



RESTORES ACTION OF HEART, APPARENTLY AFTER WOMAN'S DEATH

Remarkable Surgical Case in Schenectady Hospital, Following an Operation

Schenectady, N. Y., May 25—In all truth it can be said that Miss Anna Loebenstein came back out of the valley of the shadow of death. She owes her life to Dr. Charles G. McMullin, who, it is said, set her heart to pumping again after it had ceased to beat.

Miss Loebenstein was suffering from gall-stones. It was necessary to operate on her, and she was taken to the Ellis Hospital here.

incision through the muscular wall of her abdomen.

The gallstones were removed, the operation was ended; Doctor McMullen was sewing up the abdominal incision when Miss Loebenstein's heart stopped beating. She was pulseless; her respiration ceased. All the ordinary signs of life disappeared. She had succumbed, it is declared, to the shock of the operation.

Instantly Doctor McMullen cut the stitches he had made in the incision, and, reaching up gently, seized Miss Loebenstein's heart. Rythmically he compressed the heart, then relaxed his hold. The pressure forced the blood into the arteries, and when he loosened his hold the blood filled the heart, just as a boy fills and empties with water a rubber ball with a hole in it.

One minute, two minutes passed, Doctor McMullen's assistants and the nurses stood breathless, then the heart responded to Doctor Mullen's excitation of it.
