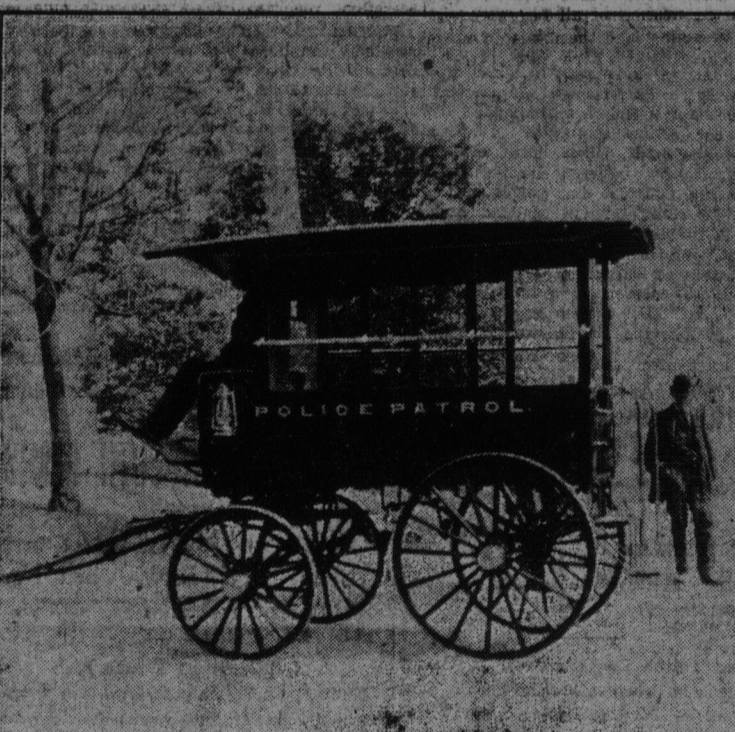

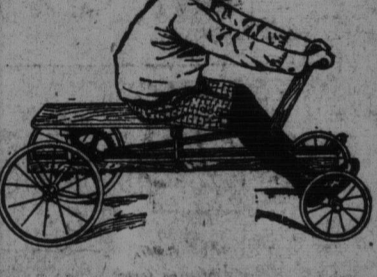

THE FIELD CROPS OF CANADA

(Report for the month ended May 31, 1911.) The season this year has been favorable for field crops in all parts of Canada, and excellent reports have been received from all the provinces. The lowest percentage of conditions is made for fall wheat, which suffered from inadequate protection in the winter months, and also to some extent from spring frosts.

The area in oats is 10,270,800 acres and its condition 94.75, as compared with 9,884,000 acres and 93.90 per cent. condition last year. Barley and rye each show a small decrease in area, but the condition is higher than at the same period last year. Slight decreases are also reported for areas of peas, mixed grains and hay and clover, with per cent. conditions of over 90.

Hay and clover have a reported condition of 91.45 for the Dominion being practically 100 in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The area of the field crops named is 32,051,500 acres for 1911, compared with 33,541,200 acres for 1910 and 28,194,800 acres for 1909. In the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the area in wheat, oats and barley was 3,491,413 acres in 1900, 6,009,380 acres in 1905, 11,932,000 acres in 1909 and 13,800,000 acres in 1910, and it is 15,533,500 acres this year.

The increase of these crops from 1900 to 1911 was 2,652,600 acres in Manitoba, 7,304,135 acres in Saskatchewan and 1,836,773 acres in Alberta.—It may be added that the report of the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association, which was issued a day earlier than the report of the Census and Statistics Office, gave a total area for wheat, oats and barley in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta of 15,416,700 acres, being 92,500 acres more than our report or about four-tenths of one per cent. The association's area for wheat is greater by 185,000 acres, and for barley by 120,000 acres, and its area for oats is less by 257,200 acres. The difference is two per cent. on wheat, five per cent. on oats, and one per cent. on barley.

JEALOUSY CAUSE OF A COLD-BLOODED MURDER IN ONTARIO

Petrolea Woman Shot to Death By Former Boarder

She Had Rejected Him—Daughter is Also Wounded by Bullet—Murderer Took Laudanum Before The Shooting

Petrolea, July 11.—This town was stirred to its depths when it was learned Mrs. Frederick King, who lives over the flats, had been shot to death by William Moore, an employe of the Petrolea Works Company. The shooting was a clear case of jealousy. The murderer, who is about twenty years of age, was living with the King family until about a month or so ago and was asked to leave the house by one of Mrs. King's sons, owing to the vile language he had been in the habit of using, and also because he had got behind with his board bill. He then went to live with his mother, a Mrs. Perkins of this town, later going to his grandmother's in Oil Springs, leaving there to attend to a brother-in-law.

