RICHARDSON Fredericton, June 14.—After posing for his picture and doing several other things which persons who reach that remarkable age do in celebrating their 105th birthday, Levi W. Richardson, the oldest man in New Brunswick, died before he had fairly started his 106th year. About 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon his pulse gave out, and he died peacefully at his home at 105, St. George Street, Fredericton. He had been ill for about ten days. Mr. Richardson ascribed his long life and remarkable preservation of his faculties to going to bed early and keeping active in his habits. He had followed operations of the war with most careful attention, and his own ambition during the past year had been to live long enough to see Great Britain and her allies successful, for he had lived under the flag of the British Empire. One of his grandsons, Corporal Stanley Young, is in khaki, and left here yesterday with his company of the 104th New Brunswick battalion. Deceased was born at St. Andrews on June 13th, 1811. His parents were Levi Richardson, of Vermont and Stella St. Andrews, of Brunswick, Maine, and he married Miss Hannah Young, of Oak Bay, Charlotte County. He lived near Lawrence Station, N. B., for a number of years, but when eighty years of age his barns and other farm buildings were burned and he went to Maine to live with relatives. Later he took up his residence with his daughter, Mrs. Charles D. Young, in this city. 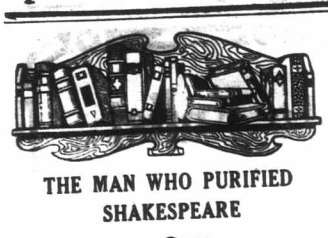

THE MAN WHO PURIFIED SHAKESPEARE

THIS was Thomas Bowdler, physician, traveller, philanthropist, and man of letters, who in the year 1818 published "The Family Shakespeare," and within a short time had given a new word to the language. As public taste moved on to wards broader standards of literary propriety, the very "bowdlerisms" suffered corresponding degradation. Bowdlerism was at first officious meddling with a text, then it was exaggerated squeamishness, then it became a sign of actual prurency in the mind of the editor.

From the gathering mists, the old man looked into the near future only. "I don't care how long you send me there for, I'm tired of it all and wish to end my days there," said the old gentleman. "I'm afraid the world is a very hard place, Crickshank. I'll see that you have your books. Take your horse with you," said Mr. Kingsford, kindly. Then the snow-haired man of learning passed from view.—Evening Telegraph, Toronto, June 8. Mr. Henry James, O. M., the novelist of Carlyle-mansions, Chesham, London, S. W., and Lamb House, Rye, Sussex, a native of the United States of America, but a naturalized Englishman, who died on February 28 last, aged 73, left property of the value of £8,964, including personal effects of the net value of £6,844.

MUNICIPAL SANITATION A garbage 'dump' is a disgrace to any city or town. Of what advantage is it to remove the numerous private rubbish-heaps to build a gigantic communal rubbish-heap? Is the unsightliness or the dangerous fitness in any way reduced by piling all the refuse and manure into one vast, festering, disease-breeding mass? It may be some advantage to those parts of the town remote from the dump, but only at the expense of some other portion of the city and it is grossly unfair.

PRUNING OF TREES Always use a pole saw and pole shears on the tips of long branches and the pole shears on the main trunk of the tree. Do not use a hand saw or a hand axe. Be as sparing and judicious in pruning as possible, and do not raise the branches so high as to make the tree look like a telegraph pole.
