## INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

This Home is open to destitute children under two years of age, but it is not a Foundling Asylum in the ordinary acceptation of the word. Personal application for admission must be made by the parent or guardian of the child, and if the management find that suitable accommodation can be had for it elsewhere, it is not received. The classes of children admitted are:

(1) Those whose mothers are dead, or insane, or in hospital or prison;

(2) Those whose mothers enter with them as <sup>with</sup> nurses;

(3) Infants whose mothers are in service, and who pay for their children's board according to their wages;

(4) Deserted children sent by order of the Mayor of Toronto.

Whenever there is room, and the mother is willing to enter, she is permitted to do so. It is in the interests of humanity as well as morality that a refuge, such as this, should be open, where mother and child may be admitted together, all other doors being closed against them. The first impulse of the poor women who have been discharged from the Hospital, with a two weeks' old babe in their arms, is to leave it anywhere, with any one who will relieve them of the burden; but on no account is it wise or right to free the parent of the responsibility resting on her. So dependent are these helpless little creatures for life and health, during the first few months of their existence, on a mother's love and nursing, that it is a cruelty to deprive them of these, if attainable. With time better feelings come, and soon mother and child are bound together in bonds that cannot easily be broken. When desertion, coupled with exposure of a child by the individual, is reckoned a legal crime, there can be no question that a Christian community is guilty of a grave moral offence when they continue to neglect obvious means of removing causes of death and suffering among young children. When a mother's culpable neglect causes the death of her child, it is called infanticide; and society must also avoid culpable neglect, or share in a similar reproach.

The following are the classes of mothers who are received as nurses:

1st. Widows

2nd. Deserted wives.

3rd. Destitute, friendless girls, mostly of the class of domestic servants, who, utterly unable to provide for their infant children, would, without the shelter afforded by this Home, have been compelled to beg in the streets with their children, or been forced to abandon, or even tempted to destroy them. Such have been employed in the establishment as nurses, cooks of laundresses, and when discharged have been furnished with situations, which many are now creditably filling.

## TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home and Infirmary was held in the Home, 21 St. Mary Street, on Thursday, October 25th.

Mr. W. Barclay McMurrich, Q.C., presided, and among others present were Rev. Dr. Armstrong Black, Rev. Canon Pollard, of Ottawa, Sir Wm. Howland, Thos. Hodgins, Q.C., Rev. W. W. Weeks, Dr. Spencer, Dr. Henwood, Mr. Grant Ridout, Mr. J. K. Macdonald, Rev. Mr. Brain.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Brain, who expressed the regrets of the Rev. Dr. Pearson at not being able to be present on this special occasion, as during the past twenty-five years he had rarely missed taking part in the proceedings of the Annual Meeting.

W. B. McMurrich, Q.C., on opening the meeting congratulated the Home on having arrived at their 25th anniversary—their silver wedding—a day that would be historical in the chronicles of its work. He reviewed the past history of the Home, referring particularly to the strong opposition shown by the City Council and many leading citizens to the enterprise at its inception, and warmly congratulated the ladies on having overcome all obstacles—and having by their zeal, energy, and business management raised the institution to the proud position it occupies amongst the charities of the City. He further alluded to the financial position, and expressed the satisfaction generally felt in having so well appointed a charity free from any burden of debt. Recalling the old proverb—"For a web begun God sends



the thread," he remarked—The ladies connected with the management had taken up in the beginning the scant bundle of threads they had and began their weaving, confident that the Lord would provide threads as time went on to finish the web, and in this way they had not been disappointed.

He alluded in kindly terms to the retirement of Mrs. John Ridout, who for the past twenty-five years had been President of the Institution, and had given so much of her time to the carrying on of the work, and expressed the hope that in the evening of life her work so willingly and lovingly done would be one of the brightest memories of her life, and would be an inspiration to others to follow in her footsteps.

In concluding, he referred to the handsome engrossed address presented to her by the Board of Management, which reads as follows:—

The Managers of the Infants' Home and Infirmary desire to record their deep regret upon the resignation of their revered and honoured President, Mrs. Ridout, after the long period of twenty-five years of office, during which time the Institution has had the privilege of her abiding interest, her admirable guidance, with "wisdom to contrive and courage to execute," qualities which have combined with God's blessing to bring the Home from its humble origin to the condition of efficiency which it now enjoys.

