SOME EXTENSIONS OF LUMBER LEASES

Legislation at the Capital is Fore-shadowed

PREMIER TALKS OF BILL

Survey of Crown Lands Included—Fredericton Lawyers Oppose Some Features of Jurisdiction Act Amendment—Grimmer to The Beach and Live in St. John

(Special to Times)

Fredericton, N. B., March 13—The principal event of interest in the legislature today will be the introduction of what may be considered as the most important bill of the session, that referring to the extension of the lumber leases and the division of the crown land areas.

The minister of lands and mines, Premier Fleming, while talking quite freely upon the general scope of the measure he proposed to introduce today naturally did not reveal what to many will be the most important section, that which refers to the length of lumber leases.

A large amount will be spent on new steel and relaying rails for 115 miles of track along the coast, the expense of which would be provided from time to time. This would be somewhat along the lines laid down in the public domain act which was passed some years ago.

The bill he said had been drawn with very care after a great deal of consideration and while he did not expect that it would pass without some amendments, he was confident that it would be passed in its present form.

Speaking of the time and expense that examination, classification and grading would entail, the premier said that he hoped the cost would not be so great nor would it take so long a time to do the work as many expected.

The minister also spoke of the opportunity that such an undertaking would afford to students in the forestry department in the U. N. B. The province would be able, he said, with such an undertaking in hand to provide considerable employment for many who hitherto had sought work outside of New Brunswick.

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CHURCHILL DID NOT WRITE MEMORANDUM

Only What Was Sought by Borden Was Written into It, Says Unionist Paper

"Form Colonial Navies Should Take is Clearly a Matter Which Dominions Alone Should Decide" — Manchester Guardian Says Churchill Very Indiscreet

(Times' Special Cable)

London, Eng., March 13—The controversy between Churchill and the Canadian Liberals attracts enormous attention here. Newspapers give it the leading place on their bills and a most prominent page in the paper.

Comment as yet is guarded. Most of them content themselves with printing long Canadian dispatches.

The Daily Telegraph discusses the whole issue at great length. It wholly repudiates the suggestion of British interference in Canadian affairs and says: "The late idea of interference with the politics of the dominions, who have received their autonomous powers from the throne voluntarily and without reserve, is entirely foreign to British opinion. We treat with some confidence that any feeling of soreness which may be entertained by Canadian Liberals at the present moment will be speedily removed."

COMMON KNOWLEDGE THAT CHURCHILL DID NOT WRITE IT

Its naval correspondent declares it is common knowledge in naval circles that the memorandum was not written by Mr. Churchill. He acted merely as the channel between the sea lords of admiralty and the Canadian government, in reply to the request for information. This was not volunteered by the admiralty, but asked for by Borden.

"British sailors are not politicians. The difference in political view between Borden and Laurier are not within their province. They wrote only that which was sought by the Canadian premier."

"The Daily News declares that the moral to be drawn from the matter is that the first duty of the country is to avoid the appearance of dictating the line of the naval defence. Canada as a whole is unanimous on the subject of making provision for naval defence. The form colonial navies should take is clearly a matter which the dominions alone should decide."

"Any appearance of interference on our part would divert domestic controversy between eastern and western Canada into ineffectual antagonism to imperial connection, and this would be a disastrous result," says the Manchester Guardian.

The Guardian also says that the language used in the Canadian commons may seem somewhat disproportionate to Mr. Churchill's offence, but it was an offence that could not be expected to pass unnoticed.

It is indicated by Mr. Churchill to write the memorandum, but having written it he certainly ought to have withheld permission to use it for the purposes of party controversy. It was not only a breach of impartial neutrality between contending parties in the colonies, but it touched Canada on the most sensitive spot, namely national pride. No doubt the storm will subside, but let it be a warning as to the nationalist feelings of the dominions beyond the sea, that they will only look towards England so long as she avails even the appearance of condescension, between colonial associations and imperial ambition.

