The pack of white cherries in California will, it is said, be extremely light, and some packers decline to sell more than 2. cases to the car.

Salt mackerel is slow of sale, and as supplies of new fish are beginning to come forward quite freely buyers look for lower figures and hesitate to supply their wants. On the other hand holders do not seem disposed to make concessions.

The Hamilton Radical Electric Railway Company has closed a contract to fit a number of its cars with a patent air brake, that will stop a car going at full speed in one car length we not injuring the mechanism, or will stop it in half a length if necessary. The brake is manufactured by the Standard Air-Brake Company, New York.

The butter market continues quiet and steady. Business was done at 164c for a fine lot of creamery, but shippers protest that their limits only allow 164c. Still, despite this, we understand that they have offered more than the equivalent of this in the country. In this country, they are the country. The primary question, of course, is: "How will it affect business?" And at the moment this is a difficult question to answer. That any startling changes in the tariff will be made no one expects. The country needs all the revenue we can thus raise at present, and the feeling in favor of protection to native industries is so strong that any radical departure in the direction of Free Trade is hardly likely. Possibly some minor readjustment of the inequalities, admittedly existing in the tariff, is the worst that we need anticipate, and it is tolerably well understood that the fiscal policy of the Liberals will be practically the same as that of their predecessors in office.

Hon. Mr. Laurier is a man of broad and statesmanlike views, of remarkable freedom from racial or religious prejudices, and of unusual culture and intellectual qualities. His policy will naturally be to build up, rather than to tear down, our industrial enterprises But there is a section of his party who are not so broad in their views, and the prospect of their dictating a portion of his fiscal policy is naturally disquicting to those who have invested their capital in Canadian industries. It would therefore add much to the confidence of the business community were Mr. Laurier to indicate clearly his intentions upon this most important point, as well as to select his future Minister of Finance. Mr. William Patterson, of Brant, a manufacturer himself, would be one of the most acceptable to the manufacturing and commercial community. Although a nominal opponent of the National Policy, Mr. Patterson is not believed to hold drastic views upon the question, and thus his appointment would render capital less timid. One point, however, should be insisted upon. The government should resign without delay, because the new Liberal Ministers will have to go back for re-election when they accept office, and parliament being called to meet on July 16, it affords little time for the change. 

DUPLEX SINGLE AND PUMPS. STEAM



It practically amounts to the complete cossition of receipts from these places, as the fruit would have to be lightered to Gibara, which is considered to be impracticable, particularly so in rough weather. The effect might be to infuse some tone into the banana market in New York, which for some time has been depressed. While the receipts at New York have so far this year been considerably less than for the same time last year, the arrivals at outports have been heavier in proportion, bringing the total importations up to nearly the same figures as for the first five months of 1895. Shipments from Cuban ports have decreased about fifty per cent by comparison with those of last season, but this shortage has been made good by enlarged receipts from other countries. Prices in New York are about twenty per cent lower than they were a year ago, which is partly attributable to the diversion of trade from New York to outside markets and partly to the effect of the auction system. The larger buyers, it is said, do not look with favor upon the public sales and decline to natronize them. leaving the small buyers to purchase in this way. Consequently competition at the auction sales is comparatively limited and, as the fruit has to be sold pron.ptly. low prices, it is claimed, have to be accepted in many instances.

A WATER CURTAIN.

The value of a water curtain was shown in the recent large dry goods rire in Toronto. Just south of the burnt building and extending across its rear, on the west, thus forming an L., was the general department store of the T. Eaton Company. The space between the rear wall and the east wall of the T Eaton Company was only 10 feet across, with windows on each floor in each building which were unprotected by shutters. The windows at the angle of the space formed by the north wall of No. 200 and the west wall of No. 202 were only 8} feet apart. All of the windows opening out on this space from the premises of the T. Eaton Company were protected by outside "open sprinklers," which are operated from the engine room. The fire started after the premises had been closed for the night, but the engineer on hand turned the water into these sprinklers, and the affect was the formation of an outside

This loss was settled for \$1,750, upon a stock worth, probably, at least threequarters of a million dollars, and no part of the stock located at, or near, these des cribed openings was damaged.

MINING SPECULATION.

Conservative mining men in British Columbia urge that it is time a halt were called in the formation of irresponsible mining stock companies. They say men who never saw a mine, who know nothing of mining methods are lending their names to doubtful enterprises. Many have become feverish over stock speculation, and nothing can be done to prevent it. There are now over 3,000 mineral locations in the rail Creek district alone, covering at least 17sh Oreek district alone, covering at least 125,000 acres. In each case the locator has sworn that he has mineral in place. This proposition is hardly tenable, unless the country is one hig body of ore, and this is not possible.

A mining man said the other day that any ground in Trail Creek could be sold; that the people were after acres, not mines, the idea being to incorporate and sell out; that acres were as good for the general purpose as mineral ground. He also said .

"The formation of these really illegitimate companies was not for the purpose of working the ground, but for the purpose of mining the public."
