



## **ANOTHER SLUMP** IN LATH PRICES

The slump in price of laths, which begun (last month, continues until they are down to about \$4 a thous and in New Brunswick. As it costs 4 to produce laths, the man ufacturers' margin is wiped out, un less they were able to cut laths fron slabs or other refuse lumber. Stocks have piled up in United States and all over this province, where hun dreds of small mills and several large ones have been in operation cuttin this class of lumber for mon ths. The slackening of building during the winter is given as the cause of the slump, but it is known that the market is well supplied for the spring trade.

Lath makers in this province are becoming cautious and many are slowing down, pending developments. That there will be a permanent demand for laths in many United States cities is not doubted, as wire lathing is in disfavor with the fire depart ments in numerous cities, the metal hampering fire fighters, it is claimed

The lure of the railroad was too strong for Mr. Pascoe, and he abandoned his homestead to enter the employ of the Canadian Pácific Railway Com-pany shortly afterwards, when the steel had reached Moose Jaw.


