THE ROYAL COMMISSION.
Its Dissolution Approaching—How Public Opinion is Formed—How Much Money Sir Hugh Spent, and Why he Spent it.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)
OTTAWA, Sept. 20.

Well, we have had the best and the worst of the great scandal. The days of the Commission are numbered. True, the investigation may drag along for a few days yet, till Hantington's witness list is exhausted; but it is not at all probable that the witnesses yet to be called will throw any light (or darkness) upon the matter. The interest manifested in the case, reached the greatest height, during the last few days, when the chief actor who figured prominently in the Pacific Railway events, appeared upon the stand, and drew aside the screen which had hidden the secrets of the scandal from the prying public gaze. The case is closed. The members of the Government principally connected with the affair, have in the most unreserved manner recounted their motives, words and deeds in connection with the great railway.

The men to whom it is said they basely sold the contract, for money to retain themselves in power, have also told us what they did and why they did it. The brother and "confidential partner" of the chief actor, added his testimony. Mr. Hantington had no evidence to give, and will have none, even should a committee be appointed; and both the friends of the Government and of the Opposition have all they are likely to secure, in the way of evidence, upon which to give a verdict in the case. Of course the evidence will not in any way affect

THE VERDICT OF THE CRIES.
They pronounced the Government guilty before a world of testimony was given; and when the strict correspondence was published, and made astounding by the clever fabrications of the Chicago blackmailer, they re-sold the verdict, and condemned and exalted the Government before a world of evidence could be attempted in defence. By ceaselessly fanning an imaginary, and impulsive popular feeling, they gradually educated the public mind in any way under their control, into a condition which was likely to prevent the possibility of a calm survey of the situation; and when the investigation did take place a very large body of the people were, and no doubt are, prepared to put the worst construction upon everything the Government did, and to photograph any incident, or exploit, or solemn which the accused might make.

The Grits were prepared to believe the Government guilty no matter what the evidence might be, and so far as they are concerned, it matters little what developments are made. They carried the agitation across the Atlantic, and through the whole course of this excitement, public opinion in England has been so completely misled by their representations, that they have not only been the cause of a large number of the English Press, but also of the English public, in their first declarations have created an impression not easily removed. So much for public opinion. We have seen the decision of the Opposition would not and will not be influenced by any evidence brought out before the Commission. The decision virtually rests with the friends of the Government, and it is for them to consider whether the charges are well founded.

SELLING THE PACIFIC RAILWAY CONTRACT.
To Sir Hugh Allan and the Americans, has been pronounced the evidence of Sir John MacDonald, Langvin, Sir Hugh and Abbott, prove that the contract was never promised to Sir Hugh, and that neither he nor his Canadian Pacific Company ever got that contract, and that Sir Hugh spent money lavishly on the elections, for reasons given clearly by himself in his testimony.

Sir Hugh's testimony, yesterday shows that it is of vital importance to him that railway extension westward take place. That when it was decided to build the Pacific Railway, he determined to give his whole energy to furthering the cause. As he had no money to invest in the enterprise, he sought for a company to build the road; and that he kept this secret from the Opposition. When it was known that he was negotiating with the Americans, Government declared their policy to be the total exclusion of the American element; and that he afterwards formed the Canadian Pacific Company, securing an Act of Incorporation, based on American execution.

About the same time the Intercolonial Company was also incorporated. That Government expressed a desire for the amalgamation of the two companies, and some efforts were made in that direction. This was the position of affairs when the elections came on.

so would reverse the Railway policy of the Government.
That Sir Hugh was asked to subscribe to the elections, by Sir George Carter, and that he did so, to the extent of \$100,000, this amount not being given at once, but from time to time, as the contest grew fiercer.
That he never paid this money in execution of his Company receiving the Contract.
That the only promise made was that if the companies were amalgamated, Government would help him, as the leading railway man in Canada, to secure the Presidency.

That he never received any intimation that he would not give the contract to his company, nor "Monmouth"; and that if amalgamation did not take place, they would FORM A NEW COMPANY which would represent every section of the Dominion.
That after the failure of amalgamation efforts, Sir Hugh's Canadian Pacific Company CEASED TO EXIST, and that neither he nor that Company ever got the contract.
That Government formed a new company, in which he is only allowed one-third of an interest; that he was elected President without Government influence, and that many of the Directors were appointed by Government against his wishes, and that he stands on the same footing precisely as every other Director.

That when negotiating with the Americans they advanced \$400,000, and when the negotiations broke off he paid back every dollar, and that not one cent of that money was spent in our elections; but that he paid every dollar of his subscription out of his private income.
That he has six million dollars invested in Canadian enterprises; that railway extension westward is essential to the success of his steamship lines; that he has received a Government contract to build a railway from Montreal to the Pacific coast, which would be injurious to his interests, and that these motives impelled him to use every effort to support the Government, and though he never expected payment, was satisfied with what he had done.
