BALDWIN'S SON IS SOCIALIST MARTYR

Imprisoned by Bolsheviks and Turks and Barely Escaped Execution.

(Special Cable to the N. Y. Times and Montreal Gazette)
London, May 28.—Stanley Baldwin must be the first British prime minister with a son who is a proved Socialist. Oliver Baldwin, who is one of the Premier's six children, has suffered prison, starvation and almost death itself for the cause of Socialism.

The story of his extraordinary adventures and privations was told by him to the Westminster Gazette.
"It was in September of 1920," he said, "that I went to Armenia, at the request of the president of the republic, as an instructor to the army. During the Turkish-Armenian war we were beaten by the Turks in November and next month the Bolsheviks swept down and took the country by force. One of their first acts was to throw me into jail, together with many Social Revolutionaries and Socialists of the Second International. In this, as in many other acts, they showed themselves completely regardless of the welfare of Socialists and lovers of liberty."
Oliver Baldwin produced from his wallet an orange-colored card, which he said was a certificate of his membership in the Dashnakutun, one of the most powerful of the social revolutionary bodies.
"I esteem my election to that body," he said, "as my greatest honor, especially as I was its only non-Armenian member. At that time I was a witness of one of the vilest acts committed by the Bolsheviks. Before my eyes they executed 75 Armenian Socialists. I was let out on parole about January 16, after six weeks in prison, and I spent my time going about seeing how Bolshevism worked.
"Scourged and bleeding though she

was, Armenia managed to effect counter revolution in February. For some time the Bolsheviks were kept at bay, but at length in April the Armenians were forced back into Persia.

"In March I left for Turkey, armed with a passport given by the Komalists for safe conduct across Turkey. I know now that it was only a trap for me. In the horrors of that march across the Caucasus, perhaps the worst were that I was snowblind and frost-bitten. I was accompanied by an adjutant, a fine fellow, who is now starving in Germany.

"At Alexandropol I was arrested by the Turks and sent to prison at Kara for a month. Then I was moved to another prison, where I was shut up with chains on my feet, and starving for five more weary months. I used to crawl about on my hands eating scraps of food. During that time the Bolsheviks asked for me to be handed back to them for execution, but the Turks were not quite as unprincipled as that.

"But in prison with me were two Communists who were executed outside my window. At last an exchange was fixed, and after a weary walk from Erensern to Trebizond, I made my way back to England."

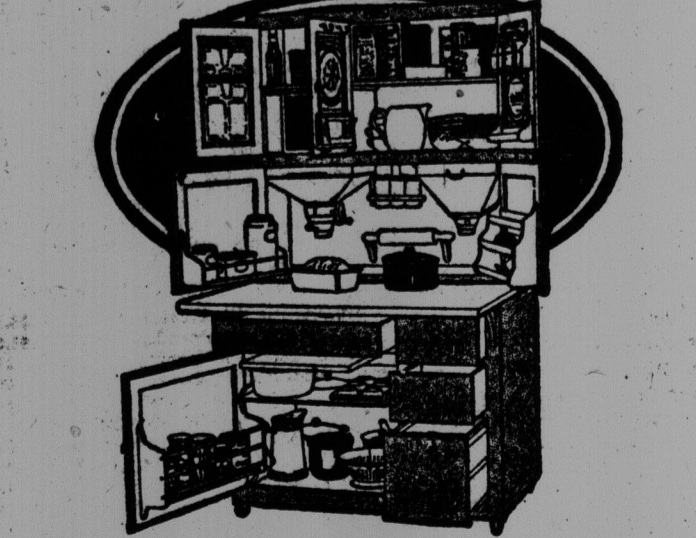

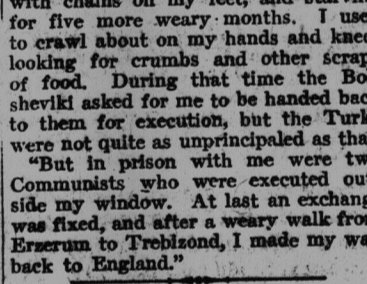

REV. DR. GANDIER LIKELY MODERATOR

Assembly Also to Choose a Permanent Clerk—Finances, Missions and Church Union.

(Canadian Press)
Port Arthur, Ont., May 28.—On Wednesday evening, June 6, when the Presbyterian general assembly opens in St. Paul's Church in this city, one of the first steps to be taken after the preaching of the annual sermon by Rev. Dr. W. J. Clark, of Montreal, will be the election of a moderator. It is conceded that Rev. Dr. Gandier, of Toronto, will be elected.

One of the items of business which will come up this year will be the election of a permanent clerk of the assembly. This was a position held for about 80 years by the late Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal. On the death of Dr. Campbell in 1921, the position was taken by the Rev. Thomas Stewart, of Halifax. Dr. Stewart has since died, and the work of the clerk is being done temporarily by the Rev. R. B. Cunniff, of Montreal.

