

It is still a basic industry. The saw-mill has decimated the once magnifi-cent forests of the United States. The vast virgin woods of British Columbia offer the lumberman the most profitable field on the American continent.

By wrecking the industry in Russia, the greatest lumbering nation in the Eastern Hemisphere, the war gave renewed importance to the Pacific slope of Canada. Not in history has there been such a demand for lumber as arose for home building in devastated Europe after the war. In the years following the armistice the export lumber trade of the province has broken all records.

But this is also a record era for set-tlement. For the first time the influx of homeseekers into British Columbia has rivaled that of the prairie provinces. The farmer has followed the lumberjacks. Where forests stood are golden grain fields.

How agriculture has gained on lumbering is shown by recent statistics of the British Columbia Manufacturers Association. According to these fig industries in the province last year was: Lumber, \$64,970,000; agriculture, \$60,065,000; mining, \$23,066,641; fishing, \$22,329,000; other industries, \$58,000,000.



THEFARMLOANSYSTEM

Government Plan for Developing Farm Property.

Loans Limited to Specific Purpose —Reasonable Rate of Interest for Long Term Loans—Helps to Straighten Estate Tangles-About Repayments.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of

On October 28th last the Agriculural Development Board passed the first loan under the long term farm oan legislation of the previous session. Since that time loans to the amount of about \$800,000 have been

In noting the progress as shown by the figures quoted it is necessary to remember that the loans are limitto certain specific purposes. Acquiring land, erection of buildings, straightening up an estate - these were the purposes in the original Act and loans up to 65 per cent. of the value of the property could be made.

To these purposes have now been added the discharging of encumbrances where such encumbrances do not exceed 40 per cent. of the value, and the cost of installing the drains.

Three Features.

Three Features.

There are three features of the plan which have been commented on favorably by applicants. These are:

1. Money is available.

2. Rate of interest.

3. Amortization of repayments.

There has been a general impression that there was always plenty of money available in rural Ontarto to money available in rural Ontario to finance all farm mortgages offered. This is not as true now in any section as formerly, and is not true at all in some sections. Victory bonds attracted large sums of money from rural Ontario and moreover developed an understanding of bonds and their advantages for investment which did not previously exist. Consequently many applicants for loans have stated that there was now little or no money available in their community for farm mortgages.

Then the rate of interest at six percent, is regarded as reasonable for a long term loan. It is, of course, two or three per cent. less than prevailing rates in New Ontario, and there is reason to believe that in old Ontario it has a stabilizing influence. This is not as true now in any sec-

is reason to believe that in old On-tario it has a stabilizing influence. But the feature which appears to appeal to many is the basis of re-payment. When the repayment is divided into annual instalments of principal and interest and spread over a period of twenty years it gives a sense of permanence and enables a man to make his plans accordingly. A payment of 87.17 per thousand dollars borrowed, will discharge the entire loan in 20 years, and this is not much more than the interest payments which would be asked in some cases otherwise. Most morrowers are looking forward to having the entire loan discharged long before the maximum period, but when they are told they can pay as much as they like on due date after the third year they are quite satisfied.

FACTS ABOUT NIAGARA.

Hydro-Electric Development May Add

to Beauty of Falls. Pretty soon the Americans will be called upon to consider an international agreement with Canada for augmenting the usefulness of Niagara Falls as a source of power. Objection electric development on the ground that it would mar the scenic effect of the falls—the proposition being to take out of the river twice as much water as is now diverted therefrom for power production. This notion, however, is declared to be a mistake.

for power production. This notion, however, is declared to be a mistake. Engineers say that the thing could be done in such a way as actually to improve and render more impressive our greatest natural wonder.

The crest of the Canadian, er Horseshoe, Fall is about 2,600 feet across; that of the American fall is 1,000 feet. Sixteen times as much water passes over the Horseshoe Fall as over the American fall. The inid-dle part of the Horseshoe crest is deep in a curve, and more than four-fifths of the flow plunges over the cliff behind a thick cloud of mist. That portion is seldom more than partly visible, and then only when a favorable wind blows the spray to one side. Thus much more than half of the water of the cataract adds nothing at all to its grandeur, unless by increasing the volume of sound, while it actually injures the scenic effect by the mist it creates.

The general effect of the falls would be much improved if more of the water passed over the cliff on the 'American side. In other words, it would be an advantage if the flow were equalized to some extent. This, say the engineers, could be brought about by the simple expedient of dumping large quantities of rock into the river above the falls to form a

about by the simple expedient of dumping large quantities of rock into the river above the falls to form a lower submerged dam between the up-per end of Goat Island and the Cana-dian shore. The dam, or weir, thus created, would raise the level of the water above, the falls and spread it away from the middle toward the sides, endering the secrify heavity of

sides, enhancing the scenic beauty of the cataract. the catarack.

In less than eight miles the river falls 314 feet. At the American fall it drops 168 feet sheer. The water, as it passes over the Horseshoe, is eight feet deep. Both the Horseshoe and the American cliff are vertical precipices. The river runs twenty-three miles an hour, and under average conditions has a flow of 210,000 cubic feet per second. Its total potential energy is 7,500,000 theoretical horsepower.

power has been developed on the American side, or thereabouts, and 370,000 horsepower on the Canadian side. The total quantity of water taken out for the production of power

taken out for the production of power is 56,000 cubic feet per second.

The hydro-electric development at Niagara has already added to the welfare and prosperity of this country. There is plenty of demand for the additional power, which would be furnished by a total diversion of 80,000 cubic feet per second around the falls and 40,000 cubic feet per second around Lower Rapids.

It operates as a gigantic grinder, the Horseshoe Fall wearing away the cliff over which it drops so rapidly that within a century it has reached something like 300 feet. It is, in fact, the river that has created by crosion the Niagara Gorge.

The water that passes over the fall represent the drainage of an area.

half as big as France. The water surface alone within that area is 95,205 square miles, with a shore line exceeding 8,300 miles in length.

An interesting fact well worth considering is that the hydro-electric developments as they exist to-day present a spectacle of beauty, grandeur and sublimity almost rivaling that of the falls themselves.




