GABRIEL RICHARD WAS MISSIONARY PRIEST AND CONGRESSMAN

The Honorable and Rev. Gabriel Richard was a modest priest who represented the home of his adoption in the National Congress.

Pere Richard was a contemporary of Father Theodore Babin, the first priest ordained in the United States. Like Father Babin he left France, his native country, owing to the reign of iniquity prevailing in that unhappy land.

Gabriel Richard showed signs from his early boyhood that he desired to be a priest.

After his ordination he was recommended to come to the young Church in this land, all with the discharge of his missionary work.

He and his successors paved the way for others to reap the reward of their suffering and prayer.

He possessed a highly cultivated mind and was an interesting companion with all the native courtesy of his race.

His great devotion to his holy duty was very plain and devoted to his people, visiting the sick, reclaiming the erring and confuting the adversaries of the Church.

He was a true defender of the liberties of the people, so much so that he was called the "Catholic champion" of his day.

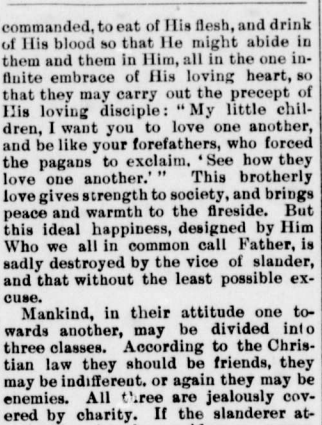

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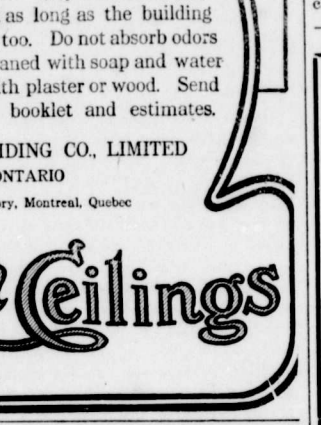