Each year there are submitted to the assembly statistics showing the standing and progress of the church. Without going into the figures too minutely it may be stated that this year the statistics show that the church in Canada holds property to the amount of \$80,000,000. It raised in 1922 for all its purposes, benevolent and congregational, between nine and ten million dollars, of which nearly one-third was for benevolent purposes. The total number of ministers on the rolls of the Presbyteries is about 1,700 and the total number of elders is about 12,000. The present membership of the church stands at 369,939, a gain in the year of 12,728 over the previous year. The profession of faith by 17,856 persons joined the church during the year and by certificate, 18,988. The number of members in the church is 201,757, an increase of 5,088. Single persons identified with the church number 146,774, an increase of 2,490. In the Sunday schools there are 290,443 scholars, an increase of 14,844. Of teachers there are reported 31,172, a gain of 1,078.

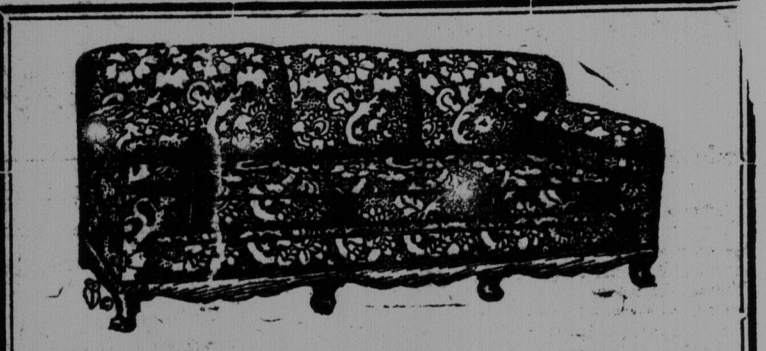
The report of the foreign mission committee to the assembly will show that the sum of \$225,000 is being spent this year. Unless larger sums are given for the work of the church in foreign lands this year, much of this work must be given up. The church needs special gifts this year of about \$200,000 to maintain its benevolent work at home and abroad. Church union will likely be taken up on June 6.

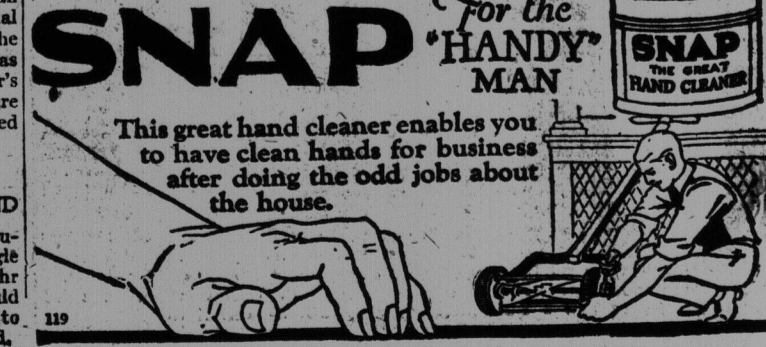

After referring to the sad situation in the Near East, he deplored the discord he still found affecting groups in England and Ireland.

"Our paternal eyes," he said, "see in the crowd of combatants some among the best of our children, beloved for various reasons by this Holy Apostolic See."
We see the children of the Island of Saints (Ireland), also the children of the Island of Angels (England), the children of the church's first born (France), and the children of that Catholic Germany who, despite her deep sorrow and such solid industrial organization of Catholic life. He had done everything humanly possible to end such painful conditions and he would not relax his efforts so long as there was any hope of success, crying "Peace, peace, peace," from the bottom of his heart.

Alluding to recent events in Russia where he said the Catholic ecclesiastics executed and imprisoned, had been only guilty of doing their duty, the Pontiff mentioned their names as titles of honor, saying their death or imprisonment made the Catholic faith shine more brilliantly.

The Pontiff also expressed paternal admiration of the Russian Orthodox ecclesiastics enduring like sufferings, and he invoked for all the humanitarian measures which the entire civilized world demanded. Despite these sad events, he added, the relief work undertaken by the Holy See in Russia would not cease.

POLICE ORDERED TO RID WEST NEW YORK OF 'UNDESIRABLES'

Saloons Closed, Many Resorts Raided in Round-Up Following Killing of Two Jersey City Policemen.
New York, May 30.—Officials of West New York, N. J., ordered the police to clean up the town, following the shooting of Lieutenant Harry O'Connell of the West New York police in Jersey City, Tuesday morning by Frank Miller, alias Sage, who killed two Jersey City officers and wounded another when they trapped him in a Jersey City rooming house with a woman companion, known as May Miller. The gunman and the woman are awaiting trial in the Hudson County Jail, Jersey City.
The cleanup order in West New York is for the purpose of ridding the community of undesirable, such as Miller, who, the police say, was implicated in the \$19,000 hold-up of a Public Service Railway messenger there last winter. The order also is the result of numerous complaints made to the Town Council that rough strangers have been seen in town.
After closing up two saloons which are said to have harbored undesirable police raided all questionable places in the hope of rounding up gangsters and runners.
Mayor O'Neill went before the men of the police department yesterday and explained the conditions which caused the town council to act in an effort to make the town "safe and clean."
Prosecutor Milton of Hudson County said the case of Miller and the woman would not be brought to trial Monday, but would have to wait for change for the better in the condition of Lieutenant O'Connell, who is in a critical condition in the Jersey City Hospital. O'Connell is expected to be able to give evidence to the effect that the woman had a hand in the murders and that she fired the bullet that killed Policeman Weir.

