehan of the Roman Catholic Church; also religious services have been held on Sundays by students of Knox College and the Mission Workers.

The Board of Management feels that it is to be congratulated on having the assistance of Miss Clarke, Superintendent, and Miss Egleston, Matron, whose earnest and efficient work contributes in a large degree to the successful treatment and comfort of the patients. The positions of House Surgeons have been successfully filled during the year by J. T. Clarke, M.D., and E. A. P. Hardy, M.D. Much credit is due to Miss E. Gertrude Hill, who has for several months bestowed a great deal of effective work on the "Homœopathic Messenger."

It is with feelings of the deepest regret that the Board refers to the irreparable loss sustained by it in the death of Mrs. Roper, who was its esteemed Treasurer for six years, and during that time exercised much of her well-known energy in behalf of the Hospital.

The ladies of the Board desire to thank their many friends for their kind responses for aid in carrying on this work, and particularly the members of the Young Ladies' Auxiliary and Pansy Band, who are untiring in their efforts to promote the welfare of the public patients.

ACT OF INCORPORATION

56 Vic., Chap. CXIII. Assented to May 27, 1893.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE GRACE HOSPITAL (HOMŒOPATHIC).

Whereas the Toronto Homeopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association carrying on its work in the City of Toronto, is an institution incorporated under the provisions of the 'Act' respecting Benevolent, Provident and other Societies:" and whereas, the said corporation has represented by petition that its operations have been greatly increased since its foundation, that voluntary contributions, bequests and legacies from those interested in the welfare of the institution are the principal means of raising the large amount of money necessary for the maintenance of the Hospital and Dispensary in the City of Toronto, and that by reason of the increase in magnitude and importance of the work of the said charity, it is desirable to obtain a special Act of Incorporation providing for the more efficient management of the affairs of the said institution, and enlarging its powers of taking gifts, devises and bequests made for the benefit of the said institution; and whereas the present corporators, Joseph Easton McDougall, John Gordon Brown, Clarkson Jones, Frank Arnoldi, Thomas McCraken, Frederic John Stewart, James Henderson, John Drysdale Nasmith, Frederic Roper, John T. M. Burnside, Elizabeth Maria Baldwin, Marianne Henderson, Marian Torrance Gibson, Georgina Martha Hoyles, Zippie Simpson Jones, Caroline Brown, Sarah Minerva McDonald, Henrietta Walsh, Mary VanderSmissen, Appa Grant Tyrrell, and Kathleen O'Brien, have, by their petition, set forth the facts aforesaid, and have prayed for a special Act of Incorporation, vesting the assets, affairs and management of the said corporation in the hands of five trustees and their successors, and have named Joseph Easton McDougall, of Toronto County Judge; Frederic Roper, of Toronto, accountant; William Barclay McMurrich, of Toronto, barrister; John D. Nasmith, of Toronto, manufacturer; and Edward Gurney, of Toronto, manufacturer; as the first board of trustees; and, whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition:

Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the said Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:—

I. The said Joseph Easton McDougall, Frederic Roper, William Barclay McMurrich, John Drysdale Nasmith and Edward Gurney, and their successors, are hereby constituted and declared a body corporate and politic by the name of "Grace Hospital (Homœopathic)," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, and shall have all the powers, rights and authorities in addition to those hereinafter given, now vested in the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated under the Act aforesaid.

2. All the assets of every kind now vested in or owned or held by the Toronto Homeopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated under a certain declaration made in pursuance of the provisions of section 2, of an "Act respecting Benevolent, Provident and other Societies," are hereby vested in and transferred to the said corporation hereby constituted, with full power, subject always to the terms of any gift,

devise or bequest affecting the same, to hold, sell, mortgage and manage the same, and all property, hereafter acquired by the corporation hereby constituted; and the corporation hereby constituted shall be entitled to take, hold and receive all gifts, devises and bequests heretofore lawfully made and not yet paid over to the Toronto Homeopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated.

3. The corporation hereby constituted shall assume and be liable for all the debts, obligations and liabilities of the Toronto Homeopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore constituted.

4 The corporation hereinbefore named and their successors shall have the management of the affairs of the said corporation, and shall appoint all officers for conducting its affairs, and shall regulate the discipline and management, make such regulations for the government of the said Hospital as shall to them seem meet and expedient, and make by-laws, rules and regulations for the effective government and management of the affairs of the said corporation.

5. In the case of death or resignation of any of the said trustees, the vacancy so caused shall be filled up at the regular meeting by a majority of the remaining Trustees, the name of the proposed Trustee or Trustees being sent to each Trustee at least one week prior to the meeting at which such new Trustee or Trustees is or are to be appointed.

