In the Dominion Tariff Act of 1879 is a provision for Reciprocity clauses, in which are enumerated twenty-five articles—natural products of Canada and the United States; and the Governor-in-Council was authorized to place the whole or any of them on the free list by proclamation, whenever similar articles were made free by the American tariff. Of those twenty-five the United States tariff of 1883 placed on the free list the following:—Fruit trees; seeds and bulbous roots for agricultural purposes; green fruit; trees, shrubs, and plants for shade and ornamental purposes, and anthracite coal. Why has not the Canadian Government given effect to its own Act, keeping faith with the people of this country, and meeting the United States fairly in any steps they take Reciprocity? The action of the Government is a deliberate breaking of a pledge given to the people in the solemn words of an Act of Parliament. Now let us see what has been the value of articles imported from the United States which should have been on our free list since the 1st of July, 1883, and how much we have paid on them for duties. Here are the figures for the financial year 1884:—

Articles	Value
Fruit trees	\$1,238.85
Seeds and bulbous roots	25,790.00
Green fruit	184,341.00
Trees, shrubs, and plants	30,647.00
Anthracite coal	3,338,811.00
Totals	\$3,783,178.85

As the Toronto Globe remarks, this is a large sum to continue to pay in spite of the professed anxiety of the Dominion Government to procure Reciprocity with the United States in the exchange of natural products. What is the defence or excuse for this? In the face of the provisions of the Tariff Act of 1879? It is not now a question of duties or protection, but why has the Government broken faith with the people?—*Transcript.*