CANADIAN GIRLS IN PITTSFIELD, MASS., RAID; TELL STORY OF WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

Boston, March 13—Detailed stories of how they were enticed to the restaurant of Stephen Tibri in Pittsfield and confined there for three weeks under threat of death have been told by the authorities in the person of William Lahey, who died after a short illness at his home in St. James street.

For sixty years he was a prominent figure about the waterfront, being one of the best known pilots not only sailing from St. John, but in the list of this sturdy class along the bay, and his passing today takes away one of the old school who contributed much to the upbuilding of shipping and aiding navigation in local waters.

Pilot Lahey had attained the advanced age of ninety years. He had always enjoyed very good health, and had been out only last week, so that his death today came as a shock. Four sons survive, Harry, Edward, George and Frederick. The funeral will be held on Saturday from his late home in St. James street.

A period of sixty years in active service in piloting naturally seems many changes, and in a growing place like St. John, this was particularly true with the fall of the olden days of shipping and shipbuilding, and had seen the evolution in marine circles from the old-time wooden vessels as ocean-going to the masterful, imposing ironclads. For there were also who sailed in or out of St. John who did not know Pilot Lahey. In his sixty years of duty he had brought safely to port many a large vessel or steamer, and his ability in handling the biggest of them in the most trying circumstances was recognized. He had a host of friends about the city and amongst the shipping men not only in St. John but wherever vessels or steamers were whose masters had come in contact with him.

HERE IS REFORM OF HOUSE OF LORDS

Announcement Made in the British Commons

ELECTED SECOND CHAMBER? Never Again the Absolute Veto—Change to Come During Present Parliament—Full Plan Not Yet Given Out, But Impartial Revising Authority Aimed At

(Canadian Press)

London, March 13—An important statement was made last night by Postmaster General Samsel in the Commons, in regard to the government plan for the reform of the House of Lords.

Mr. Samsel said that the government would take the earliest available opportunity of proposing a plan which would make the House of Lords a truly impartial and judicial authority.

It was left to Mr. Samsel to indicate the lines on which the reform will be carried out. The new second chamber he said, would contain no vestige of the hereditary principle. Under no circumstances would it be absolute veto be restored. The House of Lords would be abolished during the lifetime of the present parliament.

This is as far as Mr. Samsel went, but previous declarations of the government show that the proposal is likely to be an elected second chamber of about 100 senators or "lords of parliament."

The question of the reform of the lords arose in the course of the debate on the address moved by the Right Hon. Walter Long, M. P. It is concerned with the operations of the parliament act and submitted that "it would be improper to proceed further with measures of reform still incomplete and without reference to the electors."

Mr. Long said the government had shirked the legislation by the failure of the government to fulfill their debt of honor and reform the lords. The country has been left under the single chamber. The government for the House of Lords is at present paralyzed so far as effective action goes.

Mr. Asquith, replying asked: "Who shatters the constitution?" On the constituent arrangement was shattered. He answered, "when three or four years ago the House of Lords rejected a bill of Mr. Asquith's government."

Everything that has since happened in the re-arrangement of our constitutional system is the direct, legitimate and inevitable consequence of that arbitrary and revolutionary proceeding."

After declaring the parliament act as "imperfect and incomplete thing," Mr. Asquith added, "I shall welcome with unaffected sincerity, the day, and I hope it will very soon arrive, when I shall have the honor of proposing a plan which will reconstruct the second chamber as a truly impartial and judicially-minded revising authority."

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SPEND MORE THAN MILLION AND HALF

Big Appropriations For C.P.R. On This Division

MEANS MUCH TO ST. JOHN

Largest Item is \$630,000 Towards Cost of New Elevator and Facilities—Important Announcement Made

(Special to Times)

The C. P. R. appropriation for new and repair work on the Atlantic division for the coming season amounts to more than a million and a half dollars. The amount spent annually by the Canadian Pacific has become an important item in the industrial affairs of the province and as St. John gets more than one-third of the amount this year's railway expenditures mean considerably more to the wage earners of the city than a great many industries would.