The corporation hereby constituted is authorized and empowered to take all gifts, legacies and bequests of money or personalty, and to acquire, hold and possess so much land as may from time to time be necessary for the actual use and occupation of the said corporation, whether the same be acquired by gift, devise or bequest, or by purchase; and the said corporation, in addition to such lands as may be required for its actual use and occupation as aforesaid, is hereby authorized and empowered to take by gift, devise or bequest, land, tenaments or hereditaments and interests therein, the annual value of which together with all other lands, tenaments and hereditaments or any interest therein theretofore acquired by like means and then held by the corporation, shall not exceed in the whole the annual value of \$15,000; but such last mentioned lands, tenements or hereditaments or interest therein shall not be held for a longer period than seven years from the acquisition thereof, and within that period shall be absolutely disposed of by the said corporation, and such lands, tenaments or hereditaments or interest therein as have not within the said period been so disposed of, shall revert to the person from whom the same were acquired, his heirs executors, administrators and assigns: and the proceeds of the sales or all or any part of the moneys derived therefrom or from any other source may be invested from time to time in mortgage securities upon real estate, whether treehold or leasehold, and also in municipal debentures, or the debentures of any society or company in which any trustee under section 30 of the "Act respecting Trustees and Executors and the Administration of Estates," and under any act or acts amending the same, may invest any trust fund.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

Admission of Pupils.

The course of training for women desirous of becoming professional nurses is three years

Those wishing to receive the course must apply personally to the Superintendent, upon whose approval they will be received into the school, to remain two months on probation before becoming pupil nurses.

The most desirable age for a candidate to enter the school is from twenty-five to thirty-five, but every candidate must be over twenty-three years of age.

The applicant must send, with answers to the paper of questions, a letter from a clergyman testifying to her good moral character, and from a physician stating that she is in good health.

Applicants must have their teeth in perfect order before entering the school, and before final acceptance pass an examination before the Medical Board of the

Hospital as to their physical condition.

During the time of probation the applicant must be prepared for an examination in reading, penmanship, simple arithmetic and English dictation. Such examination is to test her ability to read aloud well, to write legibly and accurately, to keep simple accounts, and to take notes of lectures. This measure of education is indispensable for a nurse, but applicants are reminded that women of superior education and cultivation, when equally fitted for nurses, will be preferred to those who do not possess these advantages.

Applicants are admitted at any time during the year when there is a vacancy. During the term of probation nurses are boarded and lodged at the expense of the Hospital, but receive no other compensation. They must come provided with the necessary clothing, including two cotton gowns and six white aprons. All clothing must be plainly marked with surname of owner. Eighteen pieces are allowed in the wash each week.

Those accepted as pupil nurses are to sign the following contract: "I, the undersigned, hereby agree to remain three years in the Training School for Nurses, as a pupil nurse, and to obey the rules of the Hospital and School."

They will reside at the Hospital, and serve as nurses in the wards.

They will receive \$2 per month during the first year, \$3 per month during the second year, and \$6 per month during the third year; and those who complete the full course and pass the final examination shall be entitled to receive \$25 each with their diplomas.

The Hospital will provide material for two dresses, six aprons, and six kerchiefs each year, and for one cap each month; anything in excess of this must be paid for by the nurses themselves.

In sickness nurses will be cared for gratuituously. Every nurse will be expected to perform any duty assigned to her, either as a nurse in the Hospital, or when sent to private cases among rich and poor in any part of the Province of Ontario. Nurses will not be entitled to any perquisites or gratuities, without the sanction of the Superintendent, the above remuneration with their education being considered a full equivalent.

Nurses are allowed three weeks' vacation annually. Nurses are expected to attend morning prayers.

Training.

The instruction includes : -

1. Dressing of blisters, burns, sores and wounds; the preparation and application of fomentations, poultices and minor dressings.

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Administration of enemata, and use of female catheter.
 The best method of friction to the body and extremities.

4. Management of help ess patients, moving, changing, giving baths in bed; preventing bed sores, and managing position.

5. Ban laging, making bandages and rollers, and lining splints.
6. Making beds and changing sheets while patient is in bed.
7. deligagies for the sick

The preparing, cooking and serving of delicacies for the sick; to understand the art of ventilation without chilling the patient, both in private houses and hospital wards, and the management of convalescents. They are also given instruction in preparing reports for the physician, as to the state of secretions, expectoration, pulse, temperature of the body, skin, appetite, intelligence (as to delirium or stupor), breathing, sleeping, condition of wounds, eruptions, suppurations, and effect of diet.

The instruction will be given by attending physicians and surgeons and by the Head Nurses, at the bedside of the patients, and in various other ways: also lectures by visiting physicians, and by the Superintendent. Lectures will be given on such subjects as anatomy, physiology, hygiene, diseases, surgery, materia medica and obstetrics, and examinations will be held at stated periods.

When the full term of three years is completed, the nurse, after passing final examination, will receive a diploma, signed by the Examining Board, the Superintendent, and the officers of the Board of Management.

Only nurses obtaining seventy-five per cent. or over at the final examination, together with a good record during the three years' course, will be granted diplomas.

Nurses on Private Duty.

