London, June 23--No fewer than twenty-eight pages of military honors were gasetted today, mostly for services in the field. Among the eight Victoria Crosses given, three go to Canadians--Captain Francis Scrimger of the Army Medical Service, Color Sergeant Fred Hall of the Eight Battalion and Lance Corporal Fred Fisher of the Thirtieth Battalion, all for extreme bravery in the neighborhood of Ypres.

PRODUCE THE SHELLS.

The Times yesterday quoted from a Winnipeg trade journal the statement that dozens of western manufacturers of war munitions were kept idle for weeks because they could not get steel bars delivered from the east, while such bars could have been got at once and much cheaper from the United States.

JUST A LITTLE LATE.

Reference was made a few days ago to the solemn assurance of the Winnipeg Telegram that the great heart of the Conservative party in Manitoba beat true to political honesty and lofty patriotism, and that the few persons who had disgraced it must be punished.

After quoting the article from the western journal the Times asked what Mr. Hasen and his colleagues have to say about it. The Standard this morning devotes nearly a column of space to the subject, but does not answer the question. It tries to discover a similarity between this case and that of the Borden naval programme, and loses itself in the tortuous mazes of an argument having no relation whatever to the question raised by the western journal.

THE WAR NEWS

Even if the Russian yield Lemberg their great armies will still be in the field, ready for another drive forward when they have the guns and ammunition. The Germans are said to have fired a thousand cartridges of ammunition in a few hours without interfering with their normal artillery work.

There is money in war orders. A market letter recently issued by a firm of Montreal stock brokers estimates that various Canadian concerns are doing relatively as well as, or better than, the Bethlehem Steel Co., which is said to be earning over 60 per cent on its common stock from war orders.

AUSTRALIA'S EXAMPLE.

Speaking in Toronto yesterday Premier Watson of Australia expressed regret that Canada had not carried out the naval agreement of 1909, and said his country had hoped that the Australian navy would be reinforced by a Canadian navy one this time.

The Australian government have well deserved the praise contained in his despatch to them by the Secretary of State for the Colonies. The thanks of every Englishman are due to their enemy, Germany, for it is she who has been the means of demonstrating to Great Britain the value of colonial fleets.

Yesterday the Telegram came out with a wild appeal for the appointment of a Royal Commission by the Governor General, to investigate certain charges made at the instance of some of the Conservative members of the legislature, and which involve some Liberals as well as members of the Roblin government.

Commissioner Chandler should hold that Gloucester County enquiry in Gloucester county, as some forty witnesses have been named. They should not be asked to go to Fredericton.

The opening of the new Bible House, to be the St. John home of the Canadian Bible Society, from which much valuable work through the maritime provinces and Newfoundland will be directed, is an event of more than passing interest.

Despite the fear that there would be very little immigration this year it is noted that sixty-seven homestead entries were made in the Winnipeg district during the first week in June. This is an increase of fifteen over the corresponding week in 1913.

Purchasers of goods whose price has been advanced on account of the scarcity and high price of dyes, will be interested in the following paragraph from the Bangor Commercial:—"If the plans that are in operation to relieve the scarcity of dyestuffs in this country meet with the success that is confidently predicted, the German manufacturers will find that they have lost a market for all time."

The United States Steel company is engaged in building plants that, it is claimed, will afford an annual output of 5,000,000 gallons of benzol, the basis of aniline dyes, which is recovered from the coke used in the making of steel and which has been wasted in the past. Steel companies all over the country are said to be turning their attention to the utilization of this and other by-products.

