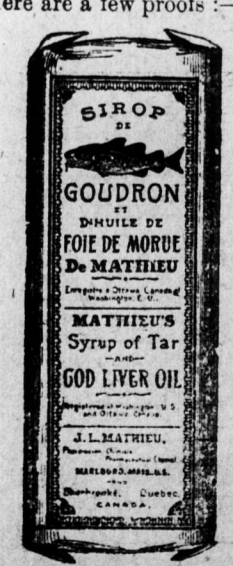
The Snake Scotched Justice Done.

The statement of his status seemed to remind him of the fact that he was talking too freely to the great lady.

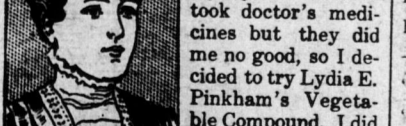
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"It could not be here yet," said Veronica. "Will you please put something under my foot? The couch is too hard."

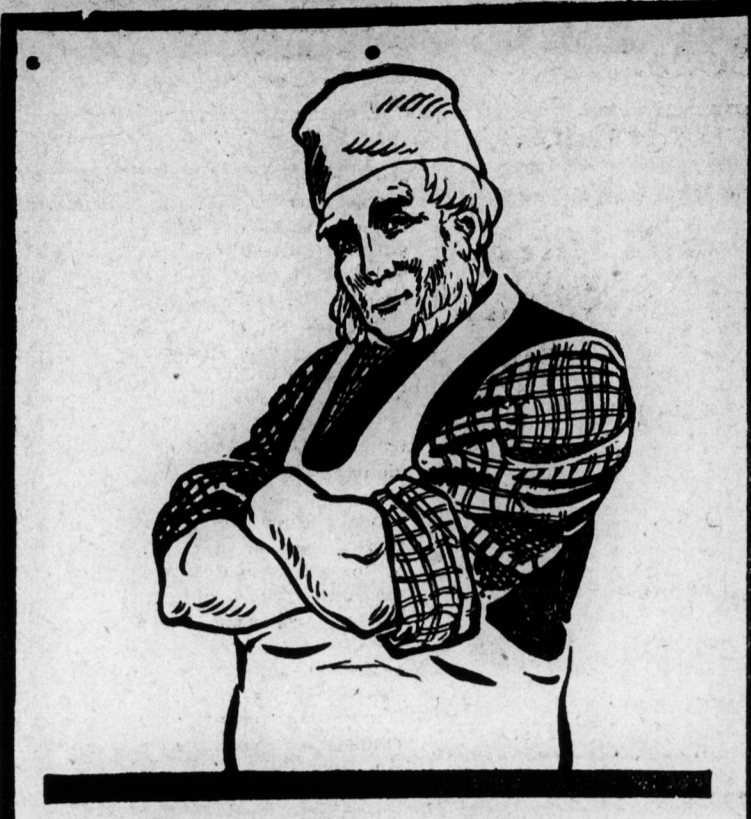

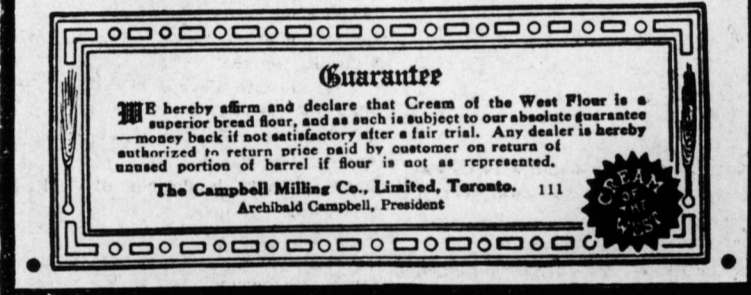

Inspecting and Retrospecting.

The Daily News tells us that Premier Morris and President Reid inspected the Trepassey branch yesterday. The reflections of the Prime Minister could not have been happy. Surely the ghost of past speeches and the spectres of future difficulties presented itself to him.

He could hardly have forgotten the bad bargains he made for the Colony in changing the rate of payment from bonds to cash. He could not have forgotten the assurance that a cash payment of \$15,000 a mile would be about the same as a bond payment of \$15,600 a mile. He must know that the country has been badly hit by the change. He must know that the amount realized from the 1910 loan by no means bears the cost, and that the Colony parted with about \$16,100 in bonds to realize \$15,000 cash to pay for a mile of railway building.

He knows how hard hit he was on his second loan and that he brought all the trouble on the Colony himself by changing the style of payment.