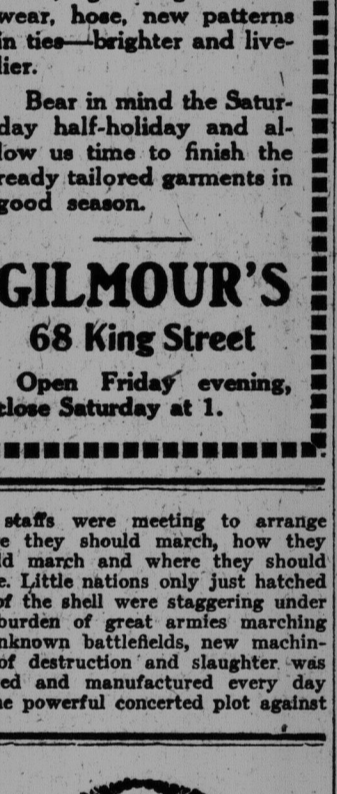

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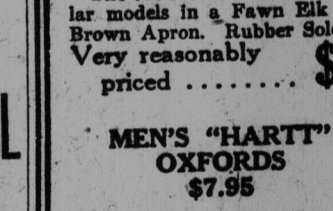

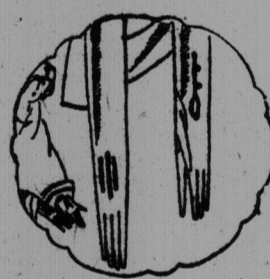

Look For Fortress Of The Israelites

Expect Much Light on Biblical History.

London, May 17.—(By mail)—R. A. Stewart Macalister, Professor of Celtic Archaeology at the National University of Dublin, will shortly leave for Palestine to supervise excavation work at the site of the old City of David.
Professor Macalister is director of the Palestine Exploration Fund, having succeeded Dr. F. J. Bliss.
Early last year a scheme was started for an excavation of the site of the ancient city.
This, it has been definitely decided, was situated on the eastern hill which runs north of the present City of Jerusalem.
Professor Macalister says it is impossible to say what the fruits of the excavations will be, as Palestine was not a country where art was cultivated to the same extent as in Egypt, but considerable light will, it is hoped, be thrown on Biblical history.
It was in the hope of discovering what were the numerous buildings referred to in Old Testament history as having been fortified by different kings that the present work was undertaken.
The excavations may disclose correspondence tablets used for messages between the Israelites, Egypt, and neighboring cities.

Crushed Strawberry Jam
For this jam it is necessary that each berry be broken up. Therefore, place about 1 1/2 cups (3 lbs.) berries in a large bowl. Measure 1 level cup (1 lb.) of each into large bottle. Add 7 level cups (1 lb.) crushed berries into large bottle, add 7 level cups (1 lb.) sugar and mix well. Use hottest fire and stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil for one full minute, remove from fire and stir in 1/2 bottle (about 1/2 cup) Certo. From this jam is taken the first 1/2 to about not over 5 minutes, by the clock, before pouring. Gives Health Rules For Vacationists

Commissioner Monaghan Tells What to Beware of When Out of the City.

New York, May 30.—The necessity for health care during vacation was emphasized by Health Commissioner Frank J. Monaghan, who gave some suggestions to insure good health during out-of-town visits.

"In planning vacation, and indeed in planning week-end trips, the following facts should be borne in mind: The purpose of vacation is to rest, to renew our vigor and energy, to restore our capacity for work, in short, to improve our good health," he said. "With this fundamental fact in mind, our vacations should not be spent in a wild orgy of pleasure, so that we return home more tired than when we left. The ordinary vacation should endeavor to spend the most of his vacation in the open, but in doing so he should not overtax his strength. Too much violent exercise will do him more harm than good."

"Now, as to a selection of a place to spend a vacation, whether it is a month or a day. Those of us who have resided in the city for any length of time have grown so accustomed to a pure water, milk and food supply that when we go out of the city we are apt to pay insufficient attention to the source from which these various supplies are secured."

"It is for that reason that so many vacationists return to the city with typhoid fever. Today most of the primary cases of typhoid fever reported in the city are contracted outside. Therefore it is important in selecting a resort that we inquire into its sanitary condition. Most communities have provided themselves with a safe municipal supply of water. In outlying districts, such a supply is not available. In these instances the water or surface wells must be purified in order to be safe. All doubtful water should be boiled."