The largest single item is one of about \$630,000 towards the cost of the new grain elevator at West St. John, its power house and yard and truck facilities in connection with it.

The next in size is the appropriation for bridges and culverts. This includes the cost of replacing some large bridges and renewals and repairs for many smaller ones.

A large amount will be spent on new steel and relaying rails for 115 miles of track along the coast, the expense of which would be provided from time to time. This would be somewhat along the lines laid down in the public domain act which was passed some years ago.

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TORIES KEEP UP THE ROWDINESS

Scene in the House Last Night Scandalous

A GLARING INSTANCE

Conservative Who Had Spent Festive Night Makes Stalemate Remark to Dr. Loggie—Dr. Pugliese Leads the Fight

(Special to Times)

Ottawa, Ont., March 13—The strain is telling on the Conservatives. Commanded to silence by their leaders, they are making spectacles of themselves by continuous hoodlumism during the long night sittings, while the Liberals continue, confidently and militantly, to drive home their arguments.

The rowdiness reached its worst when Mr. Loggie of Northumberland, N. B., was speaking between four and five o'clock this morning. The Conservatives kept up a continuous noise. Groans, cat calls, and other kindred disturbances caused the veteran New Brunswicker to repeatedly pause, unable to be heard. But he stood his ground.

"All that to your Bible class" was the pleasantry which one Conservative member, who had put in a somewhat festive night, hurled at him with the apparent purpose of ridiculing the fact that Mr. Loggie was an elder in the Presbyterian church of his home town.

"Feed them on rotten fish," was another example of the wit and manners of the government, interrupted, amid continued uproar.

Hon. Dr. Pugliese demanded the attention of the chair and sternly asked for some semblance of order and respectability on the part of honorable gentlemen present. When once the noise subsided, he took the kind of hostile government members shambled out of the chamber.

"If only the people of Canada could witness these things themselves, they would not need any further argument to understand the kind of battle the government members are waging," was the comment of Duncan Ross, who arrived with the early relay to take up the work of Chief Whip Purdie.

Liberals who carried on the discussion during the night were again called upon by Mr. Churchill to take up the work of Chief Whip Purdie.

Mr. Churchill had stirred up a hornet's nest by his ill-considered letter. Mr. Loggie, who took the ground of strong and vigorous Canadianism; Mr. Broux, who demanded again that the question be submitted to the people; Messrs. Fortier and Papineau, who spoke in French; Mr. Hughes of Prince Edward Island, who deplored the somewhat of the premier and the Conservative party on the naval policy; and Mr. White of Victoria, Alberta.

"Mr. White declared that he had not yet been able to find a single elector in his constituency who supported the Borden policy."

"Mr. Churchill," said Mr. White, "has a great deal of presumption when he undertakes to tell Canadians that they cannot do things. I hope for Britain's sake that he knows more about the admiralty than he does about Canada."

The issue was one of principle, and Mr. White said the Canadian people should pass on it. "Let the government take

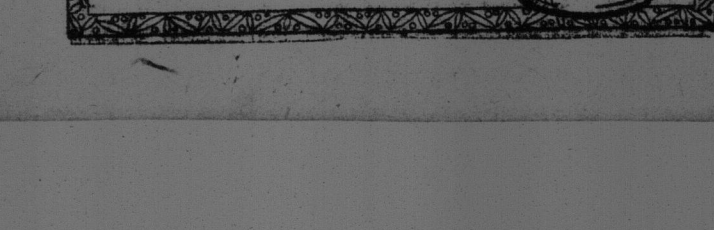

**NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN
AGAINST BIRD KILLING**

Washington, March 13—Led by the local Audubon society, bird lovers of the United States have launched a nation-wide crusade for the amendment of the present law to prevent the importation of the plumage of wild birds. Under the present law there is a duty of 60 per cent. on dressed and 20 per cent. on undressed plumage. The crusaders favor the entire shutting out of all such plumage. The women of America are said to use more plumage than the women of any other country in the world. It is contended that unless the United States takes the lead in prohibiting the traffic in the plumage of wild birds it will be only a short time until a dozen or more of the most beautiful species of birds will have become extinct.