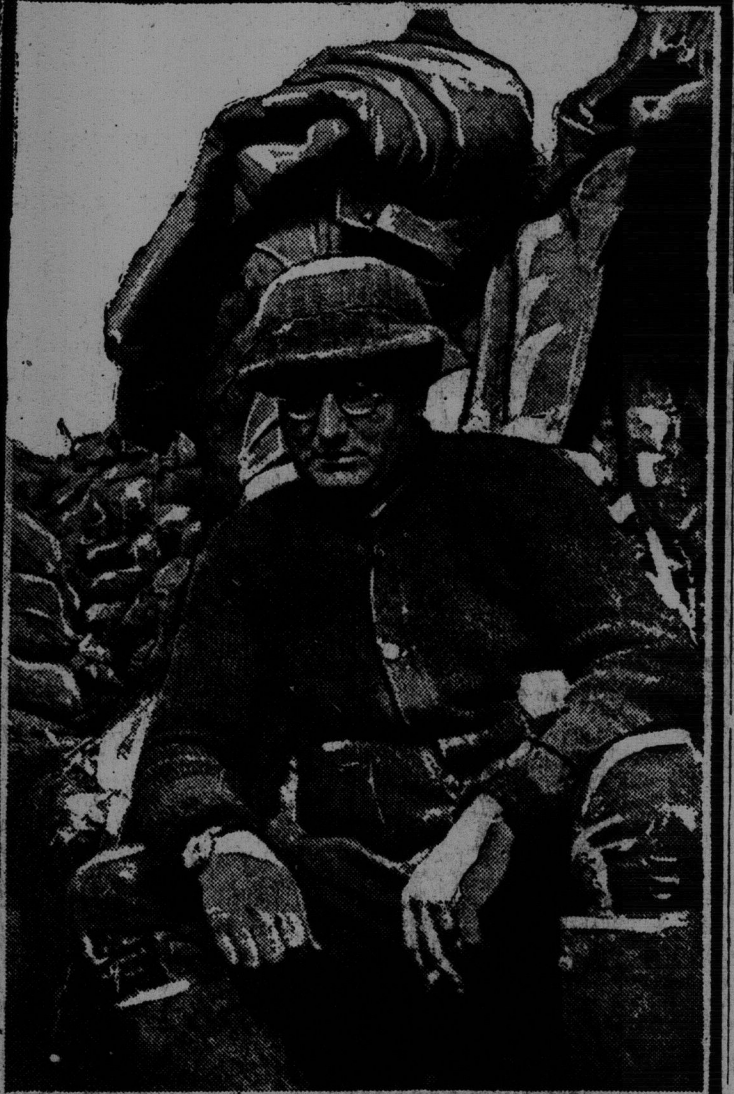

Water and sewerage extensions in Peters street, Fairville, Chesley street, Acadia street and City road and Gilbert's Lane were authorized by the common council yesterday. Two of these extensions will be paid for out of general revenue and Mayor Frink made the pleasing announcement that he had struck a "streak of oil" in the city's finances which would enable the city to get through the year without an overdraft.

Commissioner McLellan reported on the city rifle range. The total expenditure was \$2,048 and receipts \$1,680, with a city grant of \$1,000. He estimated the assets at about \$2,000.

It was decided that the city grant to the mother of the late Policeman O'Leary, who was killed on duty, will not share the increase granted to the police force.

A request of the Canada Nail and Wire Company that they be granted exemption from taxation for the first three years but offering to make up the payments within the following seven years was referred to the committee of the whole council.

The commissioner of lands was asked to report on a request from John Sims that \$1,000 be spent on repairs to the house occupied by him.

Mayor Frink announced that he would not pass any more bills for the North End survey until there was an exhibit of the progress of the work; the commissioner of public works was asked to submit a report at each meeting of the council.

Commissioner Potts complained of the quality of poles and their location, used by the St. John Railway Company and said that an understanding would have to be reached.

Commissioners Wigmore and Potts assured the mayor that the present work at Marsh Bridge should make things so that no further repairs would be required for years.

# SAINT JOHN'S ROUSING SEND-OFF TO THE TWENTY-SIXTH AND AMMUNITION COLUMN

## Scenes At Armory, In Streets, and on Harbor Front on June 12 and 13 as Gallant Soldier Lads Left For Motherland On Way To The Front

With eager hearts loving relatives and dear friends have been waiting for the noble flash which meant so much to them; for the glad tidings which would bring them relief and joy in the knowledge that their gallant soldiers of the 26th battalion had safely crossed the broad Atlantic and had landed on the shores of England.

And at last the word has come! No happier homes are there about St. John today than those to which the lengths of cable have carried their messages of cheerful greetings that Bill, or Jim, or Tom, or Jack is safe in camp despite the watchful waiting of the lurking submarines which sought to send him to his death.

