

Supplementing and in continuance of the observations in a previous contribution it may be said that we good people of Saint John as a whole are disposed to be somewhat foo complacent. We are satisfied exactly, we accept them as a sort of gratuity. We are apathetic in these days in respect to many things that should call forth earnest action from every man, more especially, perhaps, from the business man, the man of capital, the investor, the man whose best interests and success are advantageously or otherwise affected by the prosperity and development of the city. Patriots? Yes, we are all patriots, when we are roused to the necessity for its public demonstration, but are we active in our patriotism locally?

There is a saying to the effect that "Charity begins at home," and therefore our duty, if we see it aright, is to foster and encourage every and any industry that will tend to the benefit and growth of our home city. We would be thereby none the less true Canadians. To demonstrate our Canadianism, it is not obligatory upon any of us to invest our surplus or other funds in the purchase of lands in the western portion of our Dominion, of which we, both east and west, are all so proud; nor in the purchase of lands in the western lands of our neighbors, nor shares in rubber plantations, as it may be.

We, in St. John, are as devoted to the interests of the Dominion of Canada as the people in any other part of the country. Our local history proves this. 