"Most people visiting the country, especially in the farming regions, make it a point to drink a lot of milk, feeling that when they secure the supply almost immediately from the cows that it must be pure and wholesome. As a matter of fact, the milk supply of a small community is often unsafe, because of the absence of sanitary precautions. Therefore be sure that the supply of milk you get is clear; that it is kept properly cool until consumed. If you have any doubt as to the source of the milk supply, see that the milk is pasteurized before it is used. A simple method of pasteurization is to heat the milk to boiling point, allow it to stand from ten to fifteen minutes and then cool it rapidly."

"See to it that the place you visit is free from flies or mosquitoes, or at least that it is protected against these carriers of disease and filth. There is a harmless and positive protection against typhoid fever in the form of anti-typhoid vaccination. Your physician can vaccinate you before you go and make you immune to the dangers of this disease, or you may be vaccinated without charge by the Department of Health."

"Every one who has not recently been vaccinated against smallpox should secure this simple protection before going out of the city. Within the last year or two there has been a material increase in the number of cases of smallpox throughout the country and also in the virulence of the disease. It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that we protect ourselves against the possibilities of infection by this terrible disease, which so frequently proves fatal."

"Health is our most valuable asset. Let us guard it carefully while on vacation in order that we may return home renewed in vigor and full of pep."

Pershing Presents A Flag to Y. M. C. A.

Portsmouth, N.H., May 29.—To the Second World's Conference of Y. M. C. A. Workers with boys, opening here tomorrow, a gift from General John J. Pershing, a large silk American flag, will be presented through Dr. John R. Mohr, general secretary of the International Committee, Y. M. C. A. This flag will take its place with the flags of upwards of fifty countries hanging in the conference auditorium.

A letter which General Pershing sent to the conference with the flag is as follows:

"It is a pleasure to be given the privilege of addressing this brief message to you who are charged with such all important responsibilities. The citizens of tomorrow are moulded through the influence, teachings, and directions of today. We have confidence that, with your wise counsel and guidance, the boy will not only profit in the present but will be better prepared to meet the problems and opportunities that are certain to confront him in the future."

"If I may be permitted, I trust you will accept this American flag as an expression of my deep personal affection for, and interest in, the boys of every land, and my cordial good wishes for the highest success in your deliberations."

Business and professional men of many countries, interested in abridgment work for boys, are a conspicuous part of the approximately 900 delegates gathered for the conference. Delegates from the warring nations are joining in these meetings as they did at the first world conference of this kind in Oxford, England, just prior to the conflict. At the request of non-English speaking delegates, English will be the official language.

Judgment for the plaintiff for \$1,168 was given yesterday in the case of Hayes vs. Carleton, by Chief Justice McKewen. The claim was for improvements made by a tenant on the property of a landlord. IMPERIAL WIZARD SUING KLAN HEAD FOR \$100,000

Evans Seeks Damages in Arkansas Court Charging Libel by Emperor Simmons.

Little Rock, Ark., May 30.—H. W. Evans, imperial wizard of the Ku-Klux Klan, filed suit here against William J. Simmons, emperor of the Klan, asking \$100,000 damages for libelous statements said to have come from Simmons. The statements were printed in a local newspaper.

The basis for Dr. Evans' suit was a telegram which Emperor Simmons is alleged to have sent to local newspapers for publication on May 13. According to the petition filed, the telegram charged that Dr. Evans during a period six months prior to the telegram, received fees in excess of \$100,000 belonging to the Klan and deposited them to his personal credit and appropriated them to his own use.

The telegram, it is set forth, was an answer made to charges against Emperor Simmons by James A. Stone, grand dragon of the Arkansas Knights of the Ku-Klux Klan that the Klan is a women's organization, founded by Simmons, was a "fee grabbing scheme."

WINS \$275 FOR SLAP ON FACE BY WOMAN

Worcester, May 29.—A jury in the superior court here assessed damages of \$275 against Mrs. Annie Shufra of Worcester for slapping the face of Joseph H. Brevard, also of Worcester. Brevard asked for \$200. The testimony was that on April 1, 1920, Brevard, who is a contractor, was working for Mrs. Shufra at her house under a contract where the incident happened.