Upon his return from camp he called at the King house and asked to see Mrs. King, of whom, notwithstanding the fact that she was over twice his age, he was enamored. He was met at the door by a daughter of the murdered woman, who informed him that her mother was out of the house. He did not say anything at the time, but went away quickly, only to return this morning about 11.30 o'clock. He entered the house, which has a front and side door with a vestibule running on the side across the front at the side entrance, without knocking, and found the family preparing dinner. In the room at the time were the victim and her daughter Florence, a child of fourteen years, and a married daughter, a Mrs. Hollifield, who is living nearest to him asked "What do you want?"

"You stand back," he replied, and immediately pulling a twenty-two calibre rifle out of one of his pant legs, aimed it at Mrs. Hollifield, who dropped to the floor to avoid the shot which struck the Florence in the wrist just at the pulse.

The child screamed and ran out of the house, followed by the sister and mother, the mother turning to the right the other two to the left screaming for help.

Shot Twice

The frantic mother ran down the verandah, followed by the enraged man and attempted to make for the side door, but was shot in the left side twice before she reached the door, the bullets striking her inches apart. In her agony and excitement the terrified woman dashed against the door and fell to the floor of the verandah.

At this moment a man named Macdonald, a clerk in the postoffice, passed on his way to dinner, and seeing Moore with a rifle, pointed at the prostrate form, shouted to him, asking him what he was doing. For answer he fired a bullet into the woman, while Macdonald ran to telephone for a doctor.

The murderer then threw down the gun and walked into the arms of Policeman Whitlock, who had come up, and was taken to No. 2 police station, being transferred to No. 1 by an ambulance half hour later. Here he showed symptoms of opium poisoning. Dr. Dunfield was hurriedly called and washed out the man's stomach and used antidotes to prevent the opium from having a fatal effect. There are hopes of his recovery. Yesterday the murderer procured a one ounce bottle of laudanum at Dale's drug store, and had apparently taken it before he went to the victim's house. The bottle was afterwards picked up by G. F. Pitkin.

The woman was taken into the house with blood streaming from her wounds, and died in her daughter's arms five minutes later. Florence was taken to the Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital, and is in a very weak condition, owing to loss of blood. Unless complications set in she will recover.

The murdered woman, who was 42 years old, came to Petrolea from Gladwin, Mich. Prior to living in Gladwin, the family lived for a time in Owen Sound, and later in St. Catharines. She and her husband had not been living together owing to some domestic difficulty, but the family, which consisted of three boys, a sailor in Montreal, Harry and Sandy in Petrolea, and two girls, Florence, Lizzie and Mrs. Hollifield, who is now in St. Catharines, were all living with her.

"I can't understand why I will would do such a thing," said Mrs. Hollifield, "Poor mother never did anything to her. He appeared to be fond of her and I believe it was a case of jealousy. About two or three months ago he asked mother to marry him, but she refused saying that she had been married once and she was not going to marry again even if she could. He did not say much at the time, but today's sequel explains his silence."

About Moore not much is known. He came to Petrolea last fall when Oil Springs was taken to the hospital and since remaining his work his fellow workmen say that he has been acting strangely. Only on Sunday night last Moore attended a Salvation Army meeting and seemed to be greatly impressed.

In the hot cell at the police station the prisoner is in a dazed condition, and seems to feel his position keenly.

"Oh, it's awful it's awful," he kept moaning, "I never thought I would come to this. I've worried; oh, I've worried; oh, why did I do it? I was driven to it."

Daily Hints For the Cook

POTATO RIBBONS.

This is a pleasing variation from the popular potato chips. Peel the potatoes, then peel the potato itself, round and round, in very thin shavings or ribbons dropping them as cut into ice water. Let stand an hour, drain and dry in a clean cloth, then fry in a deep hot fat. Drain on a sieve, sprinkle over with fine salt and serve hot.

CREAMED NEW POTATOES.

