Fredericton, May 23—An action in the exchequer court is pending relative to land in Devon taken by the Canadian National Railway in 1918 for additional trackage and other facilities. Albert J. Miles is the owner of the land. He was offered \$1,801.25 by the C. N. R. but claimed \$10,000. The claim is based on the allegation that John A. Humble, acting as agent for the railway, falsely and fradulently represented that the lands were required as a site for a large round-house and machine shop to be used in connection with the C. N. R. and it is urged that for that reason a value lower than the fair value of the property was placed upon it, the representation of Humble being that plans for the round-house and machine-shop were prepared and that they would be built during 1918 and that in consequence other lands of the defendant could be used for building lots at a greatly enhanced value. The defendant further urges that Humble falsely represented that there was a mistake in the plans of the layout of the track, round-house, etc., and that a correct location would enable the defendant to locate two rows of building lots on land along the Marysville Road,

"An aggressive campaign should be launched to enlighten the people about the intoxicating quality of beer. It is the most insidious in the liquor rattlesnake family."

"It will be a surprise to America to know that every year the liquor traffic has entailed an economic burden upon the nation more than the equivalent of the cost of financing the war. Degeneracy cannot support the institutions of civilization. It is vain to hope for universal democracy in a degenerate world. It is vain to hope for enduring peace while the world is brutalized by drink. It is logical that the Anti-Saloon League, so successful in America, should now turn its activities into the world. It has held a convention, with delegates from every part of the world, and is already sending men and money to other lands. I am here in its name, to appeal to all good men and women to join in this last great drive to bring about a sober world."

In an article captioned "Psychoanalysis and the Keiser," the editor of American Medicine declares that the ex-German



Emperor was "always a garrulous old paranoiac, a boastful, swash-buckling, blood-and-thunder imperial hero, in no wise suited for the role destiny had imposed upon him." Following is the editor's striking picture of the Kaiser's mental and physical make-up: "For the simplest explanation of the Kaiser's grotesque personality one must go to the most complicated of sciences—psychoanalysis. His interview, given out to the world in a querulous moment and retracted in the panic that followed such an extraordinary self-revelation, must remain as a psychologic monument for all time. The Kaiser was always a querulous old paranoiac, and the generals who conducted his pathetic career knew what they were doing when they assigned Karl Rosner to him as a press agent and let him talk his heart out over tear-stirring violets and such like things for the benefit of a public to which Wilhelm had successfully played for thirty-odd years.

His shrunken arm, his pathetically puny figure, his whole unheroic and unprepossessing make-up were a constant source of humiliation to him. And, cowering under the lash of the world's accusation, he tells more of himself than the public has ever suspected. 'Don't blame me!' he cried. 'It wasn't my fault. I didn't do it. Fearing French retribution, he effusively insists that he has always been an admirer of French culture. Fearing the vengeance of the deceived German people, he swears that he has always tried to lead them into the ways of peace. Fear is the keynote of his whole confession. For the first time in his career, he utters the truth; and then, aware of how much he has revealed, he grows alarmed, and retracts the confession. He didn't do even that! There never was a clearer case of inferiority-complex.


