Unrecorded Sayings of Christ.

Further particulars concerning the discovery made in January last in Egypt, of very old papyrus containing alleged "sayings" of Christ, have served to deepen the interest in this extraordinary "find."

The "sayings" are contained in a piece of papyrus five and a half by three and a half inches in size, resembling a well-preserved leaf of a book.

The sayings are detached, without context, and are in the Greek language. Each verse begins with the words "Jesus saith."

The first saying is: "And then thou shalt see clearly to our note that it is thy brother's eye a reptile of Mat. vi. 3."

The second saying reads: "Jesus saith, except ye fast to the world ye will not find the kingdom of God; and except ye keep the Sabbath ye shall not see the Father."

The third saying is similar to that contained in John, but the fourth is entirely new. Christ describes Himself as standing in the midst of the world, finding all men drunk and some asleep.

"The fourth saying has faded out and only one word remains. This is the Greek word for 'legary.' As this was a common word in the time of Christ, it is considered to be new."

The fifth saying, which contains certain gaps, reads: "Jesus saith, whenever there are (here comes a gap) and there is one (esp) alone I am with him. Raise the voice and there shall find me: cleave the wood and there I am."

The sixth saying coincides in part with Luke iv. 24: "No prophet is accepted in his own country; neither doth a physician work cures upon them that know him."

"The seventh saying is a city built upon the top of a high hill and established, can neither fall nor be hid," is a well-known saying of Jesus.

The eighth saying is undecipherable.

This manuscript is genuine, as seems probable, it may be compared with the one in the world preserving the words of Christ—older than any vellum pages on which are inscribed the books from which the New Testament has been made in these times.

The discoverers and editors of this fragment, Bernard P. Peck, Ph.D., D. D., of the "Unrecorded Sayings of Jesus." There can be no doubt, Professor Peck says, that besides the words of Jesus which are mentioned in the Gospels, others of more or less significance were spoken by him. Paul, it is said (Acr. xx. 35), mentions a saying of Christ—"It is more blessed to give than to receive"—which does not appear in the Canonical Gospels.

Dr. Peck proceeds to give an account of the published lists of what various biblical scholars have regarded as "unrecorded sayings" of Christ, or "agrapha." He says: "The agrapha collection reached its climax in the work published by Alfred Resch (Leipzig, 1880). Before Resch, Hofmann in his 'Lectures on the New Testament' (1851), and in his 'Introduction to the Study of the Gospels' (1869), Schaff in his 'History of the Christian Church,' vol. i. (1852), published a list of agrapha. Resch, Nestle published a list in his 'Novi Testamenti Graecae Supplementum' (1892), and in the same year Hofmann, in his 'Lectures on the New Testament,' gave a list of agrapha. Resch, Nestle, and Hofmann, in their works, have only mentioned those agrapha which they considered to be of value. Local Distribution of Lobsters.

Fishermen have discovered that lobsters can be caught in deeper water than was formerly believed; but their confidence in deeper water is not shared by the lobstermen when they forsake the inshore shallow areas resort to these greater depths.

Instead of moving, as many still think, over great portions of the coast, the lobstermen, as the fact shows, migrate from deeper water into shallower and back again. No doubt the great schools pass the winter at depths of 40 or 50 fathoms; but during the warm summer months they move into shallow water, 2 to 10 fathoms, where the females ripen their eggs and hatch them out.

There can be no doubt that lobsters, which extrude their eggs in April, May and June, accomplish the hatching of their fry in a few weeks, whereas late spawners, which extrude their eggs in September, October and November, probably
