Assembly Also to Choose a Permanent Clerk-Finances. Missions and Church

Canadian Press.)

Port Arthur, Ont., May 30.—On Wednesday evening, June 6, when the Presbyterian general assembly opens in St. Paul's Church in this city, one of the first steps to be taken after the preaching of the annual sermon by Rev. Dr. W. J. Clark, of Montreal, will be the election of a moderator. It is conceded that Rev. Dr. Gandier, for many years principal of Knox College, Toronto, will be, elected.

One of the items of business which will come up this year will be the election of a permanent clerk of the assembly. This was a position held for about 30 years by the late Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal. On the death of Dr. Campbell in 1921, the position was taken by the Rev. Thomas Stewart, of Halifax, Dr. Stewart has since died, and the work of the clerk is being done temporarily by the Rev. R. B. Cochrane, minister of the College Street church in Toronto. This is one of the largest churches in the denomination and it is improbable that Mr. Cochrane will centinue to discharge the duties of the clerk's office. The assembly will therefore have to appoint a new official

The commissioners to the general assembly this year will hear from the treasurer of the denomination a statement of a large deficit in the funds for the schemes of the church. This deficit is much the largest that the church has ever had, amounting at the present time to about \$600,000.

The only way they will ever get any stability in China is to abolish all these various armies. and have one small army, subject directly to the central government, for the national defence and not for the valuglory of one military leader."



**CONSTIPATION** BILIOUSNESS Headache

Increase in Many Diseases Caused by Privations During Years of War.

London, May 16—(By Mail)—The health of the population of Russla was much lowered even before the famine in 1921, which, in spite of the measures taken by the Government and foreign relief organizations, caused the death of at least three million people, writes Fridtjof Nansen in "The Westminster Gazette."

The war and the Russian civil war had in reality not only cost the lives of three-and-a-half millions directly, but had, in addition, encouraged an unusual outcrop of diseases, which assumed an epidemic character and were spread far and wide by the movement of troops, refugees and prisoners.

Tuberculosis had become widely diffused among the under-nourished population, living under the most unhygienic condition, and the cases of premature ageing were innumerable. The famine led to a dangerous new outbreak of epidemics. It is calculated that from 1918 to 1922 there were between 20 and 30 million cases of typhus.

Inat means that during recent years the whole of Russia has been scourged with this epidemic, which has caused the death of vast numbers of persons, but has also made the population as a whole almost immune, as though by

a whole almost limitine, as thought by vaccination.

During these awful years the Russian medical institutions were disorganized in the extreme. Equipment and medical instruments have become more and more rare and have been worn out; and the lack of medicine has become continually more urgent. The medical personnel has been in a situation of acute difficulty, especially in the famine area. Many delegates have reported several cases where doctors have died of starvation.

Nevertheless, the Russian and foreign journalists who were on the spot during the most critical times reported the admirable courage with which the Russian doctors fought against the epidemics. Isolated in small towns where the death rate was terrible, cut off

the death rate was terrible, cut off from the centres of culture at home and abroad, they still did all in their
