# BATTLESHIPS VS. TORPEDOES.

If it be true that Admiral Uru has  
succeeded in getting between the Vi-  
divostok squadron and its base, we  
should have within a few days what  
the naval experts have been eagerly  
waiting for—a fight on the open sea  
between fleets fairly well matched and  
with no land batteries to meddle. If  
such a fight takes place, more light  
should be thrown on the comparative  
value of light and heavy armed ships  
of war than has come from any of the  
previous battles, in all of which the  
Russian land batteries and stationary  
submarine mines have played compli-  
cating parts.

The results so far have been wholly  
in favor of the contentions of those  
who pin their faith to light-armored,  
swift cruisers and torpedo boats and  
hold that the day of the cumbersome  
and expensive battleship is done. In  
the contest between armor and pro-  
jectiles, the latter have always kept  
in the lead and have by no means  
reached the limit of possibility, while  
in the matter of armor protection the  
inventors have apparently gone as far  
as they can. That the fleet of the  
future will be strengthened by a  
few larger vessels, will consist almost  
wholly of swift, elusive torpedo boats,  
is today practically conceded.

In an article in the last Review of  
Reviews, Hudson Maxim, the inven-  
tor, points out that while the torpedo  
boat may be more liable to destruction  
than the battleship, the battleship  
costs six millions of dollars, and may  
have a thousand men on board, while  
the torpedo boat may not cost more  
than one-fiftieth as much and may not  
have one-fiftieth part as many men  
on board. In other words, fifty torpedo  
boats may be built and manned at no  
greater expense than a single battle-  
ship. Consequently, fifty torpedo boats  
may be destroyed with the loss of all  
on board, in order to sink a single  
battleship, and the loss be equal to  
both sides, while if two battleships can  
be sunk by the sacrifice of fifty tor-  
pedo boats, the torpedo flotilla has won  
a decided victory. As a matter of  
fact, it is probable that in actual war-  
fare not more than ten torpedo boats,  
on the average, would be destroyed by  
battleships for every battleship sunk  
by them.

This means that the present tor-  
pedo system is five times as efficient as  
the battleship, and if these conclusions  
are correct it must be admitted that  
no conceivable improvement in bat-  
tleships can make up the deficiency.  
Once nations are convinced of this, it  
is probable that smallness and swiftness,  
instead of strength, will be the  
goal toward which naval inventors will  
strive. Torpedo boats are made to  
strike at cruisers and battleships;  
so smaller and swifter craft may be in-  
vented to strike at torpedo boats un-  
til the naval battles of the future may  
be fought by mile-a-minute automo-  
bile boats armed with one torpedo and  
managed by a single man.

The day of all these surface craft,  
however, ends with the perfection of  
the submarine, against the stealthy  
deadliness of which, battleship, cruiser,  
torpedo, or automobile boat are  
altogether powerless.

# FULLY JUSTIFIED.

The objection taken to the out-door  
working of the G. P. squad on the  
ground that the men are needlessly  
humiliated by being paraded through  
the streets, is foolish. Every man  
who is thus exhibited has previously  
made a bestial exhibition of himself  
on the public street and has, in the  
majority of cases, been dragged to jail  
by a stalwart policeman under the  
eyes of an interested crowd. And a  
man who thus humiliates himself and  
his relatives has no right to complain  
of the disgrace of being seen carrying  
a dinner pail and wearing yellow over-  
alls.

Moreover, the jail should be a place  
of punishment and reform. Under  
the old conditions there was ever re-  
formed and few who went there con-  
sidered the lazy, well-fed life any pun-  
ishment. That this hard labor system  
is a punishment is clearly shown by  
the reduction in the number of city  
prisoners and the increase of fines paid,  
and that hard work in the open air  
is more reforming than a seamy exis-  
tence of do-nothingness in a crowded  
and not over clean jail is just argu-  
ment. Every result of the installation  
of the hard labor system has fully  
justified his promoters.

For Henry M. Stanley, strong, coura-  
geous, enduring, there can be no more  
appropriate tribute than the lines of  
Browning, with which, applying them  
to his associates in the Emin Pasha  
expedition, he closed his book "In  
Darkest Africa":—

"One who never turned his back, but  
marched breast forward;  
Never doubted clouds would break,  
Never feared, though right were  
wrested, wrong would triumph;  
Held we fall to rise, are baffled to fight  
better,  
Sleep to wake."

# MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

At a meeting of the municipal coun-  
cil held yesterday, A. W. Macrae was  
elected warden. The parish officers  
were also appointed. The report of  
the finance committee, which was ad-  
opted with little change, provides for  
an increase of one hundred a year to  
the salaries of Samuel Clifford and W.  
J. Cunningham, of the jail staff. A  
lively debate took place over an item  
in the estimates of \$20,000 for the gen-  
eral public hospital. Councillors White  
and Maxwell locked horns in the mat-  
ter, but the mayor came out ahead and  
the money was voted.