SIR WILLIAM HOWLAND IN PROPOSING THE ADOPTION OF THIS REPORT:

*Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen.*

I have much pleasure in moving the adoption of the report, which so clearly sets forth the present position and workings of this institution, and also gives in a very interesting manner the principal events in its history. I have been connected with the institution since its first commencement, and I think have attended every annual meeting, excepting one, that has been held since that time. I am therefore in a position which enables me to judge of its working and value. The results have fully proved that such an institution is a necessity and required, whether viewed from a philanthropic, religious, or economical aspect. The system on which it has been managed has been entirely the best that could be devised, whilst it has commanded the services of a large number of ladies specially qualified to perform the duties imposed upon them and whose devotion to the work and interests of the Home is all that can be desired. From their good management and exertions the lives of a large number of children have been saved, and many mothers have been rescued and their condition and prospects in life very much improved.

Rev. Dr. Armstrong Black in seconding said that he thought there was a special fitness in his being called on to support what had been submitted to the meeting by Sir William Howland. It was an instance of one of the latest recruits following the lead of one of the veteran friends of this Institution. He counted himself fortunate in being initiated to the work here when after having proved itself for a quarter of a century, this Home was setting out on its second stage towards its jubilee. He thought that with no disadvantage to



itself and with some advantages to Toronto, this benevolent society might have made more demonstration on an occasion so interesting as its semi-jubilee. Evidently wise and careful administration had long ago answered and silenced those who first objected to such a Home as this being established. Unhappily, as things are in the complication and stress of life in our day, such an Institution was necessary. It dealt with one of the problems which if not wholly raised by sin was greatly complicated by it; and that problem needed careful handling, for all that tended to relieve those who brought children into the world of their personal responsibility and care touched the fabric of human society at its very foundation. It was delicate, difficult work that was done here; and it needed to be done wisely, tenderly, firmly. It was essentially woman's work, demanding the instinctive touch which only woman can give when the life and relations of mother and child are involved. It is essentially and vitally Christian work. Though in Christ's life we may find no exact parallel to His visiting such a home, nor any word exactly commanding it, yet His word and heart were continually tender towards little children and to woman when either sin or sorrow had saddened her life, and the very circumstances of His own birth when His mother was homeless and helpless may bring this Home and all its work within the sanction and sanctifying of the human life which was the life of God.

Mrs. Boulton, the Treasurer, then presented her Annual Report.

The adoption of the Treasurer's Report was moved by Mr. Geo. H. D. Lee, who referred to the excellent and business-like manner in which the finances of the Home were managed, and congratulated the Home upon being favored with the services, as Treasurer, of Mrs. Boulton.

Mr. Lee pointed out that there was great cause for thankfulness on the part of those interested that the

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Treasurer's Report showed no existing mortgage indebtedness, but that a comparison of the report this year with that of last year brought out the fact, not so encouraging, that the receipts had fallen off to the extent of \$1,900.00; attention, however, was drawn to the fact that the receipts last year included a legacy of \$1,050.00, while unfortunately no legacy for any amount approximating this appeared in this year's receipts. To effectually carry out the work that ought to be done, the management ought to be in receipt of \$6,000.00 per annum, but the receipts for the year which has just closed were over \$1,000.00 less than this amount. Last year the Home received from the Government, City and relatives of inmates about seventy-five per cent. of the total cost of maintenance. This year the sums received from the same sources amounted to only about seventy per cent., and the prospect for the coming year is that the amount to be paid by the Government will be about \$400.00 less than the amount which has been received during the past year, for the reason that the Government grant is based on the number of inmates of the Home for the year preceding the grant, and fewer children have been maintained this year than last year, and the cost of maintenance is not growing less per capita. Mr. Lee complimented the Board on the excellence of their management of the affairs of the Home, and drew attention to the fact that notwithstanding that the available funds for the year which had just closed were over \$500.00 less than they were the preceding year, excluding the legacy of \$1,050.00 before referred to, yet the Home is within \$182.00 of being in as good a position financially at the present time as it was at the close of the preceding year. This is a matter for congratulation, and is something for which the public are indebted to the efficient and painstaking Board of Managers, to whom, however, greater and more generous support ought to be given in the future.

This report was seconded by the Rev. Canon Pollard in a few very appreciative remarks.

The Medical Report was presented by Dr. Bertram Spencer.