It has been a strain. Day passed into night and night into day, and still silence as to whether the good "Caledonia" had borne in safety the 1,146 brave volunteers staunch and true, proud of their wearing of the badges of the 26th, or the Divisional Ammunition Column. But at last the last hours of suspense are ended. Tonight the loving mother with tears of gratitude dimming her kindly eyes, can kneel in humble devotion to her God, and offer a prayer of thanks for His

Scenes in the Streets.

There had been no published announcement that the embarkation time of the 26th was at hand, but there soon spread through the city the news that the boys were to say good-bye to their Armory home early on Saturday evening. In many households, consequently, the evening meal was a hurried one, for everybody was anxious to be out to participate in what promised to be an epoch making night in the history of St. John.

The 26th Fusiliers Band were under orders to report at the Armory at 4:40 p. m., and the belief was that about six o'clock the command to march would be given by Lieut.-Colonel J. L. McAvity and the first stage of the 26th journey to the firing line would begin.

All through the afternoon there were crowds about the Armory—relatives and friends of the soldiers many of them, others gathered to see all that could be seen. Discipline was permitted relaxation a bit and there were opportunities for farewells and for the presentation of gifts to the soldiers. Many packages were handed in for the men and the latter, on their part, were open handed in giving remembrances. Swaggers sticks became prized souvenirs and many a sister or sweetheart that day sported the

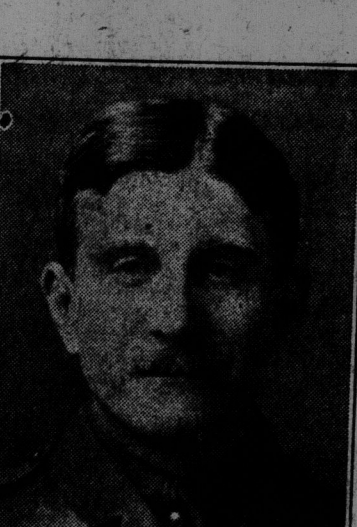
military cane of soldier brother or lover. It was a bright, sunny afternoon and this made the scene about the Armory more brilliant and inspiring. In the windows were groups of soldiers, chatting across the semi-guarded street with groups of friends. Many of them joyfully sang choruses with Tipperary predominating. At the main door the bandmen stood ready to head the march to the steamer and all eyes again and again turned to them for the first sign that the great event was about to begin.

"Here They Come."

Then about 6:30 the doors swung open, "Here they come," was heard in excited tones from many lips. The bandmen formed their ranks and out stepped the sturdy lads of the 26th. Swift to catch the rhythm of the marching music, they swung along Casparthen street through lines of applauding cheering civilians. Bronzed and rugged and sturdy after their months of vigorous training, they advanced. This was a

Street car traffic was held up in Prince William street, every place which would accommodate man, woman or child was occupied—Customs House windows and roof, sheds overlooking the assembling point, house windows, the heights of Prince William street and Duke street hill were crowded. Such a scene had not been witnessed, people said, since the centenary of the landing of the Loyalists was celebrated in 1888, and it probably never will be surpassed or equalled, save on the occasion of the return of our soldiers victorious after the war, when German arrogance and pride shall have been brought to the dust, and the wrecking of treaties and the murder of babes and women avenged.

The City Cornet Band, always ready to assist in public events, was on hand, also the Carleton Cornet. One took up station on a wharf at the bow of the steamer. The 26th was placed near Water street, in front of the troops. Alternately they played, and as popular airs were heard, soldiers and people sang and sprightly members of the battalion joyfully danced in the ranks. So it went on while the plumes were being checked off and mannequins into the large shed on the way to the Caledonia. Meantime there were more good-byes and many more presentations to the men. About 8:30 o'clock, as the sun sank in the west, the crowds began to thin out and people left for their

were in far distant parts and who had not seen their folk for a lengthy period. Theirs was a soulful loneliness, with their thoughts wandering far from the cheering, swaying, part weeping crowd upon the pier, out to some quiet home where a joyous welcome would be theirs, if the fortunes of war allowed them to return.

Addresses to the Men.