TEST CASE ON SUNDAY LAW

Montreal, March 13—A suit has been brought against the Forum Skating Rink by Rev. Geo. W. Mingie, secretary of the local branch of the Lord's Day Alliance, with the object of testing existing legislation in this province, as well as in the dominion, regarding Sunday observance. The question narrows down to this: Has the Province of Quebec a Sunday observance law? The Supreme Court of Canada handed down an important finding in such questions when it pronounced as ultra vires of the provincial legislature all the prohibitive or restrictive portions of the Quebec Sunday observance act. It is now necessary for the courts to find out whether the whole act is unconstitutional or not, and also whether the dominion act overrides the provincial one. If it does it must be determined.

BRITISH PROPOSALS

London Cable Says Sir Edward Grey Has Forwarded Suggestions to Russia—Believed Adriatic is Near Fall

Sofia, March 13—The reply of the allies to the offer of mediation by the powers will not be delivered until Friday. One of the members of the Balkan League has asked that certain modifications be made. Constantinople, March 13—Serious fighting has been in progress along the Bulair front since yesterday. The Turkish fleet is co-operating with the troops.

Belgrade, March 12—The Turkish cruiser Mamedeh bombarded the Port of Durazzo at noon today, although it is an unfortified place. The cruiser then proceeded to San Giovanni De Medua, which she also bombarded. It is not known whether any damage was inflicted.

The Hamidieh disappeared finally in the direction of the Italian coast. Her activity causes alarm here, as a large number of Serbian troops are now being transported to the Adriatic to assist the Montenegrins in the attack on Scutari.

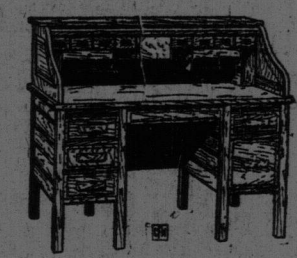

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Milwaukee Business Man Gives Some Real Talk on the Mooted Question "What is a Prize Fight?"

By TOM ANDREWS

THE question is being asked many times of late—what is a prize fight—and a Milwaukee business man comes out in the open and gives an idea of what a real prize fight is.

A. B. Nichols, of the commission firm of Nichols, Jensen & Klein, does not mince matters, either, in giving his version, and it might be well for some of the reformers to note the difference, according to Mr. Nichols' idea, between the real article and up-to-date boxing.

"I have noticed many articles of late," said Mr. Nichols, "regarding prize fighting and boxing, and I want to say that there is all the difference in the world between the two—as much difference as there is between night and day. I will give you an idea of the real article first. It was in 1873, if I remember rightly, that I was living in St. Louis and all the boys were interested in a prize fight between Tom Allen, Englishman, and Mike McCool, for the world's championship. They had met before and I understood that Allen had been robbed of the decision, and another match was made. It took place up the river on one of the big river boats. They fought with bare knuckles under the old London prize ring rules. The round did not end until one man was knocked down and then they rested only a few minutes. For seven rounds Allen bested McCool's face to a bloody pulp. It reminded me of a piece of raw beef and he was a sight, while Allen was unmarked. Finally McCool was battered into a helpless mass and his seconds carried him away on a stretcher. That was a real prize fight and without gloves, padded ring, etc., such as they have nowadays. Since then I have attended many contests in this and other cities, but under the new rules and with big gloves. I have seen many here in Milwaukee and must say that the present-day boxing is like a pillow fight between children compared to that prize fight I saw near St. Louis.

"To my way of thinking the present-day bouts are real boxing contests and nothing more, and the ring is well padded, the rounds are limited to two or three minutes with a minute rest between each round, and the referee stops the bout the moment one man shows his superiority over the other, making it a clean sparring contest. I did object to my son playing football when he went to school, but I never objected to him boxing. There are fewer accidents in boxing than in any other form of sport, outside of tennis or ping-pong, for I have followed it closely and know whereof I speak.