Has he any expectation of clearing more than 88 cash out of a 100 bond from this last loan. Does he realize that the meaning of this is that the country will be saddled with the payment of a \$17,000 bond eventually to get cash to pay for a mile of railway

which was built before on a \$15,600 bond?

Moreover, is he not haunted with his Branch Railway speech delivered in February, 1910? In that speech there is not a word of the railway projects costing more than \$4,000,000. Does he remember using the words:—

"In other words, when all these lines are built, the interest on the cost, which we shall have to pay, will be \$140,000 a year."

"It may be asked, can this Colony afford \$140,000 a year for five branch railways. . . ? Is it worth it?"

"The whole of the branches will then (meaning 1915) be completed, and the question must naturally arise, what will the revenue be in 1915? Will it be sufficient to meet this interest charge of \$140,000, and pay for all the other services on their increased votes?"

In these extracts it will be observed that Sir Edward gives the assurance that when the five branch lines are completed, to use his express words again, "the outlay for interest on the branch railway construction will be only \$140,000 a year" "to meet the cost of these branch railways."

Now what are the facts? Two loans have been floated which in sterling amount to £1,200,000, carrying interest outside of management, of £22,000 a year, or about \$204,000 a year.

The interest on the loans floated exceeds already the Premier's estimate by \$64,000 a year. In other words, on the basis of the loans raised, the Prime Minister was 45 per cent. out of his reckoning, and it is evident to every thinking man that this basis is too low, and that a third loan will eventually have to be raised to pay for what the Premier assured the House of Assembly and the country would be done for \$4,000,000.

Karnopp Pleads Guilty and Gets Six Months.


At 12 o'clock this case was resumed and the accused was arraigned before Judge Conroy. He elected to be tried summarily before the Magistrate and pleaded guilty. The charge was that of misappropriating a sum of money belonging to the Deep Sea Mission. Furlong, K. C., appeared for the defence and Mr. Dunfield for the prosecution.

Dr. Grenfell was present in Court and stated that the prosecution did not wish to press the matter very hard, and also spoke very favourably of the prisoner's character during the time he had known him. He stated that the prisoner had not attempted to conceal anything and had confessed to what he had done and made restitution of the money. The Judge took these matters into consideration and expressed his regret in having to sentence the prisoner. He had no option, however, and then pronounced the sentence of six months hard labour.

At the conclusion the American Consul and Dr. Grenfell both expressed their sorrow for Karnopp's fall and shook hands with him, whereupon he broke down. He was then removed to the lock-up.

Successful Tests.

Ottawa, August 6.—Alex. Johnson Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries is in receipt of a wireless from Professor Barnes on the steamer Montcalm, stating that most successful experiments have been carried on in the Straits of Belle Isle with the micro thermometer. Professor Barnes' invention for the detection of icebergs by ocean-going steamers.

The wireless further states that the steamer will arrive at Sydney at an early date this week and that the inventor will give the results of his investigations to the Department. Prof. Barnes has been absent in the vicinity of the Straits for about three weeks during which time he has made continuous experiments with the ice berg detector. Cable News.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. Difficulties with Montenegro and Bulgaria now appear in fair way of settlement, owing probably to peaceful counsel tendered to Porte by Russia. Britain and other powers anxious to avoid a Balkan conflict. Both Turkish and Montenegrin troops are withdrawn from frontier and the Governments are waiting a statement from the mixed commission. The Port also appointed a commission to enquire into the Kotecha massacre. The Turkish Minister of Justice visited the Bulgarian Minister and it is understood assured him that the Porte profoundly regretted innocent Bulgarian lives had been sacrificed. The Government is determined not only to punish guilty soldiers but intend to take active measures to prevent a repetition of massacre. The upsetting of a lamp by an Earthquake started a conflagration at Adrianople and three hundred houses were destroyed. The fire is still raging.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The capture of a seat at the by-election at North West Manchester, when Randles, Unionist, defeated Ewart, Liberal, infused a remarkable spirit of jubilation in Unionist party. It is the eighth seat the Unionists have won from Radicals since the general election. All efforts to explain away the successive defeats of Liberal candidates at the by-elections fail to dissipate the sense of depression on the Liberal side, which is enhanced by the resignation of the Master of Elibank who organised the successful Liberal election campaign, the rebellious attitude of the Labor Party which threatens to put 150 candidates in the field next election. There are 73 Liberal-Radical members whose seats were won by majorities not much greater than N. Manchester, and Unionists argue the country is so heartily discontented with the financial methods of Lloyd George that a general election was held, the majority of these seats would be won for the Unionists, and many other seats captured by Unionists.

