Advices from Hong Kong to July 18, and from Yokohama to July 28, have been received. There are complaints that the tea trade is going from bad to worse. United States Minister Denby has secured a settlement of all American claims for compensation. Some of these claims were for destruction of the missionary property in Canton Province eight years ago. Those who take a special course are not required to do any manual labor on the farm, and yet they may take advantage of any instruction that may be given at the stables if they choose to do this.

I would not on any account have it understood that I am recommending this in preference to the complete two years' course. The students should take a full two years' course where at all possible, or what is much preferable the regular three years' course. Berhaps it is not generally understood that a student who passes all the examinations for two years becomes an associate or graduate, and that the degree of B. S. A. is conferred upon those who successfully pass all the examinations for three years.

There may be, however, a large number of young men who cannot leave the farm for two or three years, and yet they could do so for one year. I am satisfied that to them a special course, such as I have doscribed, would be of much value. They could thus get all the lectures on general agriculture and on live stock, and along with these could take the lectures on dairying. Lectures on other branches might also be taken in, as on veterinary or horticulture, at least the principal portion of them on one or the other of those subjects. A number of students took this special course last winter who were unable to remain two years, but why should we not have at least 100 students of this class every winter? By the payment of \$20 for tuition the farmer's son is thus enabled, to attend while from 200 to 400 lectures are being delivered on the subjects of his future life work. This tuition is, therefore, marvelously worthless.

Nowhere else in Canada can so much in the line of education be got for so little money, and it is just barely nossible that

Nowhere else in Canada can so much in the line of education be got for so little money, and it is just barely possible that this is one reason why those educational privileges are not more highly prized. It is my firm conviction that a young man from the farm can learn mora at this institution in one year regarding the general principles of agriculture and even regarding details and methods of much importance, than he will gather in a lifetime simply from his own experience in farm work. The same will hold true in regard to a knowledge of the breeds of live stock.

I appeal, therefore, to the young men of the farm, and ask them to give the subject of this letter their careful consideration; and I appeal to the fathers on the farm, and urge upon them to allow their sons to avail themselves of the advantages of this institution if the latter are so minded. Men would call that farmer cruel who would starye his colt or his calf, but what must they say of him who starves his son intellectually, and that for all time?

Some may say that, in thus writing, "You are blowing your own trumpet and that of your own department." I care but ittle what may be said on this score. The time was, and not very long since, when I was a farmer's son on a Canadian farm myself; and I think, therefore, that I have a right to know something of the educational needs of a farmer's son and of the capabilities of





LEPERS ON HORSEBACK.

The Reception of the Hawaiian Comm tee on Their Visit to Molokai.

The Reception of the Hawaiian Committee on Their Visit to Molokai.

San Francisco, Ang. 15.—Advices from Honolulu say that on their biennial visit to the Island of Molokai the Hawaiian Legislative Committee were greeted by 1,300 lepers on herseback. The steamer arrived early in the morning of July 27 at the anchorage off Molokai. The Legislative Committee was composed of over twenty members, mostly natives. A number of Honolulu physicians accompanied the party. Two surgeons from the Charleston and one from the British ship Acorn also went. Saddle horses, the property of the lepers, were in waiting, and were used by the visitors in their tour of inspection. They visited the boys' school and the girls' school at opposite ends of the settlement, went through the hospitals for those who can no longer walk, and visited other points. One legislator struggled manfully to keep back the tears as he unexpectedly met and shook the hand of an old friend, long since supposed to be dead.

Some lepers were physically examined at their own request and found to be lepers still. One man, 80 years old, has been a leper 50 years. He may die of old age. As the party was leaving the resident priest turned over to them a couple of well-grown non-leprous children, henceforth to be separated from their poor mother, who remains behind.

1 tis said that there are really 30 or 40 non-leprous children who still need the care

It is said that there are really 30 or 40 non-leprous children who still need the care of their mothers in the settlement. Opportunities were given to the lepers to tell their grievances. Each has regular rations of food and \$10 annually for clothes, but they are like a lot of spoiled children. Some want more poi, the native food made of tare root, some more meat or more clothes. Successful Seal Ponching.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 15.—Capt. Erskine, of the steamer St. Paul, from Ounalaska, says: "The Victoria poachers this year have secured 20,000 seal skins. In consequence the North American Commercial Company, which leases the seal rookeries from the Government, finds its take this year reduced to 20,000 skins. It is merely a matter of a few days," said the Captain, "when the seals will become extinct." It was reported at Ounalaska there were 55 poaching vessels at Sands Point on the way to Behring Sea. Not a single attempt has been made to seize these contraband vessels.
