PRESIDENT OF THE HOME BANK DIES IN TORONTO

Herbert J. Daly Passes Away This Morning After Long Illness. BORN IN PETERBORO

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, June 9.—Herbert J. Daly, president of the Home Bank of Canada, died at his home this morning.

Mr. Daly was one of ten directors and officials of the bank which failed on Aug. 17 last, who are awaiting trial on charges of making false returns under the bank act and with conspiracy in connection with the suspension of the institution.

Mr. Daly was born in Peterboro, Ont., in 1882, and after attending O'Neill High School in Toronto, came to Toronto a year later to conduct a grocery firm in 1899, coming to Toronto a year later to conduct a similar business.

Mr. Daly became president of the Home Bank in 1920. He is survived by four sons, three daughters and a daughter-in-law.

METHODISTS BACK LEAGUE'S EFFORTS

Conference Votes To Devote One Sunday Each Year To Cause.

ORDINATION SERVICE

Special to The Advertiser by a Staff Reporter. Windsor, June 8.—Unless the Methodist Church enters union when it is finally consummated with the full power of evangelism for which it has been noted for centuries, it goes in under false pretenses.

A plea that ministers and people alike would experience a return to this urgent motive of evangelism, of concern for the soul, which has since its very inception been the center of the Methodist Church, formed the burden of Dr. Chown's address, and local ministers, standing at the church had no right to enter union unless it did so with the light of evangelism burning clearly and brightly.

Dr. Chown's address preceded the ordination service, at which he was assisted by Rev. H. J. Uren, president of the conference, and other ministers, in the ordination of five young men. The congregation was as large or larger than any in the history of the church. As early as 10:30 all available space was taken, and the number were standing.

Dr. Chown quoted in part a conversation of his with the prime minister of church union. The prime minister said that he was not possible to reconcile the doctrines of Calvinism and Arminianism of a belief in the sovereignty of God and in the free-will of man.

The superintendent took sides with neither modernist or fundamentalist, as they are called. "Our duty," he declared, "is to hold to the King's highway."

Saturday was largely a free day for the conference. Resolutions from the so-called "union" were held over until Monday. In the afternoon the stationing committee met to receive delegations from certain circuits, who had been declared, with change in the first draft in the stationing committee. Any changes which might result from these delegations will be reported to the stationing committee at its meeting on Monday night, and will be announced to the conference as the order of business on Tuesday morning.

Rev. John Avestart, license commissioner, who spoke on Saturday morning, and who declared that the people was the worst menace to prohibition and the cause of temperance in the province. Mr. Avestart did not believe a helmet of hell and a sword of heaven.

Another guest at the conference was Rev. J. W. Graham, secretary of education for the Methodist Church, who reported on the education program of the various denominational institutions.

