

ANNUAL REPORT, 1896-97

The committee entrusted with the work of the Association during the past year have very great reason to praise God for what He has done through them since our last annual report was submitted.

This report shall deal first with the organization and work of the Association at home, and then will attempt to give a few words concerning what has been done in each of the fields in which it has pleased God to grant us the privilege of sending our missionaries abroad. The one is as pressingly important as the other in the furtherance of that great and blessed movement, the result of which shall be the bringing back of "the King."

I. THE WORK AT HOME.

There have been in all thirteen meetings of the committee held during the year, besides numerous gatherings of smaller sub-committees for the discussion of the business of the Association. In all these deliberations the one object of the committee has always been to strive to ascertain what God would have them do, and by His grace carry the same into effect. In addition to these meetings of the committee five public gatherings, under the auspices of the C.C.M.A., have been held.

On January 18th a farewell meeting to Rev. Wm. C. White on the eve of his leaving for China.

In the early spring a meeting, addressed by Dr. Hardie, whose subject was missionary work in Korea.

In June a meeting to hear an address on "Ceylon" by Mr. Ernest Carus-Wilson.

In July a farewell meeting to take leave of Miss Thomas before leaving for South America, and at the end of August another public gathering to hear addresses by Rev. Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Phillips on their way back to China.

In the early part of the year another vacancy was occasioned among the trustees of the Association by the death of Rev. Principal Henderson, of the Montreal Diocesan College. It has been found difficult to find any one to take the place of so valued a friend of the Association. The position has not yet been filled. No further vacancies or changes have taken place in the ranks of the committee and officers during the year.

As the result of repeated and increasing requests made by the Bishops of Northwest Canada that the Association should launch out more into work there instead of turning its attention so much to what is known as the

"Heathen in the Regions Beyond," the committee felt led to give very careful attention to this whole question, and the following is an extract of the report of a sub-committee appointed to deal with the matter, which was unanimously adopted by the executive, and which they are anxious should be made as public as possible:

1. The general policy of the C.C.M.A. is defined by its constitution and its connection with the C.M.S., viz.: "To take a part in the evangelization of the heathen and Mohammedan world." This points the C.C.M.A. to the foreign field as its chief sphere of work, and can only incidentally include work among the settlers and the Christianized Indians of the Northwest.

2. The responsibilities of the Northwest missions fall upon the whole Canadian Church, and, while the members of the C.C.M.A. are most willing as individuals to bear their full share therein, the Association is precluded by its constitution from enlarging its work in the Northwest beyond such special and incidental cases as may in the future, as in the past, be laid upon it in the providence of God.

3. While adhering to this general policy, the C.C.M.A. will be glad to co-operate with bishops in the Northwest connected with the C.M.S. by examining candidates, and also, when possible, in equipping and sending them forth. It is ready, moreover, to receive, acknowledge, and forward money sent in for such workers when in the field, provided always that the Association is not held responsible for their support.

Since, however, the adoption of this report the subject has again been opened up, and at the earnest request of friends of Evangelical Church missions in the diocese of Rupert's Land arrangements have been made for the holding of a conference at an early date between the C.C.M.A. and chosen representatives from the Northwest. It is proposed at this conference that the whole question shall be gone into, and careful thought and prayer given to the question, what is best to be done in order to meet the solemn crisis which is imminent in the Church's mission work among the still heathen Indians of that vast district.

The Association under God's blessing now have eleven married and ten unmarried missionaries in the field; these together with the wives of the married men make a total number of Canadian missionaries in the field in connection with our work of thirty one—four of whom have gone out since our last annual meeting. These are now assisted in the work by a staff of twelve catechists and eight Bible women. All of these dear brethren and sisters are, in the opinion of the committee, doing good and telling work for the Lord, where He has appointed them to labour, and they bespeak for them from every friend of the Association continuous and believing prayer, and earnest practical sympathy.

Besides these who are now in active work in the field the Association has eighteen candidates at home; of these two have been accepted for immediate service, three are in training preparatory to their going out, and thirteen are still under our examination. There are in addition to these quite a number of offers of services in the foreign field, which the committee have not felt it right to accept.

We are glad to be able to tell you that the Canadian edition of *The Gleaner* has increased in circulation during the year. There are now 237 more copies taken than when we last reported concerning it. Your committee is, however, convinced that as this is, in their opinion, a localized edition of the very best and most attractive missionary paper published, it is worthy of being much more taken and read by our friends than it is. They would urge upon every friend not only to subscribe to it himself, but immediately to become active in securing others to take the paper—remembering the command Christ Himself gave us, "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields."