About 9:30 o'clock there arrived Lieut. Governor Wood, Mayor Frink, the city commissioners, and public officials and prominent citizens, in whose honor the soldiers set up a lengthy cheering. Brief addresses were given by the lieutenant governor and the mayor. The former spoke from a platform improvised on the upper deck of the steamer, saying how proud he was to have an opportunity of addressing so excellent a body of soldiers, whom he praised for their bravery and loyalty. He hoped for the safety of them all, after having nobly done their duty, but some must be wounded and others must die—the sacrifice was great, indeed, but the cause was greater, the overthrow of militarism and the crushing of the Prussian horde.

His Worship Mayor Frink in a short address praised the men for their gallantry in volunteering, and referred to the pleasure of their stay in the city while in training. It was a matter of

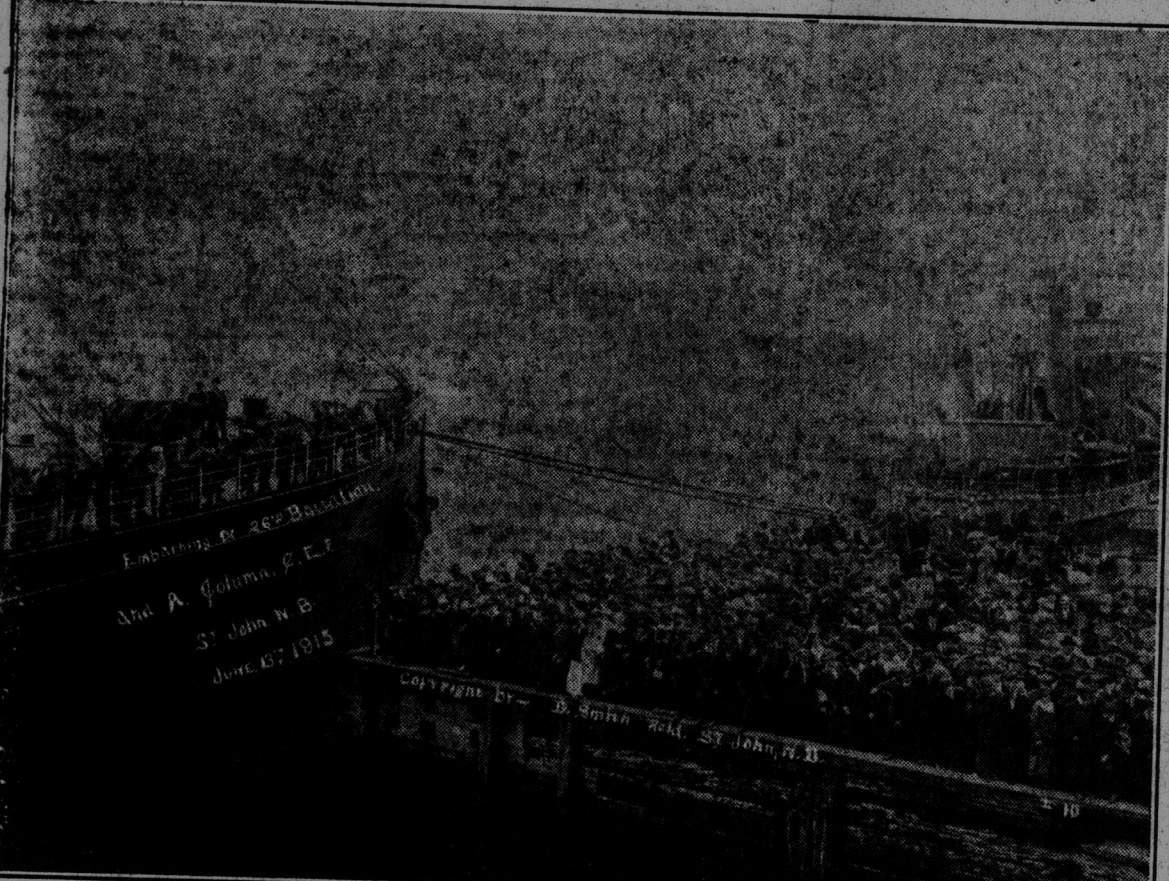


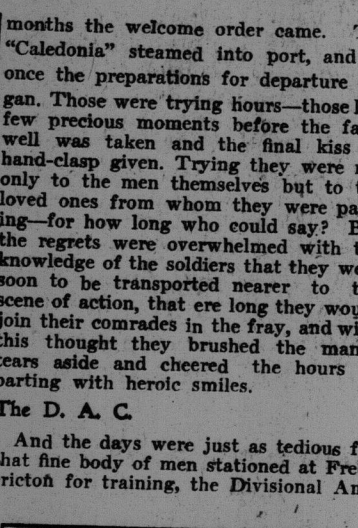

The Last Farewell.

