U. S. May Have To Scrap Her Proudest Ship of War.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19. Launched as one of the proudest and greatest battleships ever designed by the United States party, only to be scrapped within a few months, appeared to be the fate of the superdreadnought West Virginia today when she slipped from the day when she slipped from the ways of the Newport News Ship-building and Drydock Company. The Hughes naval reduction plan, as presented to the arma

ment conference, provides for the scrapping of the West Virginia. If the plan is agreed to, the dreadnought, today about 65 per cent complete, will never be fin-ished, and never plow the seas bearing the Stars and Stripes.

The West Virginia is one of the same class and power as the Maryland, soon to be commissloned. Somewhere among gov ernment stores are eight 16-inch rifles, made especially to fit her four gun pits. She would be able when completed to steam at al-most a 23-knot speed; she is built so as to be almost invulnerable to torpedo attack; she car-ries a hulk of the hardest armor ries a nuk of the hardest armorever rolled, so thick that a man might walk on its upper edge where it protrudes beyond the skin of the ship well above the

ent a month. Economists are wondering if this s an indication that world business onditions are definitely on the mend. Japan was the first country to have a break in prices. That was in March, 1920. The Japanese price peak, when it toppled, was 121 per cent higher than in 1913.

Starting in Japan, price crashing pread around the world. It reached taly, France and England in April, 920. A month later, American prices egan falling.



The reaction was by no means general, however, as evidenced by the strength of certain issues in the railway, metal and shipping divisions.

Chesapeake and Ohio resumed dividends and retention of regular disburse-ments of several of the more important merchandising companies was indicative of a secure feeling in industrial circles Reports were more or less confusing among oils and equipments, those issues showing mixed gains and losses at the close. Specialties of the paper, leather, tobacco and utilities acted irregu-larly in the absence of pool support. Sales of stock amounted to 900,000 shares.

For the first time this week the money market evinced a tighter tendency, call loans rising from their open ing rate of 4½ to 5½ per cent in the final hour. This was unexpected in view of easier rates for time loans for the shorter dates. Foreign exchanges were irregular, leading continental bills reacting slightly and German marks showing further weakness on pressure of offerings from London and Paris.