The adoption of this report was moved by the Rev. W. W. Weeks, who spoke of the great admiration he had for the practical Christian work done by the doctors of Toronto. Mr. Grant Ridout seconded this report.

Miss Greig read the Work-room Report and Mr. J. K. Macdonald moved the adoption of it.

The re-election of Managers was then proposed by Mr. Thos. Hodgins, Q.C., who expressed himself as being glad to be at the Silver Jubilee meeting of an institution he had taken the greatest interest in from its earliest inception.

The meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Armstrong Black.

The Managers afterwards held a reception and their guests were provided with afternoon tea, and also invited to inspect the different wards of the Home so as to see for themselves the infants and the mothers, and to judge of the necessity of the Home.

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## MANAGERS' REPORT.

In presenting to the public this the twenty-fifth annual report of The Infants' Home and Infirmary, the Board of Managers have reason to be thankful, for in so doing we celebrate the Silver Jubilee of this Institution. It is now twenty-five years since a small band of earnest, thoughtful women, with sorrow for poor suffering humanity in their hearts, and filled with the eager desire to relieve and help some of these unfortunate ones, originated and planned the foundation of this Home. Their first object in the work which they undertook was the suppression of infanticide, and the saving of infant life, and the prevention of the ill-usage and desertion of infants, by providing a place where they could be received with their mothers during the first year of their life, there being at the time no institution in this City which admitted infants. Also to tenderly care for the infants of the respectable married poor; widows, widowers, or deserted wives, when the latter being by necessity compelled to go out as wage-earner for a family of small children.

It can easily be imagined by those who have engaged in any such endeavor the difficulties met with by these founders of the Home, but a few details of the history of the Institution will show how successful they were in their efforts and how generously the public sustained and helped them in their undertaking.

The first Home was opened in a rented house on Caer-Howell Street; this in a few months proving too small for the increasing number of inmates, it was removed to a larger building, No. 678 Yonge Street.

The first Annual Meeting was held in November, 1876, and by the following extracts from the Report of the proceedings, it will be seen that already clever

earnest men had interested themselves in securing the success of the endeavour.

“Moved by Mr. Kivas Tulley, seconded by Mr. Moody, and resolved that whereas there had been hitherto no place where destitute children could be properly nursed and cared for, the Infants' Home should receive the cordial support of the public, and the Managers should be encouraged in their humane work for the preservation of human lives.”

The late Professor Daniel Wilson, at the same meeting, spoke as follows:—“Scarcely any position of life could be more trying than that of a respectable woman with helpless infants; widows and others who were willing and anxious to work, but who found it impossible to get employment. An institution of the kind that kept unfortunate women from falling and their children from dying in the streets, enabling them to get into honest employment, was one that should receive support not only on philanthropic grounds, but because it effected a real saving to the city.”

As time went on and the necessity of such a Home had become a certainty, it was considered advisable to raise funds to build a Home where by proper heating, ventilation and sanitation, every chance would be given to the young lives.

In 1882 the present Home was completed and occupied. In 1888 a Hospital was added—the great necessity of this as a means of isolation in contagious diseases being made very evident to the Board during the epidemic of black measles.

In 1897—fifteen years after its occupation—owing to the strenuous efforts of the Ladies of the Board this Home was pronounced free from debt, and as this happened to be the Jubilee year of our beloved Queen, the ladies commemorated the occasion by endowing a

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cot, which would thereafter be known as the Victoria Cot.

From September, 1875, to September, 1900, about 2,600 children have been received and cared for in this Institution, these figures being the best argument needed to show how requisite this Home is for the benefit of the public, for hundreds of these children would have been deserted or starved if these doors had not been open both to the mother and child, when in many cases every other door was closed against them.

In this period of twenty-five years there has been so many earnest zealous workers on this Board that it would hardly be just to name one without mentioning many, but it is an interesting fact and one on which we congratulate ourselves, that our present list of Managers includes six active members, who were on the original Board in 1875, and who have never failed during all these years in their constant devotion to the work of this Home. These ladies are:—Mrs. Ridout, Mrs. Hodgins, Mrs. Parsons, Mrs. Grantham, Miss Muttelbury, Miss Greig. Mrs. McLean Howard came on the Board in 1879 and still continues an interested worker.