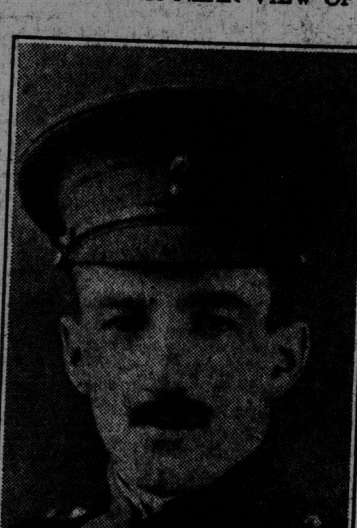
Because of the censors' requests and in compliance with the wish of the War Office, no newspaper publication of the sailing of the steamer "Caledonia" from St. John on Sunday, June 13 has been made. But now there is no need of further restriction. The "Caledonia" has successfully carried her gallant human cargo to the shores of Britain, and there is no longer fear of information of their sailing reaching quarters where it might be used to the detriment of the Empire cause.

Since last November those heroic lads of the 26th have been assembled at St. John. Week after week, and month after month they waited with growing impatience, for the order for their going. They were eager to "be up and doing,"

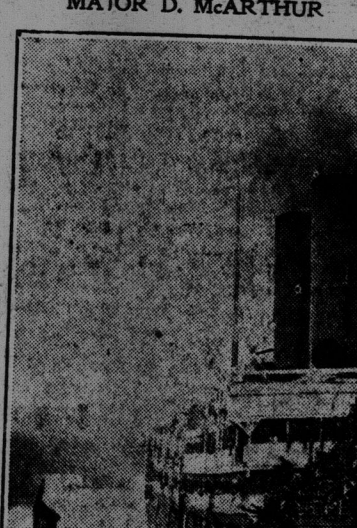

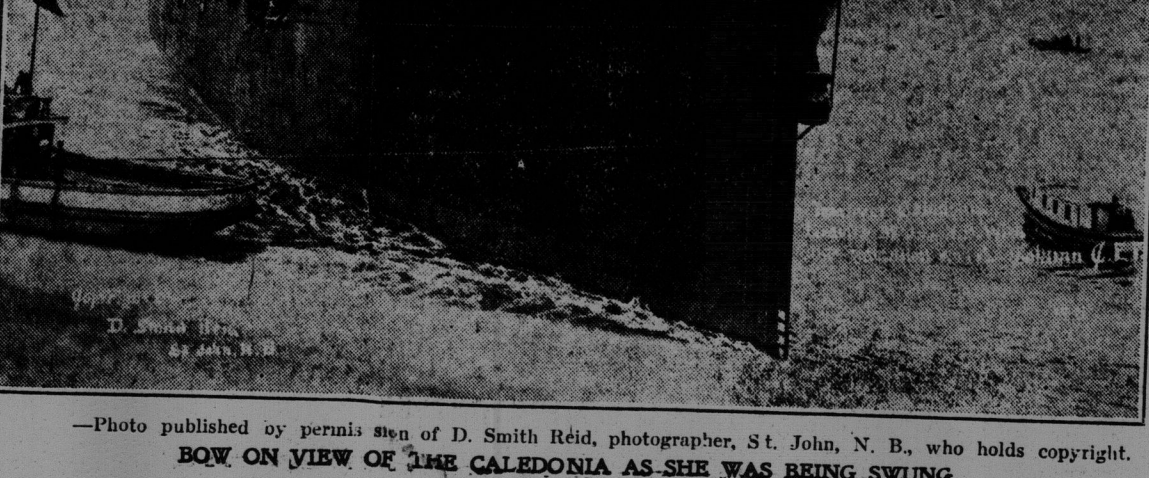
