THE BURDEN ON THE MAN WHO BUYS.

Taxation by tariff is voluntary taxathe tariff if he does not want to do so. He may buy the goods from the bome maker if he is averse to buying abroat and paying duty. Under the lowest tariff the home manufacturer has the protection of convenience. It is much more convenient to do business with Toronto than with London. Importing means buying far in advance and in larger quantities than required in the handling of local manufactures. It requires larger capital, and eternal vigilance is the price of keeping the stocks aways up to the demand and never in excess of it. If a wholesale firm go into the importing business, it is because they see money in it; and is they see money in it that means that the prices for the home-mad commodities are high enough to reward them for the additional capital and inconvenience of buying abroad, and to leave them a larger profit than they would have from handling domestic products.

Canadians do not buy abroad without substantial reason. Other things being equal they would much soone patronize the home-maker.