We are glad to be able to report a growing interest in the Depository for C.M.S. and other missionary books and tracts at the Deaconess and Missionary Training House, 577 Church street.

The missionary lending library, under the kind continued charge of Miss Cross, continues to be much used, but we should be glad to hear of more who will give missionary books, and will, by the payment of fifty cents per year, become readers of the same.

There has been a steadily increasing output of missionary boxes during the year. Over two thousand are now in use. Thanks to the continued interest and work of Miss Cooper, who still keeps charge of this branch of the work, and sends the boxes out from her own home, 106 Amelia street, nearly all of this large number are from month to month producing an ever increasing revenue for the Association. Very few boxes have been lost sight of or are held by those who do not make returns.

We are indeed thankful to be able to report the Gleaners' Union is in a most promising and healthy condition. Under the continued charge of Miss Thomas it still continues to be an increasing source of strength in the work of the Association. During the past year 600 new Gleaners have been enrolled, and 13 new branches formed. The total number of Canadian branches is now 43, and the entire roll of Gleaners is 2,549, of whom 2,000 are active members at present. Enquiries are continually being received about the purpose and work of the Union, and some new branches are even now in course of formation.

The work of the Union is everywhere carried on in perfect harmony with other branches of Christian activity, interest is increasing steadily, and in several cases opposition to missions has been quietly overcome.

For Our Own Missionary Fund there has been sent, during the past year, \$159.20; this, with the \$55.55 previously on hand, makes a total of \$214.75. All gifts sent in for this or any other Gleaners' Union object are, of course, above and beyond the regular contributions of the Gleaners to the C.C.M.A. funds, which go directly to the Association treasurer.

This is the first time that we have had the pleasure of reporting, at the annual meeting of the Association, the good work done by a regularly organized auxiliary of this Association.

The Huron Auxiliary of the C.C.M.A. was formed at a large meeting held in Huron College in October, 1896.

The following officers were elected: Hon. President, Provost Watkins,

M.A.; President, Prof. F. T. Harrison, Ph.D.; Secretary, Rev. G. B. Sage, B.D.; Treasurer, W. Crawford, Esq.

An executive committee was formed, consisting of the officers and other elected members of the Auxiliary.

It was decided that the constitution about to be set forth for the government of auxiliaries should be followed, and that the Auxiliary should work in closest harmony with the General Executive of the C.C.M.A.

Two public meetings have been held during the year.

At several points in the diocese a local interest has been awakened in behalf of the aims and purposes of the C.C.M.A., which everywhere need only to be understood to be accepted by our best Church people. It is felt by all that this auxiliary will be much strengthened and blessed by having a missionary from its own ranks in the field. We are, however, thankful to state that candidates are in training, and willingly offer themselves to go wherever they may in the good providence of God be called.

The Baldwin Memorial Missionary Bursary has been held by Mr. G. P. Bentley, a student of Wycliffe College, who is preparing for foreign service under the C.C.M.A.

A ladies' candidates committee has been formed for the purpose of assisting the examining board in interviewing and approving ladies who offer for the foreign field.

Signs of increasing interest and conviction, thank God, are not wanting. A member of the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto, has offered \$100 a year for ten years to support another missionary in the field. Another has done the same in Lindsay, while for the definite extension of the work of the Association a member of the committee has given the sum of \$500 unconditionally, but with the expressed hope that earnest effort as unto the Lord and in the Lord's strength shall be made this year to increase the income by at least \$5,000. After waiting upon God in regard to the matter the committee has pledged itself and the Association to this proposed advance effort all along the line.

Before passing on to speak of the work in the different fields the committee wish to report that it is proposed at once to appoint, wherever possible district secretaries of the Association in the different parts of the country for the purpose of furthering the objects of the C.C.M.A.

It is also proposed to make an immediate effort to double the circulation of the *Gleaner*, and largely increase the number of missionary boxes in use at the present time. The committee is also very anxious that a regular system of deputations should be arranged for, to visit and conduct meetings in the interest of the C.C.M.A. work in all places at all in sympathy with the aims and objects of the association. Some of these have already been arranged, and the new committee to be appointed this evening will be glad to receive communications for any places desiring such meetings to be held.