"It is my honest opinion that the churches make a mistake in trying to oppose boxing. Let the ministers pay more attention to their flocks and give Young America a chance to develop. If boxing with red blood in their veins rather than of the cigarette species. What we need is a sane boxing law to regulate the sport, and I know of many business men here who take the same view of it that I do."

Wells and Smith.

Bombardier Wells, British heavyweight champion, has been training for three weeks and says he is in far better condition than when he boxed Palmer and Kention last year. He weighs 193 pounds and is displaying amazing speed in bouts with sparring partners. The British press believes that he will signally defeat Smith, a heavy hitting night fighter, in New York next Friday night.

"I am anxious to beat Smith fairly and squarely, so that I can renew my acquaintance with the Englishman," says Wells. "McCarthy has dodged me so far, but I do not intend to let him get away. If I'll box him as soon as he says the word, I believe I can stop him in ten rounds, and for that reason I will entertain a proposition to meet him in California."

Smith is busy at the Blakey A. C. He has trained rigorously for the match and is sure of success. He says he does not fear Wells' punching ability, and declares that he needs no encouragement. Smith believes he can hit as hard as Wells and predicts that if the Englishman will box at close quarters the end will quickly come. Smith also is eager for a scrap with McCarthy, and says that he will demand one if he takes Wells' measure.

Joe Willard.

Joe Willard will spend the next three weeks boxing in western theatres. He has made no effort to secure reinstatement from the boxing commission in New York and says that he does not care to appear in a bout in New York again. Willard evidently has changed his mind regarding a battle with Bombardier Wells. Several weeks ago he notified Manager Gibson of the Garden A. C. that he would box Wells whenever Gibson could fix a date. Willard says that he is waiting for a match with McCarthy, which may be staged at Vernon, Cal., on July 4.

Packey McFarland's assertion in yesterday's Sun that certain persons closely identified with the British camp tried to make him bet on the result of Friday night's contest in New York has attracted the attention of the New York Athletic Commission. If McFarland will furnish the commission with the names of those gamblers it was said that they might be barred out of all boxing clubs in the state. There is a law against betting on ring contests and the commission has passed a stringent rule prohibiting such practices and which must be conspicuously posted in every club. McFarland says that he and friends from Chicago were threatened by these gamblers until Secretary

EVERY ONE VOTED DOWN CHALLENGE OF SIR THOMAS

New York, March 12.—The New York Yacht Club has declined Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge.

The reason for this action was that the terms of the challenge imposed the condition that the defending vessel shall not exceed seventy-five feet in length at the water line. This stipulation would deprive the club of the right to enter a vessel of from sixty-five to ninety feet, as provided in the deed of gift.

The declaration of the present challenge, however, it was said by members, did not necessarily mean that no American Cup race was in prospect, as the club was in anticipation of an unrestricted challenge for the cup from a British gentleman other than Sir Thomas Lipton.

The club's only official statement related to the reason for the declining of the Lipton challenge, which was forwarded by the Royal Ulster Yacht Club for Sir Thomas.

The club's action was taken at a meeting attended by more than 300 members. Only boat owners were entitled to vote on the question of the challenge. Forty votes were cast, and all were against acceptance. The refusal was a repetition of the club's action upon the Lipton challenge in 1907, which likewise stipulated for craft under the ninety-foot mark as challenger and defender.

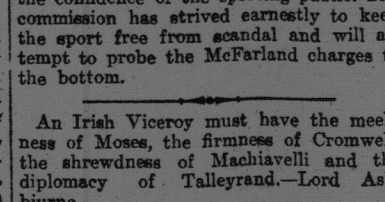

THE MATTER OF RENTS

The present high rents in St. John is a natural result of the city's growth and merely another illustration of the law of supply and demand, according to Henry T. Hoag, the new secretary of the Board of Trade. He found the same conditions at Poughkeepsie when their industries began to increase, and there were not enough houses to meet the requirements of the additional workers. The Chamber of Commerce conducted an educational