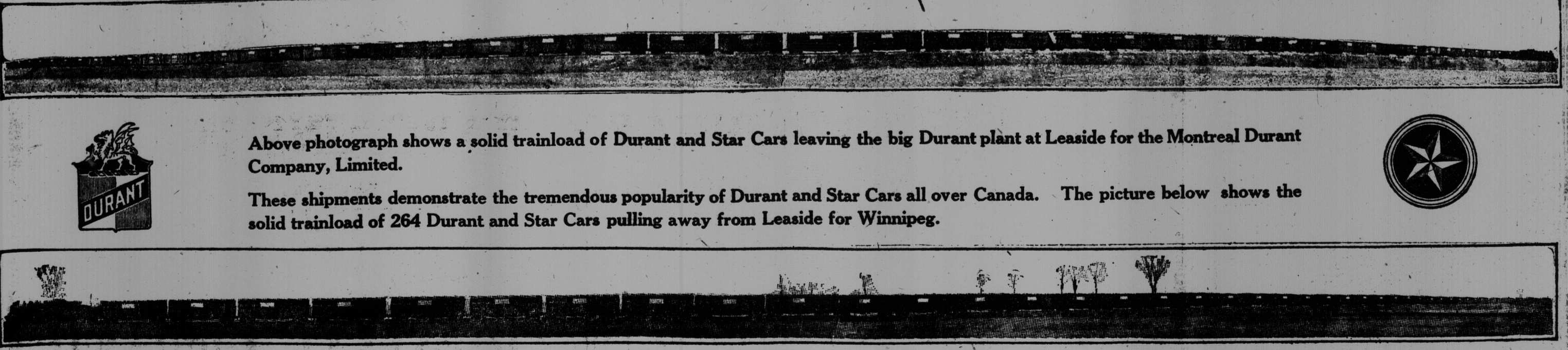

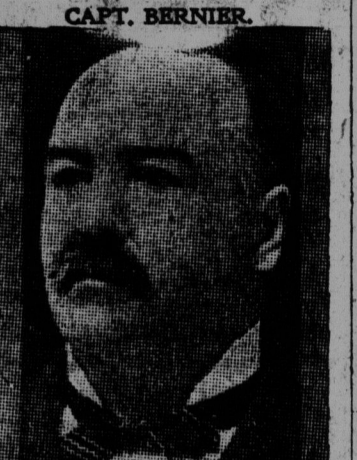

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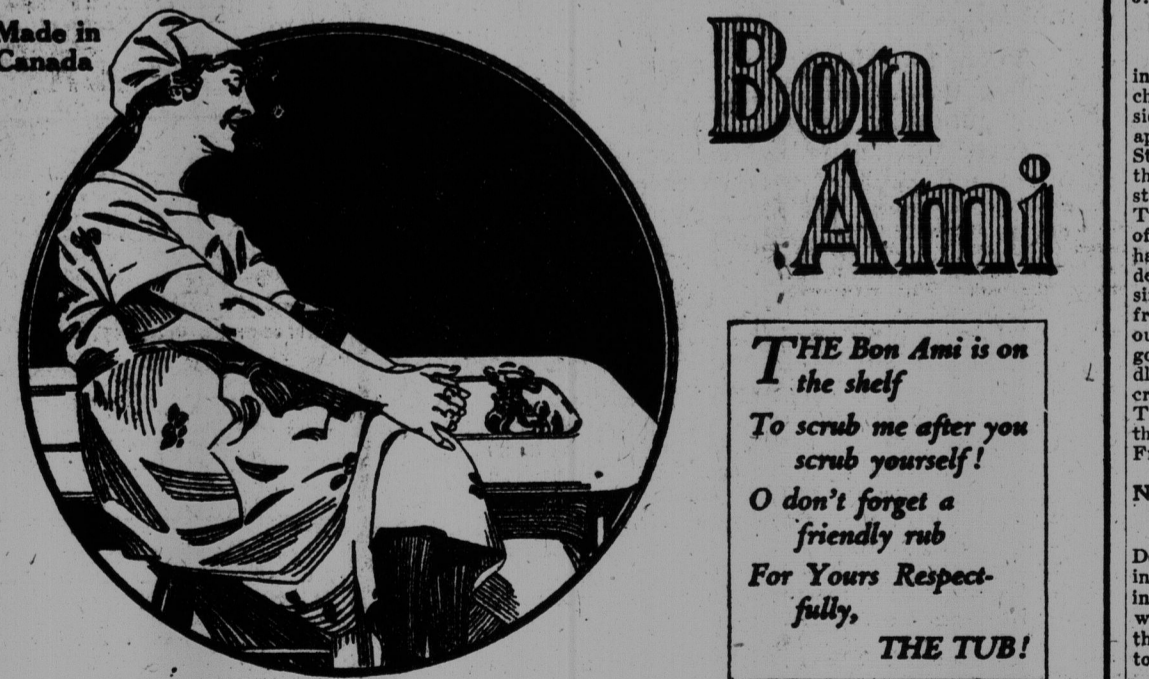

Favorite Authors Of Queen Victoria
Shakespeare, Scott, Tennyson, and Procter Are Included

London, May 17.—(By Mail)—An article contributed to the Quarterly Review by Lord Erle deals with Victorian Memoirs and Memories. It gives a list of Queen Victoria's favorite authors sent to him by her in 1896. Among English writers her favorite dramatist and poets were Shakespeare, Walter Scott, Tennyson, and Alford Procter. The byrnes of Bonar and Faber were those to which she was especially attached. Her favorite novelists were all women—Jane Austen, Charlotte Bronte, Mrs. Oliphant, Mrs. Craik George Eliot, and Edith Lyall. The list is old-fashioned. Its range is restricted and even seems to have been arrested.