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All applications for nurses for outside cases must be made to the Superin- endent, who will send them out on the conditions expressed in the following form:—

The charge for the services of a nurse is \$2 per day, or if employed one week or more. \$10 per week. In contagious diseases, \$2 per day from commencement. Travelling expenses, cabs, and washing to be paid by family employing nurse. When a nurse's services are no longer required, this sheet of paper is to be returned to the Superintendent, sealed up, with a candid statement written on the day-leaf, of her conduct and efficiency, either by one of the family or the medical attendant, and enclosing the amount of fees due to the Hospital, or stating when it will be sent to the Superintendent. The nurse is to be allowed reasonable time for rest, at least six hours out of the twenty-four. Except in the case of extreme illness, the nurse is to be allowed to attend church once every Sunday. Her meals are to be served apart from servants (not in the kitchen); and when on duty at night some refreshments are to be provided. When on duty the nurse is always to wear the dress prescribed by the regulations of the Hospital, and is at no time to receive or entertain her friends. It is especially requested that any violation of these rules will be at once reported to the Superintendent. When it is possible a few days' notice of the nurse's return to the Hospital shall be sent to the Superintendent.

Visitors to Patients and Nurses.

Remarks as to conduct, efficiency, etc.

1. Public patients may receive visits from their friends on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday of each week, from 2 to 4 p.m., and at no other time without a special permit from the attending physician or House Surgeon. In any case, however, the attending physician may exercise discretionary powers as to the admitting or excluding of visitors. Visitors must leave at the expiration of the visiting hours.

2. Visitors, either to patients or nurses, will not be permitted to take any meals or refreshments in the Hospital, or to pass the night therein.

meals or refreshments in the Hospital, or to pass the night therein.
3. A visitor will not be allowed to give any article of food or drink to a patient unless by permission of the attending physician, and any article sent to a patient shall be left with the Head Nurse.

Private patients may receive visitors any day, at the discretion of the attending physicians, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 9.30 p.m., when all visitors must leave the Hospital.

Curriculum.

Examination of nurses to be held annually in April.

The full value of each subject shall be 100.

The percentage obtained by the candidate is not to be published; pass examination is 50 per cent; honors, seventy-five per cent.

Primary examinations, written; final, both written and oral.

Each lecturer shall set the paper on his subject and examine the same. Each candidate shall number her answers to correspond with the questions; she shall fold her paper and enclose it in an envelope, provided by the Superintendent, on the outside of which each candidate shall write her name. The packet is to be handed to the Superintendent. Neither signature, number, nor sign by which the writer could be recognized by the Examiner is to be written or marked upon any portion of the paper enclosed in the envelope.

At the end of each written examination upon any subject the answers to the questions are to be handed to the Superintendent, who will open the en velopes in which they are as above directed to be enclosed, and to each set of papers a number shall be affixed, by which the author will be known to the

Examiner during the examinations.

The Superintendent will then deliver each set of papers to the Examiner thereof, who will examine them, and by means of numbers mark the relative values of the answers. He shall return the papers to the Superintendent, not later than two weeks thereafter, who shall then make a general schedule, using the numbers in lieu of names. This schedule is to be examined as to its correctness by the whole examining staff, and the result of the final decision announced by the chairman of the Medical Staff.

Rules for Awarding VanderSmissen Medal.

A medal is presented annually by Professor W. H. VanderSmissen, of University College, Toronto, and Mrs. VanderSmissen, to the nurse who during her services at the Hospital has shown in the highest degree the following characteristics:—

I. Skill in nursing.

2. Punctuality.

3. Personal neatness.

4. General orderliness.

5. A gentle voice and manner.

 Patience, self-control and discretion in all intercourse and conversation with patients and fellow-employees

7. Above all, cheerful submission to authority.

The competition for the medal is open to all nurses who have completed their examination satisfactorily, and have passed the final written examination with honors. As soon as possible after each annual final written examination the senior and junior Medical Examiners, together with the Superintendent, shall select not less than two or more than three nurses, who, in their opinion, possess the qualities hereinbefore specified, each member nominating not more than two; and the three names receiving the largest number of nominations in this way shall be submitted to all the nurses employed and present in the Hospital who shall then and there, without intercommunication, vote by ballot for one only of the nurses so selected. In case no nurse receives fitty per cent, of the votes cast, the name of the nurse receiving the smallest number of votes shall be struck of, and a new ballot taken, and so on, until some one nurse shall have received fifty per cent, of the votes cast. Suitable inscriptions shall be engraved on the medals awarded the respective winners from year to year.

AUXILIARIES

Committees of Ladies, to be known as Auxiliaries, may be formed outside of the management, of those who may desire to assist in promoting the objects of the Hospital, and in adding to the comforts of the patients and nurses.

The following rules have been adopted by the Auxiliaries organized before the incorporation of this Hospital, and they are suggested as suitable for the future workings of such associations.

I. Each member to pay a yearly fee of \$1. The year to commence the first of October.

All members to attend the meetings as often as possible; the meetings to be held at the Hospital.

3. It is expected that all members who are able will take their turn in fillling the "Saturday basket."

4. It is desired that each member shall collect at least \$5 during the year, and collecting cards will be sent to the members for that purpose.

5. Each member is requested to write her name plainly on a card accompanying a donation sent to the Hospital, and also to mention that such donation is sent from a member of the Auxiliary.

6. It is hoped that all members will take an interest in the Hospital and do all in their power to promote its welfare.
