# ADDRESS FROM THE SESSION.

# To the Members of the Gould Street Presbyterian Congregation.

## MANAGERS' REPORT.

At the close of another year, the Managers desire to place before the Congregation a statement of its affairs, and it affords them pleasure to be able to say, that in comparison with other years, this, its twenty-first Annual Statement, will be found satisfactory.

The ordinary income of the Congregation has been \$4,227 34cts., made up as follows, viz :

Weekly Offerings\$2063	34	
" Collections 1403	10	
Quarterly Contributions 760	40	

The Expenditure during the same period has amounted to \$2890 89; the alance, remaining in the hands of the Treasurer at the close of the year, being \$919 98.

A comparison with the figures of the previous years' Report, will enable the Congregation to see more readily what has been done. The income of the previous year was \$4017 01; expenditure, \$4022 80; and the balance on hand, \$583 53. For the year just closed our receipts have been \$210 33 more, and our expenditure \$131 93 less, thus accounting for our larger balance on the present occasion.

The Managers trust that the prosperous condition of the finances may not have the tendency in any degree to lessen the liberality of the congregation, as, while they trust it may ever be the endeavor of those to whom is committed the management of its affairs, to conduct them as economically as possible,

During the past year a congregation has been organised, with a membership of about fifty, and more recently the Rev. A. Gilray has been ordained as its minister. It is gratifying to have to record the rapid success which, by the blessing of God, has attended this enterprise, and the confident expectation is entertained that much good will be effected in the district under Mr. Gilray's ministry. The sum of \$100 has been contributed during the past year by the congregation of Gould Street to assist in sustaining ordinances, together with a donation of \$20 from the Sabbath School. Similar assistance may be required for some time, which will doubtless be cheerfully given, as it has been in the past.

# REPORTS OF SABBATH SCHOOLS.

## I.-GOULD STREET SCHOOL.

In presenting the report for 1874, it may interest many of the teachers, to be informed of the state of matters, in 1864, or ten years ago, as compared with the present condition of the School.

In 1864, the number of Scholars on the roll was 124, while for 1874 it has been 265, of which 110 were boys, and 155 girls. At the former period there was no infant class; at present, we have one taught by Miss Dalton, with a roll attendance of 92, being 15 more than that of the previous year. In 1864 there was collected for Missionary purposes \$35; in 1874 there was collected for the same, \$155. This we consider one of the most gratifying features in our progress. The comparison on the whole is one which may well call forth gratitude to God, while it should encourage us to put forth more strenuous effort in the time to come.

The number of children on the roll is slightly in excess of that reported last year, and so that of teachers engaged in the work. Since the date of last report the following teachers have discontinued their connection with the school; some of them it is hoped, only temporarily, Mr. Gray, Mr. W. S. Thompson, Mr. Rankine, and Miss Threlkeld. We have on the other hand received back to work, Mr. Gemmel, and Miss Tait; and for the first time, Mr. Watt, Mr. Adamson, Miss Gregg, Miss Clark and Miss Smith.

It is matter of thankfulness to God that none of the scholars have been removed by death during the year closing in December, though very many of them have passed through sickness more or less severe. And God has spared the lives of all the to number v sequence his class. return to since.

all the teachers. A little more than a year ago, one of our number was suffering from a very severe illness, and was in consequence prevented for a considerable time, from meeting with his class. But in the early part of the year, he was enabled to return to his post, and has been found faithfully at it ever since.

The Teachers' weekly meeting was discontinued for a time in midsummer. It was resumed in September, and has been better attended, though still less generally, than its great importance demands.

In addition to listening to addresses from the Superintendent and Teachers, the children have been addressed in the course of the year, by the Rev. Dr. Taylor, the former much esteemed pastor of the congregation; by Dr. Fraser, now laboring in Formosa; and, along with the children of the other Presbyterian Schools in the city, by the Rev. Mr. Wilson, of Barclay Church, Edinburgh.

A sermon was preached to them and to the scholars attending Sherbourne Street and Caer Howel Street Schools by our pastor on the all-important theme ; "One thing is needful," and a collection, which was liberal, was taken up on behalf of the School.

In November last a number of the more advanced female scholars with some of the female teachers, began to meet once a week in the house of our pastor to sew useful and ornamental work, with the view of disposing of it, and giving the proceeds of the sale to some of the Mission Schemes, which might seem to claim assistance. The weekly meeting for this purpose has been well sustained, and it is hoped will continue to receive ever wider encouragement.

The Library keeps in about the same condition as to the number of books. Between seventy and eighty were added during the year, and about as many which had been read, and

#### II.-SHERBOURNE STREET SCHOOL.

During the year ending 31st December, 1874, much real happiness has been enjoyed by Teachers and Scholars, and it is hoped good has been done by the blessing of God on the teaching given, and in answer to prayers presented in behalf of the School.