NEWPORT, To-day. Accidents are reported to battleships Nebraska and Connecticut engaged with Atlantic fleet in manoeuvres in Narragansett Bay, will keep both ships out of further drills for some time. Connecticut has broken a crank shaft, and the Nebraska ran on uncharted shoal.

NEWPORT, To-day. Mrs. Kelly, of the Board of Trade office, left by Thursday's express for Grand Falls, on a two weeks vacation. ERK GOES NORTH.—The S. S. Erik, Captain Barrett, leaves for port this evening with a full cargo of salt for the Labrador. This article is very much needed there at present, although it is expected that before the steamer reaches far north the fishing voyage will be practically over. HORSE RUNS AWAY.—A horse, attached to a long cart, belonging to a Logy Bay man, while left standing near Cochrane Street this forenoon, was frightened by an automobile and bolted. The animal ran furiously along Duckworth Street, but was brought to a halt at the King's Beach, and before any damage was done. CITY'S HEALTH.—Fever is on the increase in the city, and during the past week three cases of scarlet and eight of diphtheria were reported. There are now in Hospital 28 scarlet fever patients, 10 of diphtheria and 5 of smallpox. The number of patients being nursed at home are nine of scarlet, three of diphtheria and one of typhoid.

ARCHBISHOP VISITS HOSPITAL SHIP.—Archbishop Howley accompanied by Monsignor Roche, Rev. Dr. Kitchen and Rev. Fr. Sheehan went on board the French Hospital ship in the harbour this morning. His Grace and party partook of luncheon aboard at noon coming ashore at 2 p.m. The ship was profusely decorated with bunting in honour of the visit.

The Nova Scotian Won.

Sydney, N. S. W., Aug. 3.—Sam Langford, of Weymouth, N. S., won a 20 round fight here to-night from Sam McVey, of California, on points. The contest went the full distance. Neither scored a knockdown, but at the end McVey had received the greater punishment. Langford's superiority was so palpable that the referee's decision in his favor was loudly cheered by the crowd. Throughout, Langford was the aggressor, showing a strong preference for in-fighting and punishing in the clinches, which in the second round provoked a protest from the police. Again in the fourth round when the men were ordered to their corners, Langford was cautious. After that, while always on the aggressive the "Tar Baby" showed more restraint, breaking in the clinches at the call of the referee. McVey displayed cleverness and fought cleanly, but his science was unavailing for strength and stamina. In the eighth round he was in distress, but his skill enabled him to avoid a knock-out. The betting was 5 to 2 on Langford. There were many women among the spectators.

Bishop in Aeroplane.

The Lord Bishop of Saskatchewan, Dr. Newnam, paid a visit a short time ago to Europe, and during the trip sent his "Episcopal Notes" to the Saskatchewan Diocesan Magazine, which is a publication for all the parishes in the diocese. In the notes for May he describes a trip in an aeroplane at Monaco: "I wish I could send you a copy of my photograph—five of us—taken up in an aeroplane, with Mentone down under us in the distance. They insisted on me taking the wheel and lever for guiding and controlling the machine. I suppose because they thought I was accustomed to guide and control amid clouds and hot air, or in deference to my office as "sky-pilot"—and in the picture I look as if I was quite at home at it."

Tiny Craft Halted Liner.

New York, August 5.—A tiny boat a thousand miles at sea, flying signals of distress, seen by officers of the Hamburg-American line steamer Amerika, which arrived here to-night proved to be the 35 foot power boat Detroit, which left New York for St.

Petersburg, on July 15, with Captain Thomas Fleming Day as its venturesome commander.

The ocean liner slowed down and headed for the small boat when the signals were sighted, but when Captain Knauth, of the Amerika got within speaking distance of the little craft, Captain Day informed him that he had hoisted the signals merely to attract attention, so that he could send word back to New York that all was well with him and his crew. The Detroit, at that time on July 22, was in latitude 46.54 North and longitude 28.42 West, approximately 1,000 miles off the Irish coast. Captain Day reported having had generally good weather. He is planning to outdo his voyage of last year, when he sailed from Province, R. I., to Rome in the tiny yawl, Seabird.

Resent American Action.

VANCOUVER, To-day.

Outraged by the action of the States Senate discriminating in favour of American vessels in formulating rules for conduct of Panama Canal, British Columbia will probably boycott the Panama Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. Hershkewitz, the President of the Board of Trade issued this statement: "A special meeting of the Board will be called to discuss whether the people of this city and province will withdraw from participation in San Francisco Fair. I see the British Government is considering a similar course, convinced this is the only dignified thing to do in view of the action of States' Senate, repudiating the American treaty obligation. The exposition would mean much to us locally, but the issue at stake is too big for minor selfish considerations to weigh heavily."