Councillor Lewis, chairman of the  
hard labor committee, delivered a re-  
port on the Rock Candy Mine gang,  
which has been in existence just one  
year. Work that benefited the park to  
the extent of \$3,000 has been done and  
between four and five hundred yards  
of flint stone broken.

The next number of prisoners for  
the year 1903 was 1,176; for drunken-  
ness, 523. The net fines for same year  
were \$3,330.85. For 1902 the fines were  
\$2,852.30, leaving a balance in favor of  
hard labor of \$1,558.55, which, Council-  
lor Lewis thought, was a good show-  
ing for one year.

Councillor Lewis was congratulated  
on the work accomplished and urged  
to continue as chairman of the com-  
mittee.

# SISTER-IN-LAW RELENDS.

Is Determined to Take Good Care of  
Lizzie Pike Till She Recovers.

Lizzie Pike, whose experiences have  
attracted so much attention, was re-  
ported late last night to be doing well.  
Both mother and child have borne up  
wonderfully since the birth of the lat-  
ter. It has now transpired that Mrs.  
Reuben Pike, who refused to admit the  
girl to her house, has changed in her  
manner and is exceedingly anxious  
that the girl shall remain with her  
until she is fully recovered. She still  
contends that when the girl called up-  
on her, she refused her admittance  
owing to the fact that her husband  
was absent at the time and she hard-  
ly knew what to do. She is therefore  
quite willing to pay up for it all by  
doing her best to nurse the unfortu-  
nate back to health.

# TERCENTENARY PLANS.

The general committee of the Cham-  
plain celebration met last night in  
city hall. The appointment of funds  
and other matters were discussed.

The R. K. Y. Club are to fit up a  
boat, but they will need more than the  
\$500 which has been allowed them.

The Salvage Corps will probably take  
part in the celebration and will need  
some money.

The trades and Labor Council's mon-  
ey will be controlled by a commit-  
tee.

The bands will probably get more  
than \$200 apiece.

A subscription list is to be opened up  
to raise the sum of \$2,000.

The services of the school children  
as a choir at the public meeting will  
likely be secured.

One thousand medals commemorative  
of the occasion are to be obtained.

Dr. Thos. Walker was given full  
charge of the finances.

M. McLean, L. P. D. Tilley and E.  
R. Chapman's names were added to the  
celebration committee.

A prize will probably be offered for  
window decoration.

# LOCAL NEWS

in Labor Hall last evening, but owing  
to the small number in attendance,  
no matters of importance were dis-  
cussed.

Col. White, D. O. C., said last eve-  
ning that he had not yet received any  
definite instructions in regard to the  
military camp at Sussex. It is very  
probable, however, that the camp will  
open June 25th. It is not known what  
battalions will be present, but Col.  
White expects full information with-  
in a week.

A very successful entertainment was

assisted by the pupils of Miss Rod-  
gers' class. The programme was as

The house was well filled and the en-  
tertainment was thoroughly enjoyed by  
all. The concert will be repeated this  
evening in the Carlton City Hall.

# DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, May 10.—For the second  
day this week the government sup-  
porters have occupied all the time and  
have delayed business. They could  
not have done so without Laurier's  
permission. Not a single bill has been  
passed since this week. The debate  
yesterday and today was raised by  
government on purely local conditions  
apparently with the idea of killing  
time. Towards the close the deputy  
speaker's rulings were called in ques-  
tion by the opposition and Dr. Mc-  
Donald was in hot water for half an  
hour. Sir Wilfrid was much annoyed,  
but for once kept his temper.

After recess the government lost  
control of the house, as it did the day  
before. Laurier was patient, but it  
was a big strain on the old man,  
eloquent.

When the whole day had been  
wasted by government speakers, the  
militia bill came up late tonight for  
discussion.

Sir Frederic Borden talked for some  
time in explanation of his bill, and  
after passing all militia resolutions  
the house adjourned at 10:45. Laurier  
was a very tired man.

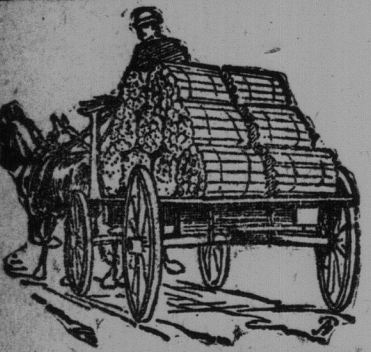