There are now 14 classes in the school.

The names on the roll during the year have been upwards of 180, and the average attendance 74. The largest attendance 107. On several Sabbaths lately we have had about 100 present.

The Missionary collections during the year amount to \$61, allocated to the following missions, viz: Home Missions, \$30; Saskatchewan, \$16; China, \$15.

The International series of Lessons has been used as in the other Schools connected with the congregation.

An addition of upwards of \$50 worth of excellent books was made to our Library.

Our usual summer picnic was held in the Queen's Park, and our Anniversary in the month of November in the schoolhouse, both of which it is thought have been of benefit to the School, and occasions of enjoyment to those who were present.

The first Monday evening after the first Sabbath in every month, is appointed by the Teachers for conference regarding the interests of the School. As heretofore, the teachers have remained together a short time after the close of the School, joining in prayer for a blessing on the work in which they have just been engaged. And such of the teachers as can attend, meet weekly with the other S. S. Teachers belonging to the Congregation for the preparation of the lesson.

We have again to express our sense of great indebtedness to Mr. Douglas for his continued kindness in helping us so much in the Sabbath School singing.

We would not close our brief report without acknowledging the kindness of our God who has borne with us during another year, and still continues with us in this department of His service. May we all be enabled more fully to express our gratitude by lives more thoroughly devoted to His service.

#### III.-CAER HOWEL STREET SCHOOL.

The School still meets at No. 15 Caer Howel Street. Five Teachers are engaged in the work. Scholars on the roll number 43; the average attendance has been 30. The amount contributed by Scholars for Mission purposes is \$25.39, and with their approval has been distributed as follows : Home Missions, \$15.39; China Missions, \$10.

The International Scheme of Lessons has been used in the School.

The Children's Paper has been distributed monthly.

Through the liberality of members of Gould Street Church Y. M. C. Association (under whose auspices the school is sustained), assisted by several friends principally connected with Gould Street Church, an organ for the use of the school was purchased in January.

With the exception of a few books presented by one of the lady teachers, no addition has been made to the library during the year.

The Teachers have, as hitherto, met at the close of the School session to ask God's blessing on their work.

We regret to report the removal of the late Superintend-

ent, Mr. Henderson. The measure of success we have had in prosecuting the work of this Sabbath School is in no small degree due to Mr. Henderson's earnest and active efforts in the organization of the School, combined with the unwearied interest he manifested in the working and sustaining thereof. We are sorry that a brighter report cannot be given. The

School, as regards numbers remains much the same as last Several families connected with the School have left the district, others have filled their places, and thus our numbers and Scholars fluctuate. We however express the hope that the good seed which from week to week we strive to sow in the hearts of the scholars is being watered by the Holy Spirit, and will through the blessing of God, spring up in many hearts, and bear an abundant harvest to His honor and glory.

# THE PASTOR'S BIBLE CLASSES.

There are on the roll at present; in the class for young men which meets on Sabbath afternoon, 70; and in that for young women, which meets on Monday evening, 45. The amount of interest exhibited by those in attendance has never been greater than at present. It is hoped that this instrumentality may contribute, along with others, in leading many of the young people connected with the congregation and others, temporarily resident in the city, to the decisive acceptance of Christ, and the hearty and intelligent service of Him in life.

## REPORT FOR YEAR 1874.

In presenting the usual yearly Report of the Missionary Association for the past year, your Committee has pleasure in announcing an increase in the amount raised by the collector: over the previous year.

The Receipts from the Missionary Collectors during the year have been \$1,362.49, (of which amount \$90.45 were special contributions for Evangelistic work in the city), being an increase of \$84.35 over those of the previous year.

To this amount are to be added several special donations, one from Mr. Wm. Gordon, a member of the congregation, for Foreign Missions, of \$50; an anonymous contribution of \$2 to the same fund, and a "thank-offering" of \$10 to be devoted to the China Mission of our Church, and a donation of \$50 from a member of the Church to the Home Mission Fund. The collection at the Anniversary Services amounted to \$80.55, and at the Annual Missionary Meeting to \$20.04, making the total amount of \$1,575.08, from which there is to be deducted for 2\* sundry expenses \$7, leaving the balance of \$1,568.08 to be apportioned to the different schemes of the Church.

The various Sabbath-schools connected with the congregation have raised for similar purposes \$241.39, as may be seen

from their reports found in preceding pages. Though, not properly belonging to the Report, it has been

customary to give a detailed statement of the moneys contributed for Missionary purposes by the congregation, in other ways than through the Missionary Association during the year. The following statement will then exhibit the givings for Missionary and Educational purposes :