In the Victorian age women seem to have spent comparatively little on their dress.

A little earlier than 1855 Lady Georgiana Russell had her dress allowance raised to \$200 a year. As the daughter of a Prime Minister and Foreign Minister she had to meet members of the corps diplomatique, who were much more smartly dressed than most English women, the Austrians being particularly distinguished for beautiful clothes.

There is a story of an incident which befell Lord Erle at a lawn tennis party in England given to the Crown Prince Frederick of Germany.

He wore a straw hat on which was the red, black and yellow ribbon of the Zouave. Suddenly the Prince's squerry came up to him and said, "The colors which you are wearing are those of the most advanced Socialist club in Berlin. If they have any similar meaning in this country his Imperial Highness will feel obliged to leave at once."

It was explained that the ribbon was quite harmless, and was indeed worn by the Prince of Wales of that day.

China Armed Camp Says Frothingham
Congressman Warns of More Banditry and Bloodshed

Congressman Louis A. Frothingham, just returned from a trip to the Orient, told a Boston Herald reporter in an interview last week that the troubles in China are not over by any means, and that drastic steps should be taken at the earliest opportunity, or more banditry and bloodshed would come. During his stay in China, the congressman went from Fukow to Peking, using the same line that was attacked recently by bandits, when a number of American captives were made captive and held for ransom.

"This is the line the bandits attacked just before it crosses the Yellow river," said he. "This railroad has five trains of cars. They are painted blue, are spick and span, and were made in the United States. It has the best train in China and the best road. Part of it was built by the English and part by the Germans. That is shown by the type of railroad stations. You can really tell where the English stopped and the Germans began in Shantung province."

"The trouble with China is that there are so many different armies owing allegiance to various chiefs and over whom the British government has no control. It is snipping the whole energy of the country. Taxes are collected six months ahead, but very little goes to the central government. The consequence is that police, school teachers and other government officials are unpaid. The only way they will ever get any stability in China is the abolition of these various armies. The police are small army, subjecting directly to the central government, for the national defence and not for the victory of one military leader."

Saw Legislators Fight.
Asked to relate some of his experiences while in China, the congressman said:

"I went into both houses of congress, or parliament. The speaker of the house was surrounded by soldiers, who inspected everyone and his pass carefully before he was permitted to go in. I hadn't been in there more than five minutes when a free fight broke out and spread all over the floor. While out and spread all over the floor, the speaker, a member was carried out on a stretcher, having been hit on the head with an inkstand. The speaker either had no power or inclination to stop it."

"The thing to do is for the able men and business people of China to get together and insist on the adoption of a constitution and the election of a president and parliament, so that it is lived up to, and that the rule of the gun ceases, and law and order through the ballot is restored. The Chinese people are peace-loving, hard-working citizens, and it is a calamity that this wonderful country, where the mass of the people are to hard-working and law-abiding, should be in such a state of chaos. Seized Eight Tons Of Smuggled Opium
Police Party Stages Spectacular Raid on Island.

London, May 17.—(By Mail)—A British police officer and a party of Chinese detectives have just unearthed a huge quantity of smuggled opium on a lonely little island near Hong Kong. No less than eight tons, valued at over \$250,000 was discovered.

The police party approached the island in a native boat pulled by two Chinese boatmen, themselves hiding in the bottom of the craft. On getting near the shore, they encountered another native boat in charge of two armed guards, who were keeping watch on the island of the smugglers. These latter did not suspect that the incoming boat contained policemen. The police however, soon got alongside and sprang on to the other vessel, taking prisoner the two guards, who had revolvers dangling from lanyards passed round their shoulders.

A search of the island was made and a cleverly concealed tunnel was eventually found leading to a chamber about 30 feet square, where the opium, "Persian variety" was discovered in flour bags. A Chinese woman in the chamber was arrested.

MISS RIGGIN WINS ALL-AROUND TITLE

16-Year-Old Mermaid Takes Championship of America With 28 1/2 Points.

New York, May 30.—Miss Aileen Riggins, 16-year-old water sprite of the Women's Swimming Association of New York is America's new all-around champion mermaid. She earned the coveted title by scoring the greatest number of points in the women's senior national A. A. U. aquatic indoor championships of 1923, the last of which was decided a few days ago. She ran up a

total of 28 1/2 points in the annual event, while her closest rivals and clubmates, Miss Gertrude Ederle and Miss Helen Walnwright, garnered 15 1/2 and 18 1/2 points, respectively.