An excellent way to cook new potatoes is to wash and scrape clean, then drop into boiling water and boil until tender. Have ready cream and butter hot, but not boiling, drain the potatoes, sprinkle with salt and transfer to a hot vegetable table. Pour over them the hot cream, sprinkle with a little minced parsley and serve.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT CONVENTION OF BAPTISTS IN HARTLAND

The Ludlow Street Baptist Church Matter Will Not Be Taken Up—The Proceedings Yesterday

Much reference was made in the debate that followed to the so-called preachers and other interests that were playing havoc with some Baptist communities and it was decided that a strong stand should be taken in regard to wandering preachers in closing the doors of the churches against them and encouraging a spirit of loyalty among the people.

In the meantime the meeting of the U. B. W. M. Union met in the Methodist church. Miss Rebecca Bennett, of Hopeville Cape, Albert county, presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. A. C. Smith, of west St. John. Mrs. Archibald, of St. John, led the devotional service. Mrs. H. Nixon, of Hartland, gave an address of welcome, which was replied to by Mrs. Lawson, of Moncton. Mrs. A. J. OPINION IN OTTAWA IS THAT TORIES MAY FORCE ELECTION SOON

Re-opening of Parliament, However, Must Be Awaited Before Course is Definitely Known—Political Pot Boiling Again

Ottawa, July 11.—With the return of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir J. Borden to the capital, and the re-assembling of parliament on Tuesday next, the political pot which has been quietly simmering during the past two months, is again boiling. The opposition leader arrived early this morning from Winnipeg and before leaving again this afternoon for a brief holiday with George Peck, M. P., at the latter's fishing camp in Argenville, gave out an interview in which he declared that the opposition was still determined to fight reciprocity to the bitter end.

If the opposition can compel an election on the issue they will do so. And no one doubts their intention. Their power to compel a dissolution by the simple process of holding up supply when the house resumes the session is put through and the members of the government have already intimated that they are prepared to accept. Both sides anticipate an early election. The only question now is as to the probable date.

Probably no definite or authoritative forecast can be made as to this until after the house has been in session for a fortnight or so. There will be party caucuses on both sides soon after the house meets and questions as to political expediency in regard to plunging at once into an election and getting through with the agency quickly, or as to continuing in session for a couple of months or so while the remaining business of the session is put through and a redistribution bill brought down, will then be threshed out. The government is, of course, anxious to put the redistribution bill through before dissolution, but sees little hope of it. The opposition hopes that redistribution will be followed by another election if they are returned to power.

The government will take every opportunity to force the issue by proposing to carry on the administration after September, when the present interim supply granted runs out, and, if possible, also with regard to the redistribution bill. The jockeying for position will probably take at least a month. Under all the circumstances an election before October is hardly probable.

Meanwhile if the present hot wave continues the prospect ahead of the members already weary of this long drawn out session is not a cheerful one. When the house adjourns tempers were none too good. There will doubtless be some lively news before long in the common chamber. However, the public works department is striving to ameliorate the situation as much as possible. Arrangements are being made for a supply of ice cooled air in the chamber and on the roof a sitting out place is being fixed up where weary members can cool off amid palms and ocean breezes.

THE I. C. R. AND THE EXPORT FLOUR RATE

St. John merchants will be interested in a paragraph which appeared in Monday's Halifax Herald giving the news that the I. C. R. board of management had withdrawn the export rate on flour for any quantity less than car lots. In Halifax the reduced rate has been in force on fifty barrels and over, and at a conference with the Halifax wholesale merchants on Saturday last, Mr.iffin, the general trade manager, informed them that this reduction would be withdrawn owing to the large number of smaller places pressing for the same privilege. In order to be fair to all, it was necessary, he said, to make a carload the minimum on which the export rate will be accepted. The difference between the export rate and the ordinary freight charge amounts to six to eight cents on the hundred. The Herald intimates that the merchants recognized the justice of Mr.iffin's argument and would make no further complaint. The order will become effective on August 10.

St. John shippers have enjoyed the privilege of the export rate on twenty-five barrel lots on condition that an ordinary carload is shipped within a certain time. This arrangement has worked very satisfactorily and a change such as has been made in Halifax would mean quite a difference to the wholesalers. It will be noticed that the minimum quantity shipped from St. John at present is only half of the amount in Halifax, which has been raised to a carload.

H. H. Schaeffer, district freight agent of the I. C. R. here, said last evening that as yet he had received no word of the withdrawal of the export rate on small quantities, nor had he any intimation that Mr.iffin would visit St. John in the near future for the purpose of meeting the merchants.

One of the dealers said last evening that the action of the board in withdrawing the reduced rate at Halifax might have resulted from the absence of the privilege through West St. John, in the case of Rev.
