

LIQUOR LICENSES.

Hamilton has more places for the sale of liquor than the city needs, according to many residents of the place, and a movement has been set on foot to secure a reduction. A delegation of citizens called on a council committee the other night and asked the aldermen to submit the question to the vote of the people. The aldermen did not care to tackle the subject and unanimously found refuge in the excuse that no special provision for such a cote was made by the Municipal Act. This is an easy way to shelve the question, but there is no ground for the assertion that such a vote could not be fairly taken, and

the council govern itself accordingly.
We in London believe in the plebiscite. When the question of the reduction of licenses was brought before the London City Council last year, the aldermen unanimously agreed to leave to the people the question of whether or not the licenses should be curtailed. By adopting the view that the people could be trusted to state their wants through their votes, the aldermen got rid of a knotty question. They were able to reply to the query, "How are you on the license question?" that they would be guided solely by the decision of he people at the polls. Guided they were, and the licensed places were accordingly out down from 69 to 50. It is true that the vote was not, strictly speaking, a legal one; but who can say that it did not afford a lair offortunity to test the public desires?

If the temperance people of Hamilton have not educated the people up to the point that they are ready to elect aldermen vho will follow the good example set them by the London City Council, they have agged in the race. Aldermen are very ready to adopt any course that is reasonably

sure of securing popular indorsation. THE greatest needs of Canada to-day are lowered taxes and better opportunities to trade with our neighbors.

NEXT YEAR IN THE STATES. The recent exciting contests in Nev York, Ohio, Massachussetts and a number of other States must be regarded as a mere affair of the outposts compared with the Presidential campaign that takes place one year from now, yet it cannot be doubted that much of the fighting that recently took place was undertaken with a single eye to Presidential possibilities. If the Democrats had lost New York, no matter what their success in other States outside of Ohio, their defeat in 1892 would have been regarded as a foregone conclusion. With their victory, by a majority of over 45,000 votes, they have hopes of triumph next year. New York State will be once more the national battle ground, as without that State the Democrats can scarcely hope to win. The figures relating to the Electoral College next year show this situation clearly. Under the

new apportionment law passed by Congress the States which voted in the last electio if they vote next year for the same party, will cast their electoral votes as follows: REPUBLICANS,

New Jersey North Caro South Caro New Hampshire... New York.....

Six new States have been admitted to the Union, all Republican on national issues, with electoral votes as follows:

With this showing the basis of calculations for next year is 269 Republican electoral votes against 175 Democratic votes. But the very sanguine among the Democrats look upon Governor Russell's re-election in Massachusetts as an augury of Democratic success there next year. They hope that the change of the method of electing members from the State at large to the Congressional district plan will give them Michigan. They look upon the Democratic victory in the local elections in Indiana as an earnest of success in the national struggle, and they hope for victory in Iowa and New York, where Democratic Governors have just been elected. This result would take 93 votes from the Repubican column of 269, leaving 176, and add 93 votes to the Democratic column, making

The Republicans, on the other hand, demur most decidedly from this fixing of the perspective, They tell us that Michigan's electors will not vote as a unit. The Republicans, they assert, will carry the elections at large, the three Congressional districts they carried last fall, and the one they have just carried at a special election to fill a vacancy caused by the death of a Democratic Congressman. In the Fiftyfirst Congress there were only two Michigan districts represented by Democrats. On the most liberal estimate eight electoral votes out of fourteen is all the Democrats

The result of the transfer of these votes, omitting New York from the calculation, would be: Republican, 197; Democratic, 211; necessary to a choice, 223. The 36 electoral votes of New York added to the Democratic column would then elect a Democratic President, with 24 votes to spare. Held in the Republican column they insure Republican success with ten to they insure Republican success with ten to spare, even if Iowa, Indiana, Michigan, New Jersey and Connecticut all choose Democratic electors. If Indiana and Iowa are Republican the Democrats may carry New York, New Jersey, Counecticut, Michigan (8 votes), and all the sure Democratic States and still lose! Thus New York will be the pivotal Democratic State, without which a Democratic President could not be elected. Both of the great political parties may therefore be expected to nominate a candidate for the Presidency that, while strong in the country, will be relied on to poll the biggest possible vote in New York. Cleveland could do it, if he had the loyal support of Hill and Flower.

THE REASON WHY. The average price of combing wool in Ontario this season has been 191 cents. Over the border the price was 311 cents The difference represents the duty collected at the border. in buying necessaries of life. ACCORDING to the Montreal Herald, a new iron combine, for the double purpose of raising prices and of squeezing out manufacturers with small means, is in process of formation in that city. The high tax on iron is a distinct aid to the manipulators in such a movement,

SIR EDWIN ARNOLD, the distinguished British writer, who is now on a visit to this continent, says that he finds civiliza-tion in North America inferior to that in Japan in at least one respect. "If a man asks you for charity in Japan," he says, "give him what he wants, for he is starying. Begging is not practiced there, as the poor are supported by their relatives. It would be a great relief to the generous Canadians if the Japanese plan could be adopted here.

DR. PYNE, late Medical Health Officer o Toronto, strongly condemns the use of cedar blocks for pavements. "The very great extent to which cedar-block paving has been adopted," he asserts, "is some thing to be deplored, and those who sanctioned its introduction deserve to be censured, and much more so if they countenance its continuance. For wha is it on a warm, sunny day more than fermenting mass of decaying wood, saturated with horse excrement, emitting foul odors and dampness productive of disease." This view has been adopted by many of the best medical and scientifi experts.

NEW PUBLICATIONS.

Mrs. Humphrey Ward's new book, called "The History of David Grieve," is for the convenience of American publication being held over till January. It is about the same length as "Robert Elsmere," and has taken Mrs. Ward three years to write it. The authoress is now resting from her labors at Cannes.

It is about to publish, in an early number, a fine, creepy batch of modern ghost stories as a sort of contribution to a "census of hallucinations."