Sagona Back From Labrador.

The S. S. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, arrived back from the Labrador this morning after a lengthy and one of the stormiest trips ever experienced by any steamer on that route. Strong East and S. E. gales, accompanied by thick fog and heavy seas were continuous. The steamer got as far as Cape Harrison which was reached on Sunday morning last and left again coming south the same evening. She reports fish very plentiful all over the coast and the present outlook indicates the largest catch in the history of the Labrador fishery.

A material drawback is the scarcity of salt for which commodity there is a continual outcry. On Tuesday last a few small salt cargoes arrived on the coast and great relief was felt. Operations were retarded last week by the dense fog that prevailed and quite a number of floaters were fogbound for a whole week. At nearly every place the Sagona called, particularly at Cape Harrison, fish are numerous. Occasional lobster is the only place on the coast where there is a poor sign of cod reported.

The Sagona brought no word of the Mission Ship Yale which was reported to be on the rocks at Hamilton Inlet. The Sagona on her way south passed the Mission Ship at Indian Harbour.

On account of fog, ice and weather conditions the sailing of the Sagona was set down for 6 p.m. Monday, but the Reid Nfd. Company have now decided to rush the ship away at 2 p.m. on Monday.

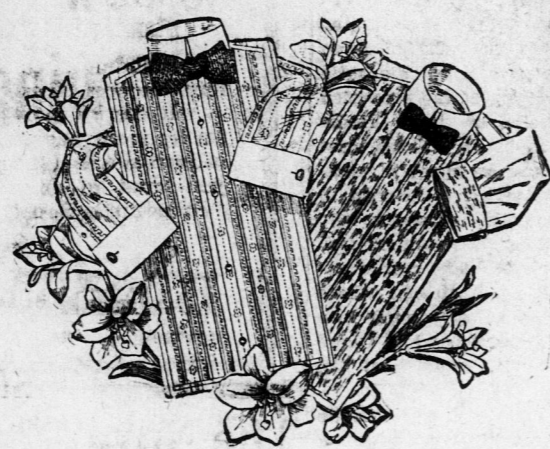

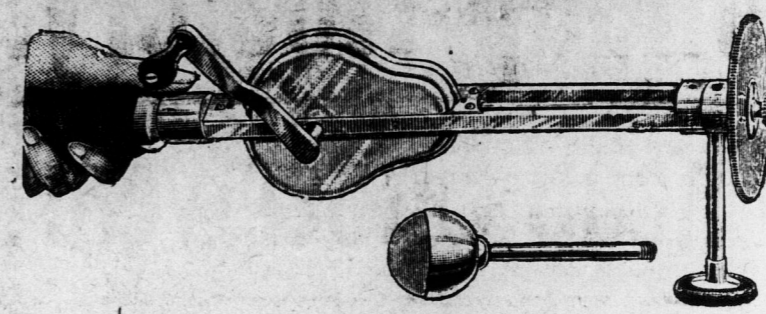

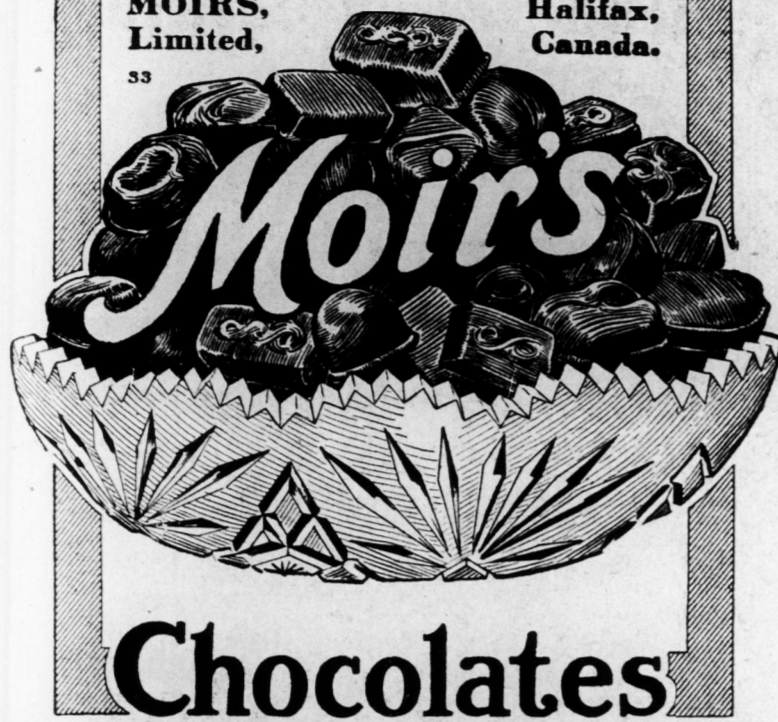

The Oeuvre de Mer

Or French Deep-Sea-Mission.

