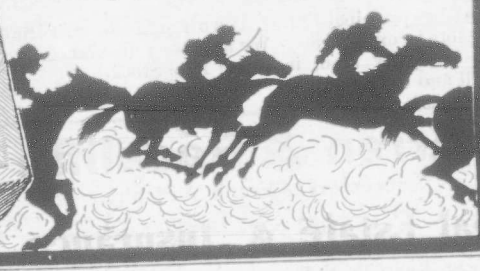
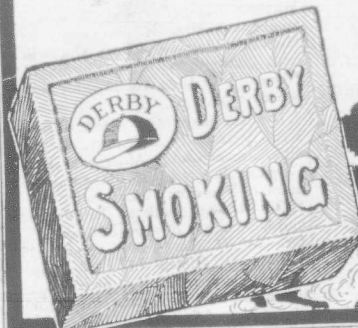

Fine dry ashes are excellent for keeping eggs in, wood ashes perhaps being the best. Get a pail or small tub, put in about one inch of ashes then a layer of good fresh eggs. Put the eggs small end down and take care they don't touch. Cover with more ashes and another layer of eggs and so on till the tub is full. Cover the final layer well with ashes, put a lid on and keep in a cool dry place until wanted.—Ex.

The consequence was that thousands of fish were killed and the cattle on the farms along the banks of the river received serious damage. The Chicago Standard says that the farmers are threatening the city authorities for allowing the river to be thus polluted. Our contemporary adds that if the beer had been poured down the throats of the slum-dwellers no one would have made an outcry, but cattle and fish are quite a different matter.

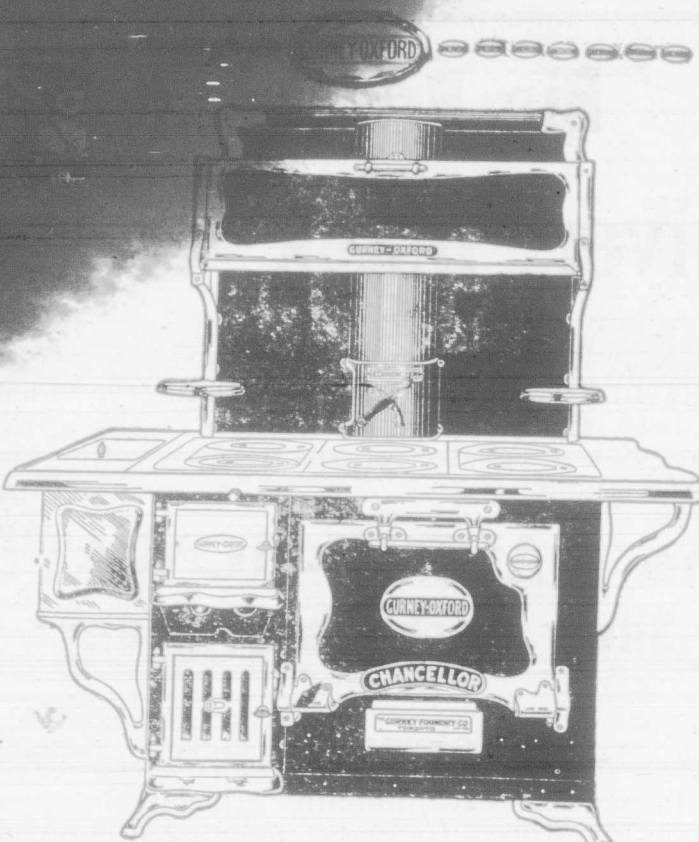

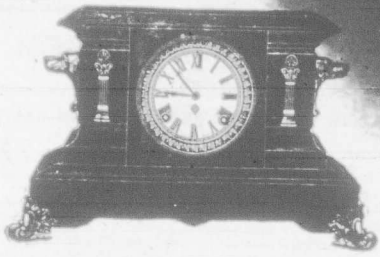

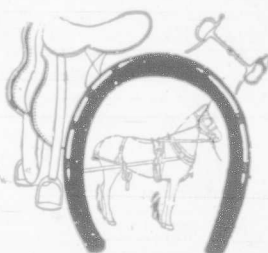

Useful Recipes (Exchange) Beets with Horseradish.—Boil 12 beets, peel them and pack in sterilized jars. Heat 1 quart of vinegar with 1 teaspoon ginger and 1 teaspoon of mace, strain then add 2 tablespoons grated horseradish. Pour over the beets when boiling hot and seal at once.