II. THE MISSION FIELD.

Turning, now, from the home work to the Mission Field, though the vastness of the need of the heathen and Mohammedan world stands out before us

more vividly than ever, we are thankful to God for what has been accomplished through the instrumentality of our representatives scattered over three continents.

NORTHWEST CANADA.

In Northwest Canada our missionaries are labouring in five different dioceses, as follows:

Rupert's Land.—The Rev. R. F. Nie, of Oswald, supplies nine stations, having to drive forty-five miles to give eight of these alternate services on Sunday. At one of these there is a congregation of half-breeds. During the year thirteen candidates were confirmed. In view of the great need of this diocese Mr. Nie asks that the friends of the C. C. M. A. will not drop their generous support.

Calgary.—The Rev. E. F. Hockley, of St. Paul's mission, of the Blood Reserve, was, during part of the year, acting as superintendent of the whole mission owing to Mr. Swainson's return to England, but on the appointment of Rev. Arthur de B. Owen to take charge of the Kissonck Homes, Mr. Hockley resumed his evangelistic work at Red Crow's Camp. On July 12th, he was married to Miss Nellie Parker, of Toronto.

In response to a request from Archdeacon Tims, Miss Bella Rutherford was examined as to fitness, and being approved, was sent to this mission, to act as matron and nurse in the Girls' Home. She has twenty-five Indian girls of various ages under her care.

Athabasca.—The Rev. Charles Weaver, for whom this Association receives and forwards contributions, is encouraged by his year's work at Wapuskow. In his new home there are now seventeen Indian children.

"We are laying the foundation of the mission here" he says. This is being literally done in a physical sense, and we are trying hard to do it in a spiritual sense.

"Our faith is built on nothing less
Than Jesus' Blood and Righteousness."

The Association has also agreed to receive and bear the expense of training at Wycliffe College, Toronto, a young man for future work in this Diocese under Bishop Young.

Mackenzie River.—The centres at which our missionaries work are at the extreme north and the extreme south of this vast diocese.

St. Peter's Mission, Hay River, is the southern station. On the first of last February, Rev. T. J. Marsh left for a brief furlough, and after walking seven hundred miles and driving two hundred more reached Edmonton on March 12th. His stay amongst us was short, but it was not without advantage to his work, for in June he returned with a bride, taking with him also Mr. Stanley Soanes as a lay-helper. With Miss Ann Marsh and Miss Tims assisting in the Indian School, St. Peter's Mission is now the best equipped as well as the brightest station, according to the Bishop, in the diocese. The missionaries were much encouraged by an aged chief catching a faint glimmer of the Gospel light.

Far to the north of this, within the Arctic circle, is St. Matthew's Mission, Peel River. It will be remembered that although this station has long been

a centre for Indian work, it has of late years been also the basis of work among the Eskimo, scattered along the Arctic coast for a hundred miles or more on both sides of the mouth of the Mackenzie River, which is a hundred miles below Peel River. This explains the frequent trips away from the central station.

Two weeks after arriving at Peel River, a year ago last July, Mr. and Mrs. Stringer, accompanied by Mr. Whittaker, started for the coast, having had the sorrow, just before leaving, of witnessing the death of the faithful interpreter, Peter Luggan, who passed peacefully away to a better home a true follower of Christ.

At Kittigagzyooit, near Richard's Island, a drunken Eskimo chief attempted to kill Mr. Whittaker, but the other Eskimo interfered. It was on this occasion that Mrs. Stringer found that the Eskimo women were truly sympathetic, as they stroked her hands to calm and cheer her. Turning westward they reached Herschel Island after two weeks' journey. Here they lived for some time in a sod house. Sunday services were held for the sailors of the whaling ships, and almost daily services for the natives. The 3rd of October they arrived at Peel River again, and were welcomed by Mr. Young who had been left in charge of the mission. On January the 7th Mr. Whittaker again left for the Arctic Coast visiting the same places, at one time almost perishing from cold on the wind swept ice of the frozen ocean where he had lost his way. On April the 3rd he once more reached Peel River, having walked from Herschel Island, a distance of two hundred miles. Mr. Stringer and Mr. Young then went over the same district, returning by boat up the Mackenzie River, June the 23rd. Mr. Young, who has been an invaluable helper, in testifying to the high regard in which Mr. Stringer is held by both the Eskimo, and the sailors of the whaling vessels, mentions that a chief engineer of one of the vessels has Mr. Stringer's name written in his Bible over against Proverbs 16 : 7, and gives this as the explanation of this universal esteem, "When a man's ways please the Lord, he maketh even his enemies to be at peace with him."

