It is stated that John O'Dannell of Salt Lake City has put thirty one years of labor into a piece of wood. carving, which represents the life and dearh of Christ from His birth to the Ascension, and which he has donated to be sold for the benefit of Salt Lake Cathedral. The carving is called the Crib of Bethlehem, and was begun when in Brooklyn, N. Y, by Ma O'Donnell sixty years ago. It has over 150 figures, three to nine inches high, each one carved by hand out of a solid block of wood. The frame of the carving represents a church measuring three feet high, two feet wide and four feet long. 
