We absorb 15 per cent. of your exports to the value of \$600,000,000 a year. The United States buys \$350,000,000 of goods from us each year. There is a great commercial activity and inter-change of products now and this is on the increase. With the proposition of making the St. Lawrence navigable and the increasing needs of your people for our foodstuffs, this traffic will in-crease."

"I pay tribute here to our competing railroad, the Canadian Pacific; so splendidly conceived and so magnifi-cently operated. It is a credit to Can-ada and to the railroad as an insti-tution. Such competition as there is, is merely in good works and serving the people. Our situation has no part in American politics. We have nothing to do with the advantages or disad-vantages of government ownership here. Our situation is that confront-ing any railroad built in a new coun-try.

RUM FLEET'S END SOON, IS PREDICTED

October Operations are Basis for Statement From U. S. Treasury.

Washington, Nov. 14—The adminis-tration is making every effort within the means at its command to break up the rum fleets stationed off American shores, and believes that it can end the "national disgrace," the treasury an-nounced in a formal statement embody-ing a report by the Coast Guard cover-ing operations in October. The statement pointed out that there was an increase in the number of seiz-ures of rum-running boats last month, and added that the Coast Guard was-making satisfactory progress in com-

and added that the Coast Guard was-making satisfactory progress in com-batting the liquor fleets. Plans of the Coast Guard, for which money was provided by the last Congress, are rap-idly maturing, the treasury said, add-ing that with the increased facilities supplied under the extra appropria-tions the Coast Guard will serve as an effective weapon against the illicit trade.

"The administration is determined," the treasury statement said, "to make every effort with the material it has to combat and, if possible, to break up the rum fleets which have become a national disgrace off our coasts. 