Little Miss Riggins accomplished the remarkable feat of carrying off prizes in eight of the season's tests of supremacy. She won the fancy diving championship from the four-foot springboard and helped to capture the 400-yard relay swim; she was runner-up in five events, including the fancy diving contest from the ten-foot springboard, which she lost by one point, the free-style swim at 100, 200 and 500 yards and the back stroke race at 100 yards, and she secured third place in the free-style dash at 50 yards. It was a striking display of ability and versatility. Miss Riggins' brilliant performances, too, were largely instrumental in winning the national team championship for the Women's Swimming Association. She and her teammates literally outclassed the squads of all other clubs. They accumulated, collectively, a score of 87 points, overwhelming their nearest opponents, the fair contestants of the Los Angeles Athletic Club, who returned the next best score of 10 points. Of special interest is the fact that

the young maids of the local organization made a clean sweep of the wards in every one of the individual free-style championship tests, taking first, second and third in each. The achievement, unprecedented in the history of American water sports, was the more amazing in that Miss Ederle and Miss Walnwright, the country's topnotchers in free-style swimming, were unable to take part in all the championships and lesser lights had to be entered.

Those who contributed to the association's winning tally were, in addition to the three mentioned leaders, the Misses Ethel McGivry, Florence Briscoe and Ethel Baker, the latter barely 14 years old. The Women's Swimming Association now has captured the individual and team championships for eleven consecutive seasons—ever since it was launched—and the unique feature of the astonishing success achieved is that the organization is conducted on a purely co-operative plan, without the aid of professional experts. All the coaching is done by amateurs who volunteer their services. Yet under this unusual regime there have been developed some of the finest fair contestants and teams the world has produced.

FORD'S ELECTION WOULD RUIN U. S. VILLARD ASSERTS

Declares No Candidate in Thirty Years Has Been So "Absolutely Unfit" for the White House.

New York, May 29.—Gerald Garrison Villard devotes three pages of the Nation of May 30 to "Why Ford Should Not Be President," and gives as his conclusion, after thirty years of political observation, that in the last three decades no candidate has been suggested so absolutely unfit for the White House as Henry Ford.

A feature of Mr. Villard's article is the liberal use he makes of a new book by Dr. Samuel Marquis, "Henry Ford an Interpretation." Dr. Marquis for years has been Mr. Ford's confidant, his pastor and his employee, and for three years has been at the head of the sociological department of the Ford Motor Company.

Mr. Villard uses a personal experience with the motor magnate, saying that he was the second man to be invited by Mr. Ford to call on his posse ship, the Ocean II.

"It was I," says Mr. Villard, "who suggested that the slogan Mr. Ford hit upon for his venture, 'We'll get the boys home by Christmas,' be toned down or abandoned.

Attitude Toward Employes. Referring to a "treat 'em rough" policy prevailing the Ford organization, illuminated by Dr. Marquis in his book, Mr. Villard continues:

"More than eighty men in one department went home on a sick leave, and it is probable that they were dismissed. They came to work the next morning to find the chairs and desks taken from the room in which they worked. They were left to find out as best they could that they had been fired.

"His capture of the water power in St. Paul and Minneapolis, which ought to have been reserved for the public, is another instance of the ability of the man to affect the imaginations of his fellow men. In anybody else this would have been denounced as a grab and a steal deserving of the utmost public condemnation.

"Anti-Semitism Due to Ignorance." "Take Henry Ford's crusade against the Jews," I attribute to nothing else than utter ignorance. He fell for the long-drawn-out and over-worked protocols and every old slander. I have no doubt that if he does not believe in ritualistic murders it is only because he has not been plausibly told about them.

Closing his article Mr. Villard says: "So that is why the best informed political observers say that if Ford is elected the Democratic ticket he will sweep the country. That is why

**ENGLAND QUICKLY
NEARING NORMAL**

Lord Atholstan Failed to Find a Single Pessimist While Visiting London.

Montreal, May 20.—"I failed to find a pessimist in England," was one of the statements made by Baron Atholstan on his return after a pleasure jaunt of five months, most of which was spent in Egypt.

Accompanied by Lady Atholstan and his daughter, the Hon. Alice Dalham, His Lordship crossed from England on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain.

When asked a question regarding conditions in England, His Lordship answered as quoted in the "Evening Times": "When I asked my boys and your pessimists they told me that I would have to go to the front to find them."

Certainly everybody I met was cheerful and happy and every individual displayed the utmost optimism. It was quite clear that England is close to normal, not at least according to state very rapidly. London was badly crowded and there appeared to be plenty of money to spend. The hotels were crowded, the trains were crowded, even to the extent of carrying passengers in the corridors. Spent time in Egypt.

Lord Atholstan said that he had no knowledge of conditions on the Continent and was not in a position to discuss any of the recent developments. A considerable portion of his time abroad had been spent in Egypt. "That was a most pleasant experience," said he. "There was a considerable influx of tourists and travelers to Egypt and everybody appeared to be enjoying themselves thoroughly."

His Lordship was asked if he had received any encouragement as a result of the generous offer made by him for cancer research. "I have received very encouraging reports," he answered, "and I was told that we are on the eve of important discoveries. Just what these are I am not in a position to say. You know scientific men are not very communicative and that they do not speak until they are really assured that real results have been obtained, but conditions appear most hopeful indeed."