Owing to the evil influence of many white men upon the Eskimo there seems to be a growing indifference on the part of some to Christianity. Mr. Stringer admits that this is discouraging, but says, "We can only hope, and pray, and work on. A few at least of the Eskimo are really in earnest."

It is needless to say how Mrs. Stringer's presence and the arrival of a little daughter last December has brought the sweet influence of a Christian home into that far off region.

Selkirk.—The Rev. H. A. Naylor and his wife, who went from Montreal after being accepted by the C.C.M.A., in response to the appeal of Bishop Bompas, have been stationed during the past year at Forty Mile on the Upper Yukon. He and Mr. Nie are the only missionaries on our list who are working amongst settlers, and not among the heathen and Mohammedan. A neat little church has been built at Forty Mile, which, however, has suffered by the rush to the gold fields of Klondyke, fifty miles further up the river. It is here, close to Dawson City, that Mr. Flewelling is labouring among the Indians. He had to change the site of his station, and is putting up a

building to be house, school and Church in one. He has from 18 to 25 Indian children in his school, and holds service for the Indians in the Tukudd language. He says: "The work is hard and discouraging, but when done for Christ's sake and in His Name hope brightens, and there is more than a reward even here in the peace and quiet of His presence." At this time when all eyes are upon this land of gold let the earnest prayers of every friend of the cause of Christ go up to God, that through the faithful ministry of our brothers there, many souls may find the true riches of the Gospel—gold which perisheth not.

JAPAN.

Leaving this continent, next in order though oldest in time is our mission in Japan. During the year the chief change has been in the widening of the sphere of our missionaries. There are now three centres of work—Nagoya, Gifu, and Toyohashi.

Nagoya.—Our senior missionary, Rev. J. C. Robinson, reports among the removals of the year the death of Miss Kawamura, a native Christian worker of great promise. She "fell asleep" at a very lonely place at the seaside, whither she had been taken for a change of air. She was visited by Mr. Robinson, who found her trusting in the Lord and awaiting patiently His call; the Holy Communion was administered to her a few days before she passed away. In January Mr. Saiki resigned his position as catechist, and went to Tokyo. There have, however, been reinforcements. Mr. T. M. Mori, a catechist of some experience and some energy, was sent by the C.M.S. District Conference to Ichinomiya, the first largest town in the county outside of the City of Nagoya. To the next largest town, Tsushima, Mr. R. Kaji, a teacher of the Yoro-In, was sent in May—his former place being acceptably filled. The two Yamazakis continue to work faithfully at St. James' Church and at Koku Cho, within the city, and also at the suburb of Bjwajima.

Miss Trent passed her first language examination successfully last December. She, with Miss Young and Mrs. Nihira, the senior mission-helper, live in the house formerly occupied by Mr. Baldwin, where they are very comfortable. They divide their time equally between this district and Habashita, visiting the homes of the Japanese women. Miss Young writes: "When people have been seen to receive a foreign Christian into their home and they appear in the streets afterwards, the children and neighbours often call after them 'Iyesu! Iyesu!' which is the Japanese for Jesus. Very few can endure this. Some homes, however, are always open, and there are evidences of real interest in Gospel teaching.

Gifu.—Rev. H. J. Hamilton says: "Our field has enlarged somewhat since my last annual report, as we now work at the village of Jaiki in the Imao district as well as in the towns of Imao and Takasu; we have also held meetings at two other towns, Kasamatsu and Tarui, which we hope to work regularly, so that by the end of the year we shall, God willing, be at work in ten stations. With our present staff of catechists, five in number, including one blind catechist, who works especially for the blind, we cannot expect to still further increase the number of our regular preaching stations, but shall

be able probably to pay occasional visits for wayside preaching in neighbouring towns and villages."

The blind school is now in more suitable quarters. On July the 4th a new church building was opened in Gifu. It will seat one hundred, with room for thirty or forty to stand in the porch and listen. (Total cost, \$425. Present debt, \$40, Canadian currency.) During the year six candidates have been baptized and five admitted to the catechumenate. About seven hundred dollars passed through Mr. Hamilton's hands as treasurer of the Inundation Relief Fund, raised through the generous help of Bishop Bickersteth, since passed to his eternal reward. Over eleven hundred destitute people received assistance. This has had its influence in favour of Christianity.