Canned Beets.—Use very young tender beets. Soak in cold water and peel. Put them into hot fruit jars, then fill the jars with boiling salted water. Put on the rubbers and glass tops and steam for one hour, then screw down the sterilized tops and boil 15 minutes longer. Unless very young beets are used cut them in slices.

Damson Cheese.—Remove the stalk and put the fruit into a large jar or stewpan. Cover closely, cook in a very slow oven until perfectly soft then rub through a fine sieve. Measure the pulp, and put it into a preserving-pan with twelve to sixteen ounces of sugar according to individual taste. Boil until the greater part of the syrup has evaporated and the pulp has become very stiff, stirring frequently at first and almost continuously towards the end of the process. Turn into small jars. If liked, the stones may be cracked and kernels added to the puree with the sugar.

Sponge Pudding.—Scald one pint of milk over boiling water and add one-half cup butter. Add a smooth thickening of one cup of flour mixed with cold milk. Let it cool. When cold add the yolks of four eggs; have the whites beaten stiff, and stir in lightly. Bake an hour in a pan of water.

Damson Pudding.—Take six ounces of suet, free it from skin, shred and chop it finely. Mix well together with three ounces of bread crumbs, one heaped teaspoon of baking powder and quarter of a teaspoon of salt. Add water to make a paste soft enough to roll easily, but not so moist as to stick to board or rolling pin, about one-third of a pint of water. Line a basin with the paste and half fill it with damsons, add sugar to taste. Put on the cover of paste and carefully seal the edges. If the pudding is to be boiled tie on a scalded well-floured cloth; if steamed, cover with a sheet of greased paper. Cook from two and a half to three hours. The paste used for this pudding is exceedingly light and easily digested, but in consequence of its extreme lightness is liable to break if turned out of the basin.

For guarding our own health of those who depend on it behooves us farmers to study bacteriological analysis that our well bred and fit for use.

Think of the difference in output reward between doing business with cows that yield only 102 pounds of butter-fat annually and a herd that averages 302 pounds! That difference ought to stir the ambition of every farmer.

In New England the children are denied the fruit which lies rotting in the Florida sun, while the Florida oranges growers long for the apples which are fed to Northern cows and hogs. What about telling these people to raise two apples and two oranges where one grew before?

Late reports indicate a condition in Canadian crops that is of a very satisfactory character. While there are spots here and there where conditions are not so good, the general average is one that should inspire confidence in the midst of the financial stringency so apparent at the present time.

True the cows are now on clean pasture, but the necessary precautions to maintain a clean milk supply are not less than in cold weather. For instance, all pails cans, or brushes that are used in connection with the milk must be perfectly clean as bacteria multiply rapidly in a warm temperature.

A great many productive fruit farmers will be bisected or nearly wiped out, by the proposed new Welland Ship Canal. The right of way will be half a mile wide at various points, and at the narrowest point will be eight hundred feet wide. Much of the land to be expropriated is at present bearing a beautiful crop of peaches and grapes.

The Result of Orchard Heating

That the use of orchard heaters to ward off the killing frosts of Spring is a paying operation, especially in orchards of considerable size seems to be shown by the crop of peaches that was saved this year in the Tibbals orchard of Scioto County, Ohio. The owners, knowing of the possibilities of having their fruit killed kept crude oil burners burning throughout the frost season with the result that 4,000 bushels of first grade peaches, now about ready for market, were saved. Other operations are kept up as well as they devote their entire time to planting, pruning and cultivating the tract. The orchard, which covers 85 acres, contains 17,000 trees, and, although this is but the sixth year for them, there have been three crops of peaches one-third of the trees being full this year.—Farmers Advocate.