During this quarter of a century Mrs. Ridout has held the office of President with honor to herself and inexpressible benefit to the Home, and it is with the utmost regret that we are now obliged to accept her resignation. It is only out of consideration for her personal comfort and convenience do we now submit to her decision to retire from office, which she can do with well-won laurels. Witness the position of our Institution, freed from debt, due in a great measure, under God, to the "counsel and understanding that come with years," and to the carrying out of her favorite motto "Festina lente," which we should do well to adopt now that she foregoes her rule in our midst.

In order to carry out the first object of this institution, viz., the saving of infant life, and at the same time the promotion of mother-love, the original Board instituted the rule that every unmarried woman must come into the Home with her infant and remain four months, and in return for the board and lodging of herself and child, nurse one other as well as her own.

As time went on it was found necessary to extend this term to six months or more, as it was considered very injurious to the health of the child to be separated from the mother so early.

That this is a beneficial and advantageous rule for both mother and child has been proved again and again, instances occurring most frequently, where at first women who were most unwilling to remain in the Home, and only doing so when they found it impossible to get free of the care of their child by adopting it out, have, after nursing and caring for their infant for a few months, become so fond of it that they willingly remain as long as the child needs them, and then by going out to respectable service earn wages to pay for its keep in the Home.

Another point, also, brought to the public notice by Mrs. Edgar, the first Secretary of the Home, in the First Report of the Board of Managers, was that this Institution was not calculated to encourage pauperism, as the mothers received, have to work for their Board, either in the nursery, laundry or kitchen, and after leaving the Home to pay in whole or part for the support of their child.

As a result of the many cases of deserted babies and half-starved, drugged foundlings brought into the Home, the members of the Board in 1887 brought most forcibly before the notice of the people of Toronto the unchecked and terrible evils resulting from baby-farming, and suggesting that the matter be brought before the

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Legislature that a remedy be sought for and applied, at the same time intimating that a licensing system, similar to that in force in England, would be inexpensive, easy to enforce, and judging by experience almost certainly effectual. The question was not allowed to drop, but was eventually taken up by a committee composed of representatives from all other similar Institutions to this, and under the able guidance and organization of Mrs. Boulton, was brought before the Legislature from time to time, with the final result that the Maternity Act was passed in 1898, an Act which, among other wise restrictions, provides that no person can board one or more infants without having a license, and their home being subject to medical inspection, thus doing away with the starving and neglect of infants which previously had proceeded in a wholesale manner.

No review of the Institution and work of this Home can be made without reference to the late Dr. Fenton Cameron and Mrs. Cameron, for all who know the early history of the Home acknowledge that it was to their inception that the necessity for such an Institution was brought forcibly to the public.

It was not very long after its successful establishment that they left Toronto to reside in England, and it was with very sincere regret that we heard of the death of Dr. Fenton Cameron this year.

A letter of sympathy from this Board was sent to his widow, at the same time expressing their great appreciation of the value of his past services, and the very kindly remembrance of his goodness.

In Sir William Howland the Home has another very old friend, his name appearing on the First Report for 1875, he being then on the Advisory Board, and he still continues one of its members. In spite of the many

arduous duties of public and business life, Sir William has seldom missed being present and taking part in the proceedings of our Annual Meeting.

The past year has not been a very happy one as far as regards the internal working of the Home, for owing to an epidemic of measles in the very early Spring, when forty-three children suffered from this malady. And the illness and finally the resignation of Miss Silvester, the head nurse, and the establishment of Miss Farwell in her place, it was very difficult to keep the affairs of the Home running with their usual smoothness and regularity.

To Mrs. Jordan, our able Superintendent, is due the credit of the excellent manner in which order and regularity was preserved under exceptionally difficult conditions.

That the Board fully appreciated this fact was manifested by a resolution of thanks to Mrs. Jordan for the practical christian manner in which she had shown her heartfelt interest in the welfare of the Inmates of this Home.

A similar resolution of thanks was also passed to Miss Scott, the matron, who gave most able assistance to Mrs. Jordan.

At the beginning of the year, October 1st, 1899, the number of children in the Home

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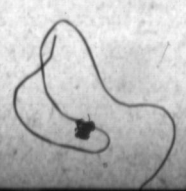
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There were 36 in Home on the last day of the year.

To our Advisory Board and to Mr. Holmsted, our Auditor, thanks are also due for services rendered.

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## MEDICAL REPORT,

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—

The Medical Report of the Home for this, the last year of the century, is somewhat an exceptional one by reason of a visitation to us, in the early months of the year, of a bad epidemic of measles.