"We had a very pleasant voyage, but it is really good to be back in Montreal," said His Lordship, as a parting word.

ART O'BRIEN AND OTHERS ON TRIAL

Charge, Attempt "by Force of Arms" to Change Constitution

Opening Statement—Case for Crown Rests Largely on Documents Seized in Raids—Alleged Arson and Outrage Campaign.

Special Cable to the N. Y. Times and Montreal Gazette.
London, May 29.—Art O'Brien, president of the Irish Self-Determination League; Sean McGrath, secretary of the league; Sean O'Mahoney and Michael Gavin were brought up at Bow Street Police Court today. They are charged with common law conspiracy to compel by force of arms a change in the constitution of the Irish Free State and of the self-governing dominions of the British Empire. According to the opening statement of Travers Humphreys, prosecuting counsel, the case for the crown rests largely on documents seized on the prisoners when they were arrested, which show they were preparing to institute a campaign of arson and outrage. Humphreys, in explaining the charge, said:—

"It means that the accused men were endeavoring by force of arms to establish a republic in a part of the British Empire. There is nothing in this prosecution of a political nature, nor is there any desire for the smallest interference with liberty of thought or free speech in this country. The essence of the charge lies in the words 'by force of arms,' and if the prosecution fails to establish that any of the prisoners knew the object of the alleged conspiracy was to use force of arms, the case against them would not proceed with. Dealing with the charge against O'Brien, Humphreys said:—

"In London last December O'Brien made a speech at a meeting at which Sean O'Mahoney was present. O'Brien referred to his excellency, Tim Healy, and described the Self-Determination League as republican, anti and out. According to shorthand notes made by a police sergeant reporter, O'Brien spoke in terms which most of those present did not appear to understand, but the speech showed that O'Brien was well aware that the money for which he appeared was wanted not only for the establishment of a republic, but for the resistance of the men who were working for it, 'by force of arms.'"

Hurls Acid Into Eyes Of Man Jilting Her
Miss Ida Abramson Tells Police She Is Glad—He Probably Will Lose Sight.
New York, May 30.—Because she received her as a sweetheart, Miss Ida Abramson, 25 years old, threw carbolic acid into the eyes of Samuel Barnett, 25 years old, she told the police. Barnett was taken to Bellevue Hospital by Dr. Wright. It was said he will probably lose the sight of both eyes. Miss Abramson was locked up in the Fifth Street Station charged with felonious assault.

member of the republican conspiracy, was captain of a company in the Irish Republican Army in England and recruited men. Letters were found on him indicating that he was regarded as the commanding officer of the company.

Humphreys then continued in solemn tones:—

"One of these letters was from Reginald Dunn, one of the two men who were executed in Pentonville prison, London, for the murder of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson. A sentence in that letter read: 'Send along a contingent from your company under a responsible person.'"

"Another document contained a list of names from seventeen to forty-one years of age. It was stated opposite each name whether the man was experienced in the use of revolvers or not. Another document was described as a 'report of operations of B Company.' This contained references to timber yards, railway bridges, glass and bottle works, railway goods stations and motor factories. It may well be that the prisoners will be joined in the dock by others."

The first witness, Inspector Cosgrave, said:—

"When I arrived and searched O'Brien I found a document purporting to appoint him a representative in London of the Irish republicans. This was written in Irish, English and French, and was signed by Eamonn de Valera. In another document found on him I found a list of names of men to allow you to catch me this time. I knew of this round up this afternoon. You won't catch as many as you expect. When I arrested O'Brien on May 16, after he was discharged under a writ of habeas corpus, I found on him a letter signed by de Valera, sent while O'Brien was interned in Dublin."

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Miss Abramson told the police that

Barnett, with whom she kept company for four years, disappeared when the time came to announce their engagement last Christmas. Since then she said she had had no word from him. Recently she learned from friends that he was employed at the Lafayette Baths. She also learned, she said, that the man was married during the four years in which he went with her.

She approached Barnett as he was coming out of the Lafayette Baths and when he refused to listen to her, she threw the acid in his face and ran away, she said.

Patrolman Sullivan of the Fifth Street Station, attracted by Barnett's cries, pursued the woman and caught her after a short chase.

Questioned at the station, the woman

said she was glad she had done it and "hoped it would be a lesson to all men of his kind."

CURED OF PARESIS BY USE OF NEW SERUM

Milwaukee, May 30.—Coincident with an announcement from Madison that a serum for the cure of paresis in early

stages and other forms of neurosyphilis had been discovered, it was learned here today that several patients had been treated at the county hospital here and discharged as cured.

A report on experiments conducted on forty-two patients at various hospitals by Drs. W. F. Lorenz, head of the State Psychiatric Institute, and A. S. Lovenhart of the University of Wis-

consin medical school, is contained in the Journal of the American Medical Association, issued today.

According to this statement twenty-one of those treated were either cured or well on the way to health.
