# EXPLODE:

Kings of Roumania and Greece Have Close Call for Lives.

Explosions Follow in Series and Panic Reigns in Roumanian Capital.

(United Press.)

Bucharest, May 29.— Many persons were killed and injured and the sovereigns of Roumania and Greece barely escaped with their lives when munitions, magazines and artillery dumps near Bucharest blew up in a series of deafening explosions that continued throughout Wednesday.

The capital was under fire of a rain of bursting shells which shattered windows in every part of the city and fell in the court yard of the royal palace.

Parliament adjourned as the intensity of the explosions increased. There was a panic in schools throughout the city and they were closed to permit the children to seek safety in their

# WEIRMEN WANT \$10 MINIMUM PRICE OF EXPORTED HERRING

Two Hundred Fishermen Pass Resolution to Minister of Fisheries

St. Andrews, N. B., May 28—Two hundred fishermen of Charlotte and St. John counties met here today to consider the action of the sardine packers in cutting prices for sardine herring from \$12 a hogshead to \$6. Judge Byron, of St. Andrews, was elected chairman, and Harold C. Lord, of Deer

Island, Secretary.

A resolution committee was appointed, representing the various sections of the two counties, who retired to consider a resolution covering the matter and who brought back a memorial for submission to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, asking that an extra clause be inserted in the weir licenses prohibiting the exportation of herring unless a price of at least \$10 per hogshead has been paid for them.

This resolution was passed unanimously and three delegates were appointed to proceed to Ottawa with Premier Veniot to support the weirmen's cause. They were 'Grovenor Cook, Grand Manan; Harold Lord, Deer Island; Leonard C. Harned, St. John county.

in the purchase of herring at the weirs, with the canning owners arbitrarily establishing the price to be paid, as well as the parties to whom the fish were to be delivered.

"The industry cannot continue with the prices now being paid by the monopoly. As proof of the disastrous consequences, which this condition of affairs has brought about, we would point out to you that your statistical reports show that in the year 1919 there were 584 weirs built in Charlotte and St. John counties, with a value of \$968,600, while in 1923 only 300 weirs were built valued at \$320,000, a depreciation of more than 66 per cent. depreciation of more than 66 per cent. This has not been brought about by any decline in the supply of herring, but is solely due to the unprofitable prices paid by this combination of canners.

### List of Prices.

"For your information we call your attention to the prices paid for sardine herring for each year since 1910: Year 1910, average price, \$10; 1911, \$10; 1912, \$5; 1913, \$10; 1914, \$15; 1915, \$10; 1916, \$12; 1917, \$18.75; 1918, \$25; 1919, \$6.45; 1920, \$7.25; 1921, \$5.25; 1922, \$6.15; 1923, \$15. Average Price \$10 to 1914.

"From the foregoing you will observe that during the period from 1910 up to and including 1914, the average price was \$10 per hogshead.
"During 1915-16-17-18—the war period—the price was \$16.50 per hogshead

head.

"The average price during the period 1919-20-21-22 was \$6.50 per hogshead. During a portion of 1923, as previously stated, the purchasing arrangement among the packers was broken up, with the result that good prices were paid during such time; the average price for the season was nearly \$15 per hogshead. The season of 1923 closed with the packers paying about \$20 per hogshead for their supply. Discuss Present Season.

"The present season opened with the packers again functioning as a unit in the purchase of herring with a set price of \$12 per hogshead, but just as soon as the weirs were completed, May 20, they arbitrarily put the price at \$6 per hogshead, which price still prevails.

### Suggest Minimum Price.

"We therefor urge upon your Department the vital necessity for taking some practical step or steps to relieve this industry from the grip of a monopoly which is grinding it to death. "In our opinion the most effective remedial measure which your Department can bring about, is to insert a clause in the weir licenses prohibiting the expostation of the fish unless a price of at least \$10 per hogshead has been seld for same.

Taking a squint at the early batting, pitching and fielding averages, the side supporting the positive argument haven't much material to convince the veterans, who like to insist that these are poor days on all fields of sport compared to the times that have gone.

Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, Eddie Collins, Everett Scott, Zach Wheat, Grover Alexander, Walter Johnson, Jack Quinn, Jack Fournier and Juke Daubert, all ten to fifteen year men and better, are still going strong enough to set the pace and to keep youngsters out of their jobs.

With few exceptions, the best players who can be held up as examples of the modern game against the old game are themselves veterans as ball players are judged.

Roush, Sisler, Hornsby, Heilman, Williams, Ruth, Schalk, Dugan, Bancroft, Bigbee and many others who might be held up for favorable comparison with the old stars are really veterans and could be held up themselves as examples to support the argument that the new players are not as good as the old ones.

Taking the liberty of assuming that modern times can be stretched back five years, there is no doubt that the old time days never saw a hitter to compare with Babe Ruth. The Babe offers one positive argument in himself that at least one type of baseball is better today than it was ten or inventy years ago.

As Ruth evolutionized the science and strategy of baseball by making of it a slugging game, so he reduced the possibility of developing players of toom graduates to the major leagues, oth sides line up for the argument:





# NEARLY \$100,000 OFFERED IN PRIZES

Large Purses for Competitors in International 500 Mile Race.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 29—An added purse of \$10,000 for competitors in the international 500-mile race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, next Friday, has just been announced by the speedway management.

It will be a consolation prize to be awarded drivers who do not participate in the \$50,000 purse distributed each year among the first ten drivers to complete the 500 miles.

The \$10,000 purse will be distributed among less fortunate drivers in proportion to the number of laps they drive in the race.

It is the first time in the history of automobile racing that drivers have been awarded cash prizes for losing.

The purpose of the award, it was announced from the speedway office, is to show the speedway's gratitude for the drivers who spend months preparing their cars for the greatest of international racing classics, and then because of some mechanical imperfection see their hopes for victory go glimmering in the fraction of a second.

Naturally the drivers who remain in the running the longest will take the lion's share of the added purse, a tribute to their preparation for a contest that is more destructive to cars and productive to the future of the automobile industry than 50,000 miles of road testing or laboratory experiments.

The racing car builders, engineers and drivers who participate in the 500-mile race are at a far greater expense than the public generally realizes. A racing car alone costs between \$10,000 and \$25,000, to say nothing of the extra equipment necessary and the expense of the car crews before the blg race.
