## HOTEL MAN ENDS HIS LIFE IN SENSATIONAL MANNER THIS MORNING

### Cut His Throat With Sword While Temporarily Insane --Little Cause Given For Rash Act.

### INQUEST TO-NIGHT

W. R. Riddell, proprietor of the  
Strathmore Hotel, committed suicide  
at an early hour this morning.  
Last night when he retired he lock-  
ed himself in his room, and it was  
during the early morning that some-  
one heard sounds were heard issuing  
from his apartments. The door could not  
be forced and a ladder was secured  
and entrance made by the window.  
When discovered it was found that he  
had cut a deep gash in his throat with  
a sword which hung in his room.  
Medical aid was at once summoned  
but despite all that could be done he  
passed away a short time after being  
found.

In their sad affliction Mrs. Riddell  
and children have the sympathy of all  
deceased was about forty six years of  
age. The only cause assigned for  
his rash act is that he lost a suit pend-  
ing against him, decision being given  
yesterday, and that he was tempo-  
rarily unaccountable for his actions.  
An inquest was held at noon, and  
adjourned until the evening.

**BOYS' CAMPS**

There is more fun in a camp for boys than can be imagined by a person that has never been by one. The camp conducted by the Maritime Committee of the Y. M. C. A. have become so popular that it is now necessary to run them in two sections. The Directors chosen are men who are interested in the development of boys and want to see them have a wholesome good time. These men with their able assistants insure a perfect outing to the boys.

Boys from all parts of the province are invited to attend either section of the Maritime Boys' Camp. Section one will be held August 2-17 at Robertson's Point, N. B. The boys gather at St. John and Piccadilly and go into camp by one of the river boats. The tents are on a high point and look out over Grand Lake. In the distance can be seen the village of Chipman. Here a large number of the standards Sentinal Rock. It is an ideal place for a camp.

Rev. G. A. Lawson is to be the Director of this section and Mr. Moore the boys' Work Secretary of the St. John Y. M. C. A. will assist him.