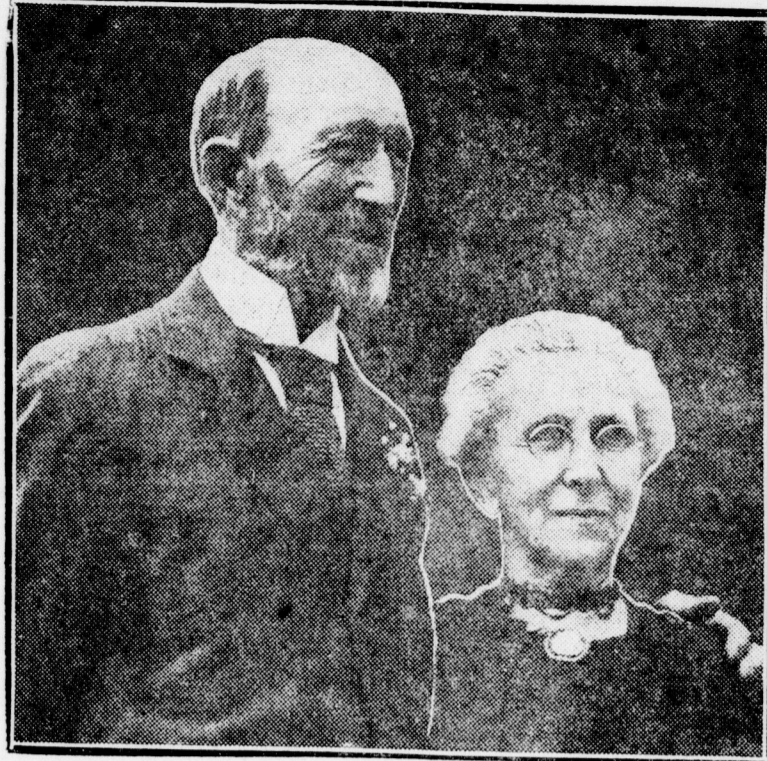

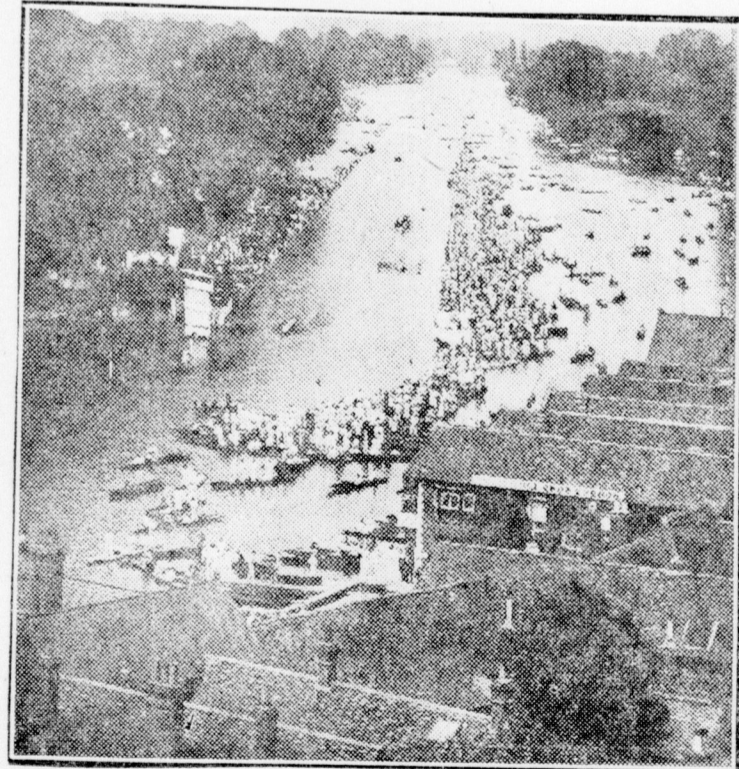

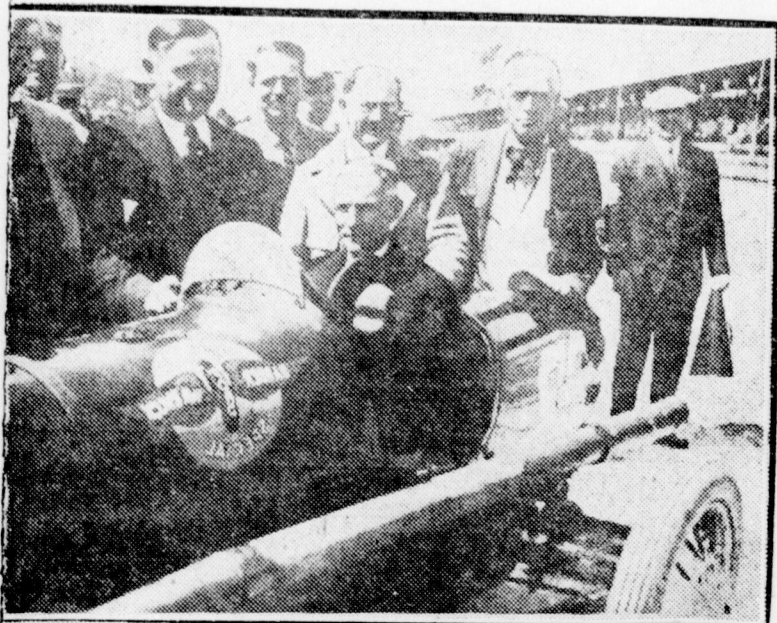

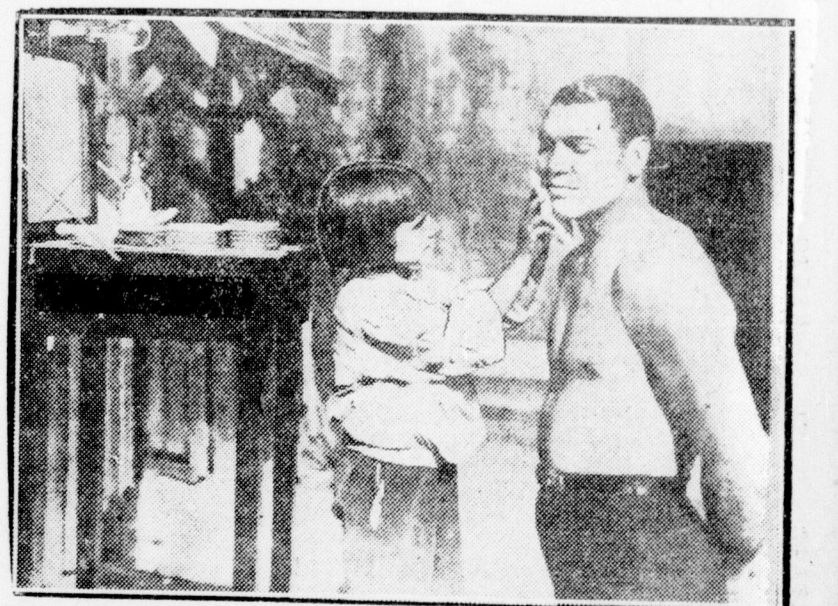