The year began well, the monthly medical report for February showed no deaths among our inmates, such an event not having occurred for five years previously.

The last day of February, however, a child of two years was admitted with apparently an ordinary cold. Two days later the rash of measles developed, and, although prompt isolation was practised, in two weeks all of our older children without exception, twenty-four in number, were down with the disease; and before the epidemic had spent itself, no less than forty-five of the children and two of the mothers were attacked by it.

Of the two women, one soon recovered; the other who was consumptive, and who had only recently left the General Hospital, was sent back to that institution, where she shortly succumbed to phthisis.

The epidemic lasted till April 12th or for about six weeks, although its effects were manifested until well on in the month of May; no children of course were admitted during the time of infection.

Measles or its complications were responsible for twenty-six deaths; and although the children appeared at the time of the attack, to be in a more than usually good state of health, it is with regret that we have to record that sixteen out of these twenty-six deaths were among the older children, viz., from one to two and a half years of age; and it is singular, that the youngest infant attacked, a baby only three weeks old, recovered.

As is so frequently the case with an epidemic of measles, in an institution such as this, we had several cases of severe ulceration of the lips and gums; and in two cases that malignant form, known as cancrum oris, both children being sent to the General Hospital where they succumbed.

This is the third epidemic of measles that has attacked us during the quarter of a century that has elapsed since the

foundation of the Home, and its mortality on each occasion appears to show that this disease is more to be dreaded among children than scarlet fever, and even possibly diphtheria.

The youngest infant admitted during the year was the babe found in the Rosedale ravine, about two hours old, the next youngest was four days old.

Tabulated, the causes of death during the year are as follows:—

Measles and its sequetæ, 26; syphilitic affections, 9; mammitis 7; meningitis, 6; colitis, 6; convulsions, 3; pneumonia, 3; cardiac disease, 2; peritonitis laryngitis, epilepsy, hydrocephalus, tuberculosis, one each. Total, 67.

We had eight infants admitted whose mothers were in the insane asylum; and six foundlings only, an unusually small number.

There were twenty-four women in the Home on October 1st, 1899, and forty-eight have been admitted during the year. This number too is less than our average, and their stay in the Home has been shorter than usual.

It is very noticeable that the women themselves are of a lower order of intelligence than in past years. This throws more responsibility and care upon the officers of the Home, necessitating constant vigilance on their part to see that orders are carried out, and the children are not neglected.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Jordan and to Misses Scott and Sylvester for their assistance to us on every possible occasion.

We desire to congratulate the Lady Managers of this Home on attaining to their silver anniversary; and trust that the years of the coming century will bring them joy and success, in their work of rescuing the unfortunate, and saving the lives of little children.

## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

## TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

## I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

## II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

## III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

## IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and thirty other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

## V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society, according to the resolution adopted and recorded February 1st, 1898.

## VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

## VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance, especially in the investment of funds.

## VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

## IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

## X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

## RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

### I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

### II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

### III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

### IV.

A committee of the whole to be called Committee of Investigation and Admission, shall meet on all the Tuesdays of the month following the Board Meeting at the hour of 11 o'clock a.m., their proceedings to be reported to the General Board once a month. At these meetings five Managers shall form a quorum, the weekly visitors inclusive. In the absence of the President and Vice-Presidents one of the Managers shall take the chair by vote.

### V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

### VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair,

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## BY-LAWS.

## I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

## II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings, summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

## III.

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys belonging to the institution, and shall keep accurate account thereof with vouchers. It shall be her duty to deposit all receipts, from whatever source, in a chartered bank to the credit of the Institution, from which amount withdrawals shall only be made by cheque, signed by the President and Treasurer; she shall also keep in the same or another chartered bank an account to be called the Maintenance Account, in the name of the Treasurer of the Infants' Home, which account shall not exceed \$500 at a time, and shall be opened and replenished from the General Account. Withdrawals from the Maintenance Account shall be made by cheque of the Treasurer only.

## IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. All applications for positions on the active staff must be accompanied by satisfactory recommendations as to skill and fitness, and to be submitted to the staff for approval before being placed on record. No child or wet nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

## V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

## VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer,

**RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.**

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

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**RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES WITH CHILDREN.**

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee, shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition etc., of the applicant entered on the record and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first-born.

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**PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES.**

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity and not visited by parents or friends for six months, then the necessary papers will be filled in ready for their signatures.