On Thursday last, 8th inst., the French Hospital Corvette

St. Francois d'Assise arrived in port from St. Pierre, via Sydney, en route for her second monthly trip to the Grand Banks.

Very little is known among us of this charitable and missionary enterprise. Indeed one might be safe in saying its very existence is unknown to the greater number of our people, and yet it is work of great magnitude, and of several years standing.

In the year 1894 (about 18 years ago) this charitable and Religious Institution, was established, for the succour and assistance, both temporal and spiritual, of the poor French Fishermen, who ply their avocation both on the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, and in the seas surrounding Iceland. The number of vessels annually employed in the arduous fisheries amounts to from 600 to 1,000, bearing several hundred men each. The hardships they suffer are incredible. It was to help to alleviate this deplorable state of things that the

Oeuvre de Mer

was inaugurated. Towards the close of the year 1894 a number of distinguished French men and women of wealth and influence, composed of members of the best families in France "la vieille noblesse" met together and published a circular on the subject of the Mission. It was received with enthusiasm and aroused great sympathy all over France. Large subscriptions and offerings from the rich, as well as modest mites from the poor flowed in most generously.

The construction of a hospital-ship was as once undertaken and two priests were sent out to St. Pierre to study the question on the spot, and to commence the work. These were M. l'Abbe Belin, of St. Servain, and Rev. Pere Yves, of the Order of the Augustinians of the Assumption. They went out on board of the banking ship The Britania and the Chateau Laffite, taking their place among the fishermen so as to gain a personal knowledge of the life they led. The Chateau and her companion brought out 2,500 men to be put aboard the bankers at St. Pierre. They were warmly received by Monseigneur Tiberi the Prefect Apostolic. They immediately purchased a house and

fitted it up as a "Maison de famille" or "Home" for the fishermen. They furnished it neatly but plainly, not repelling the poor fishermen by luxurious and refined surroundings. They established a reading and writing room, smoking rooms, etc., games such as billiards for indoors, and swings "pas de genants" and other accustomed amusements for outdoors. A fine court or yard was attached to the house. It immediately became most popular and was constantly frequented by the men. Father Yves kept a record of the number of visits paid to the Home during the first six months and they amounted to over twenty-eight thousand (28,000) or 122 visits each day.

The St. Pierre, the first boat of the Mission was launched at St. Servain on the 16th March, 1896, with great rejoicings and Religious ceremonies. The ship was about 120 feet long and of over 600 tons measurement. She was fitted up in the most modern style with hospital and chapel, etc. The total number aboard including captain, officers, doctor, chaplain, infirmarians, amounted to 20 persons; she arrived at St. Pierre May 10th. On the 20th she set out for the Banks but unfortunately was lost at Cape St. Mary's in a dense fog. Far from being discouraged, the Society on hearing the sad news determined immediately on the construction of two new vessels, one the St. Pierre II., for the Grand Bank. The other, the St. Paul, for Iceland.

The Society has increased from year to year, and the amount of work it is now able to accomplish is truly marvellous. There are now four Mission ships belonging to the Institution. Over and above the supplying of spiritual and bodily relief to the fishermen, one of the principal lines of development of the work is the supplying of wholesome and amusing literature, papers, magazines, books, etc., and converting of the Mission boat into a floating post office; bringing and delivering the correspondence of the brave sailors; thus keeping them in rapport and in communication with the loved ones at home from whom formerly they were separated for a long and dark period of nine months annually. This great boon is eagerly availed of by the sailors, so that the Mission post office handles annually about 50,000 letters and pamphlets. The St. Francois d'Assise has on board at present over 12,000 letters and packages to be distributed among the bankers.

The departure of the ship from Servain was made the occasion of a grand function. A solemn blessing was given by the Bishop of Rennes assisted

by the Bishop of St. Briceux, and in presence of a vast throng of people. Acting probably on the plea that "a good thing can not be done too often," the Rev. Pere L'Abbe Leclercq, the Chaplain of the ship, has asked His Grace the Archbishop to give her another blessing.

His Grace accompanied by Monseigneur Roche, V. G., and Rev. Dr. Kitchen goes aboard the ship to-day at noon to perform the function. The Archbishop will address the sailors in their native language, after which the Episcopal party will take dejeuner with the captain and officers.—Com.