In January, a native Christian, a young man of thirty, fell asleep in Jesus after a long illness. He died so happily that his mother, also a Christian, shortly after invited all the Christians to her house to unitedly thank God for her son's peaceful and happy death. A young man, not a Christian, who had come with the others, was so deeply impressed that he decided to become a follower of Christ, and after due preparation was baptized.

Toyohashi.—This third centre of work was occupied by Rev. J. Macqueen Baldwin last November. It is a railway town, forty-five miles from Nagoya, on the way to Tokyo; it has in itself a population of 20,000, and there are eighty-three villages grouped round it, making a population of 200,000 within easy reach. Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin are assisted in their work by an excellent native catechist and his wife.

This is a hopeful field. The people seem more friendly and approachable than at Nagoya, which is a strong hold of Buddhism. Mr. Baldwin, after seven years' service, is entitled to furlough expenses for himself and family, amounting to about \$800. He has generously consented to waive his claim if the C.C.M.A. will send out an ordained man to assist in the work as soon as possible. The need now is for a suitable man, a young unmarried clergyman, thoroughly consecrated to the missionary cause. The Association has many candidates under examination, but none ready for immediate service in Japan. Who will offer?

CHINA.

Crossing from Japan to China we are thankful to report decided advancement in this quarter. Rev. J. R. S. Boyd took up his abode at Ku-Cheng in Mr. Stewart's house last December. He has passed his first language examination, and at the opening of All Saints' Memorial Church at Ku-Cheng last Easter, preached his first sermon in Chinese. He has taken several evangelistic tours, the last one with only a native catechist, when he visited the various out-stations of the district, preaching and administering the Holy Communion, as he is the only fully ordained clergyman of our Church for ninety miles round.

Of one of these stations he says: "I was struck at once by the happy, bright faces of the Christians. There is real solid work going on here, and all done by the Chinese themselves."

At this same place he baptized twenty-one who confessed Christ before

men. Mrs. Boyd and Miss Garnett are getting on well with the language, and "Robbie," the only foreign child in the district, can speak Chinese splendidly.

Last February, through the liberality of some of the friends of the C.C.M.A., we were enabled to send into the same part of China, Rev. W. C. White, who within twenty-five days after leaving Canada was standing on martyr-ground at Ku-Cheng. Originally intended to assist Rev. Mr. Phillips at Kien Yang, owing to the sad loss by drowning of Mr. Collins, he will probably fill the vacancy in Kien-Ning.

Thus the Canadian Church is honoured in having Canadian clergymen in charge of two immense districts, lying side by side in the province of Fuh Kien. Mr. White hopes that a third Canadian will soon be sent to labour in the next region beyond, viz.: Kien Yang.

In September Mr. White left for Shanghai, where he was to meet and marry Miss Annie Ray, a trained deaconess from Toronto, who accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Phillips to China last month.

SOUTH AMERICA.

Passing downward to South America we are thankful to report that "the neglected continent" has had a share of the attention of the C.C.M.A. during the past year. In response to the Rev. C. A. Sadleir's earnest appeal for a trained lady worker, a deaconess, Miss Louy Thomas, was equipped and sent on her way to China *viz* England last July. She is the first South American missionary supported entirely by the Canadian Church. The C.C.M.A. has, by this step, proved itself to be an auxiliary of the South American Missionary Society in something more than name.

Mr. Sadleir, in moving from Cholchol to his new home at Wapi in the Queppe district, met with a sad loss in the death of his two youngest children (one an only son) by diphtheria. We feel sure that the heart of every friend of the work goes forth in loving sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Sadleir in their great loss.

As to the work still to be done it is estimated that there are over 60,000 Indians speaking the Araucanian language, few of whom have ever heard the pure and simple Gospel.

PALESTINE.

The last field to be mentioned is Palestine.

This land of sacred memories, once trodden by the feet of Jesus, is to be brought much closer to us by a "living link." Rev. S. H. Gould, B.A., M.D., after many years of patient study, now stands ready to go forth in the Master's name to both "heal the sick" and "preach the word" among those languishing under the dark shadow of Islam. Re-conquest is harder than conquest. Dr. Gould is going to no easy field. The first medical missionary of our Church to a foreign land needs the most earnest prayers of this Association.
