Arrange tunic on skirt, centers even (line range tunic on, skirt, centers even (line of large "O" perforations indicate center-front of skirt and tunic); bring single large "O" perforation mear lower edge of tunic' to corresponding perforation in skirt, and stitch right front edge to position. Stitch left front edge along line of four small "o" perfora-tions in skirt section. Stitch upper edges together, easing any fullness be-tween double "TT" perforations in tu-nic. Pleat upper edge of skirt, bringing slot perforations to corresponding double "oo" perforations and tack. Lap left front edge on right, bringing cor-responding small "o" perforations to-gether (as numbered in construction guide) and tack. Adjust a webbing or a straight strip of canvas 2 inches wide to position underneath upper edge of skirt for a stay; stitch upper edges to-A pretty variation of this skirt may

DUKE OF ARGYLL

Cowes, Isle of Wight, May 2-The Duke of Argyll, son-in-law of the late Queen Victoria and former governorgeneral of Canada, died tonight at East

Cowes, aged 69. London, May 4—The Duke of Argyll, whose death occurred on Saturday after a short illness, is the second ex-governor-general of Canada to pass away in the present year. There should be no unfair discrimination as between Halifax and St. John, since both are Canadian ports and both possess the required

While the ocean distance to Halifax is slightly shorter than the ocean distance to be traversed to St. John, the land Canada is very much shorter. 




